In a freak accident about 8 a.m. Sunday, a late model car continued to move forward after being parked in front of the U. S. Postoffice Building here. The car, owned and driven by H. F. Gage, East Side Baptist Church pastor, hit the metal frame between the plate glass door

and a window wall next to the door completely demolishing the glass.

Kenneth Myers, postoffice clerk, was in the building at the time and said his first thought was that a jet had broken the sound barrier.

Mrs. A. V. Kemletz, owner of the building, said Monday that an approximate estimate of the damage had been made as from \$1,500 to \$2,000.

Citizens Asked To Read 1% Sales Tax Information

With the special election on the 1% sales tax coming up on Saturday, December 16, several questions have been voiced concerning the proposed tax.

If you are one of these, maybe the list of questions and answers published here may help. If these do not apply to the question you might have in mind, more information will be forthcoming during the next few issues of the Herald.

As the City Council noted, no one likes to have taxes imposed upon them, but due to the increased expenses, it is imperative that more revenue is raised, and it has been determined that an increase of 50% above the current ad valorem rate would be necessary to match the revenue from the proposed 1% sales tax. It is a choice between the two.

Here are several questions and answers:

Q. When will the sales tax election be held?

A. Saturday, Dec. 16, 1967.

Q. How many places will there be to vote?

A. One (1) voting place - City Hall.

Q. Who will be eligible to vote?

A. All registered voters living within the Knox City limits.

Q. How much revenue will the tax bring to Knox City?

A. According to estimates, based upon the Texas Municipal League figures of \$7.22 per capita and 1960 census of 1,805

Bond Sales Reach 73% Quota In '67

Mr. W. E. Braly, Chairman of the Knox County Savings Bonds Committee announced today that United States Savings Bond sales in Knox county during October totaled \$9,109. Sales for the first ten months totaled \$116,364 and this is 73% of the county's 1967 goal of \$160,000.

Texans purchased a total of \$14,689,704 in Series E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares during the month of October. The January-October sales totaled \$139,007,131 which is an increase of 8.4 per cent over the same period during 1966.

Cotton Classing Office Reports

The Munday Cotton Classing Office of the U. S. Department of Agriculture classed about 11,350 samples for the week ending November 24, 1967, according to A. D. Peebles in charge of the office. This brings the seasons classing total to over 41,000 bales.

Grades were about the same as last week. Consumer & Marketing Servicing statistics show 6 percent graded Middling, 27 percent Strict Low Middling; 3 percent Low Middling; 40 percent Middling Light Spotted; and 20 percent Strict Low Middling Light Spotted. Five percent was reduced in grade because of grass or bark.

Staple lengths for the week were 14 percent 29/32, 52 percent 15/16; 20 percent 31/32; and 14 percent 1 inch or longer.

Eighty-nine percent of the cotton had micronaire readings in the desirable 3.5 - 4.9 range. Nine percent read 5.0 - 5.2; and 1 percent 5.3 and/or higher.

Cotton prices were slightly higher but sales were only moderate.

Cotton Vote Choices Are Defined By County Chairman

Just what a "yes" or "no" vote will mean in the upcoming referendum on upland cotton marketing quotas was explained today by Arnold J. Navratil, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Knox County Committee. Those eligible to vote are all producers who shared in the 1967 cotton crop or its proceeds and the owners and operators of allotment farms where no cotton was planted in 1967. Questions about eligibility to vote should be referred to the ASCS county office.

The Chairman said that the basic program choices are: 1. If at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve of quotas, the quotas and an acreage diversion program will be in effect for the 1968 upland cotton crop. Price-support loans will be available at a national average rate of 20.25 cents a pound for Middling 1-inch cotton at average location and marketing penalties will apply to any excess cotton produced on a farm. The 1968 program will then provide diversion payments (at 10.76 cents a pound on the farm's projected yield for the basic diversion - 5 percent of the farm allotment and 6 cents a pound for additional - voluntary - diversion of up to 30 percent of the farm allotment) and

price-support payments of 12.24 cents a pound for the acreage planted within the farm's domestic allotment (65 percent of the farm's effective allotment) to farmers who divert cotton acreage, put the diverted acres into a conserving use, and meet other provisions. Special acreage-diversion exemptions apply to "small farms." Growers who elect not to participate in the diversion program may apply for a share of the export market acreage reserve and produce for export only, without Government assistance or marketing quota penalties.

2. On the other hand, if more than one-third of the growers who vote oppose the quotas, then there will be no quotas and no penalties applicable to the 1968 upland cotton crop, no diversion program providing price-support and diversion payments, and no export market acreage reserve. Price-support loans to farmers who do not exceed their acreage allotments will be available at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law. Acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support.

The lease or sale of cotton allotments is provided for the 1968 crop regardless of the outcome of the marketing quota referendum. However, transfer documents have to be filed with the county office not later than January 2, 1968.

Mr. Navratil pointed out that, while the Secretary of Agriculture is directed by law to proclaim quotas for the next crop when the total upland cotton supply exceeds normal, the growers themselves decide whether or not quotas shall be used. Previous votes on the subject have been outstandingly favorable. Marketing quotas for the 1967 upland cotton crop were approved by 91.6 percent of the growers voting.

Cotton allotments and farm yields for individual farms have been made available to growers so that they may have the information prior to voting time.

gressive city will attract industry and people. The City of Knox City must have more income if it is to continue to move forward.

Q. As a housewife, why favor a sales tax?
A. No wife or mother wants to live in a town that does not provide proper police and fire protection, good recreational facilities and playgrounds.

Q. Why does the City of Knox City need more revenue?
A. Additional funds are urgently needed just to keep pace with local citizens' requests for improved and expanded services. With the pressures of inflation, just as in private business, it costs more each day to operate the city's present services, without considering the needs and demands for more and expanded services.

Q. Who will collect the tax?
A. The tax will be collected by the state government at the same time that it collects the state sales tax.

Q. How much will the city sales tax amount to?
A. It will be a one percent tax to be charged on items now covered by the state sales tax.

Q. If the 1% city sales tax election does not pass, may we vote on the issue again?
A. Not for a period of two years.

Q. Why is a new tax source needed?
A. Our traditional property tax base is overburdened. Schools, counties, hospitals, in addition to the city, rely on this one source as their principle means of income.

Q. Will we face continuous increases in the one per cent sales tax by future city councils?
A. The maximum of one per cent municipal sales tax has been established by law in the Texas Legislature, and cannot be increased by future city councils.

Q. What other sources of tax revenue are available?
A. Only one - a sizeable increase in the already overburdened property taxes.

Q. Should a city dweller who rents favor the tax?
A. The person who rents enjoys the same city services available to the property owner. Also, if it becomes necessary to raise property taxes, the increase will be probably passed on to the renter in the form of higher rent.

their cotton and failed to use good cultural practices, insect control or fertilization programs, are now paying the consequences", he emphasized. "Farmers that have tried to maintain both production and quality are being rewarded. Some area farmers are reporting that they have sold cotton for as much as 40¢ a pound. Even good short staple is bringing 150 to 400 points above the loan. Most forecasters speculate that the price will go even higher. The need for good quality cotton has never been greater", continued Bragg. Farm and Ranch News

NEW VARIETY OF POTATO RELEASED

In the future when potato growers talk about the Alamo they won't be speaking of that well-known shrine but about a new potato variety.

The Crops Research Division of the Agricultural Research Service, United States Department of Agriculture, and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station have announced that Alamo is primarily a medium-early maturing potato with high yielding ability.

Alamo tubers are oblong to round in shape with shallow eyes and a light cream-white skin. The potato is resistant to common races of late blight, common scab, mild mosaic and net necrosis following leafroll infection. (Necrosis is death of tissue.)

A cross between Kennebec and Merrimack varieties, Alamo was first grown in greenhouses at Beltsville, Maryland, in 1959. It was tested for yield at three locations in Maine in comparison with Irish Cobbler, Katahdin and Kennebec. In Texas, Alamo was also grown in three locations and compared with Norgold Russet, Katahdin and Kennebec.

Results of these comparisons showed that the Alamo was superior to Kennebec and Katahdin in yields of the early maturing varieties, Irish Cobbler and Norgold Russet, in both states.

Alamo is especially adapted for use in heat processed products and for table use.

A limited amount of certified seed will be available to certified seed producers in 1968.

The farmer who still figures he can walk across a field or pasture and determine its fertilizer needs can't expect top yields. There are too many factors in determining soil fertility that can't be detected by the eye.

That's where the soil testing laboratory comes into the picture. Soil scientists have a knowledge of the amount of nutrients removed from the soil

by a given yield on a crop. By making certain soil tests they can determine how much of the crops need can be supplied from the soil and how much must be added through fertilizer application, explains the county agent.

Alert farmers test their soil before planting to determine its ability to supply the necessary nutrients for top yields. If the soil test shows the soil is short on a certain nutrient, fertilizer of the recommended kind can be supplied before deficiencies show up in the growing crop and yield is reduced.

Low production means a higher per unit cost and less potential profit while high yields have the opposite effects upon crop production.

Soil testing, the county agent believes, is a necessary part of today's agriculture. Maximum yields produced at the lowest per unit cost are a must and the basis for both as a fertile soil.

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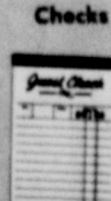

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION TO THE DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF KNOX CITY, TEXAS AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PERSONS:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in and throughout the City of Knox City, Texas on the 16th day of December, 1967 on the question of the adoption of a One Percent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within said City, in keeping with the following ordinance adopted by the City Council of said City, as follows, to-wit:

ORDINANCE CALLING SPECIAL ELECTION FOR ADOPTION OF LOCAL SALES TAX WHERE PAPER BALLOTS ARE USED

NO. 1007

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF KNOX CITY, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE (S); APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE

QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KNOX CITY, TEXAS:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Knox City, Texas, on the 16th day of December, 1967, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said Knox City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City."

"Against adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said Knox City, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit: Polling Place - City Hall, Knox City, Texas.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of

the City of Knox City, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following: English

OFFICIAL BALLOT INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said CITY, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the CITY not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the Knox County Herald is a newspaper published within the City of Knox City, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said City of Knox City, Texas. PASSED AND APPROVED, this 15th day of November, 1967.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1968, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive, provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

Instructions and forms for recording claims may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

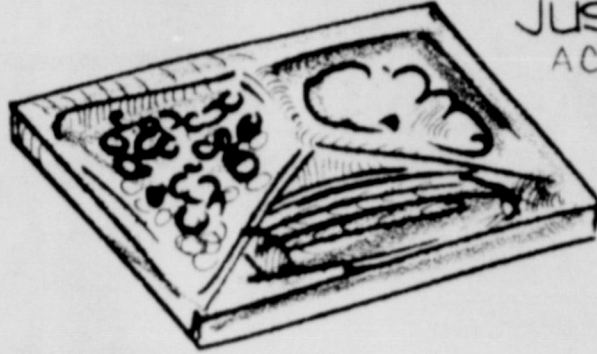

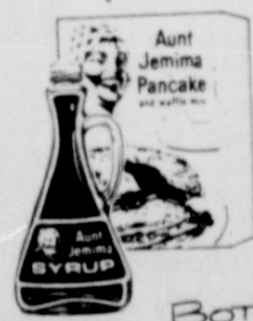

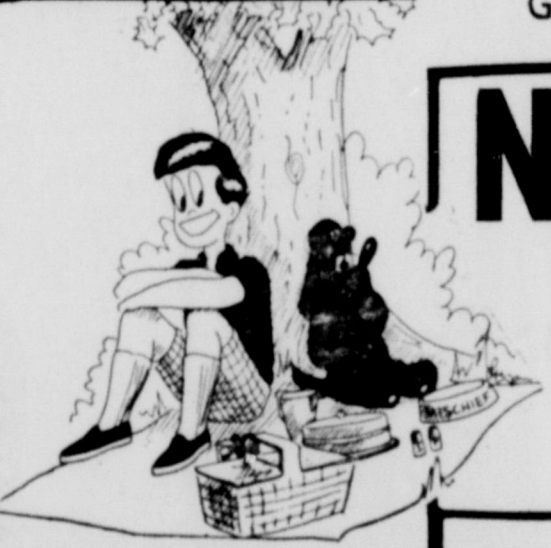

Will We Discover Causes And Cures Of Birth Defects?

 Last November 11, seven students accompanied by Mrs. Louise Graham, journeyed to Wichita Falls for a lecture on birth defects. During the course of the lecture doctors from all over Texas and two or three graduate students spoke. Each speaker stressed that in ninety percent of the birth defects cases there was no known cause. They also added that everyday millions of men and women of the medical field were working to find the answers to some of the most puzzling questions known to medical science.
 During the morning session, Dr. Theodore Votteler showed slides of various children with birth defects before and after a correction had been made. Several birth defect children are able to live normal lives, but others never live to see the age of one.
 Dr. Eleanor Irvine presented a talk on the many opportunities in the medical profession. She made clear the point that there was a shortage of personnel in all fields and phases of medicine.
 The last event was a panel discussion with some eight or nine doctors and two graduate students as the panel. They answered questions about the effects of some diseases on the unborn child, cures, and jobs.
 The most important thing we learned during the lecture was, "no matter how much we know and learn, there will always be an unanswered question." The goal we strive for is the answering of the unsolved questions or problems of today. These problems are always a little higher than the ones we have already solved. The work and discovery of answers never end but continue.

 "Any child not so exempt may be excused for temporary absence due to personal sickness, sickness or death in the family, quarantine, severe storm which has destroyed bridges and made the regular means of travel dangerous, or for unusual causes acceptable to the principal of the school in which said child is enrolled; provided that the excuses are in writing and signed by the parent or guardian of said child."
