#### "Flying Ants" May Be Termites

WINGED TERMITE

WINGED ANT



Take a good, close look at the "flying ants" that you may find glistening in the warm sunlight these days near your house or buildings. Chances are they are termites heading for a wedding in your woodwork.

woodwork.

Spring's mating call sends the ants and termites soaring on their frail wings, and it's only the royalty that flies. When they pair off, though, it means a new colony is beginning.

Look at the wings. If they are transparent with distinct, heavy veins, are tapered and only slightly longer than the insect's body, protruding from the sides of the body when folded, it is a winged ant with ambitions for an ant hill. If the wings are long and narrow with tiny, barely visible veins, and if they lie back parallel when folded, you are looking at a termite with designs on your doorsill.

Of course, if you have taken the precaution to use fence posts and structural members properly treated against termites, you have little cause for alarm. Wood products pressure-treated with penta, for example, are resistant to both termites and decay. Tests have proved that this means four times more service life from wood—and no home life at all for termites. home life at all for termites.



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

The State Department of Health has urged all parents of children who will enter public schools for the first time in September to for copies make requests "now" of the children's birth records.

Most school systems require a birth certificate to prove the child halls of learning. was six years old on September 1

"Making early requests for us time and trouble," said State school officials insist on such Registrar W. D. Carroll.

Carroll, director of the health department's Division of Vital Statistics, says several hundred parents have already requested and received certified copies of birth records for their children.

But tens of thousands of requests from other parents will have to be processed between now and the beginning of the new school term. #### Plastics Develop Nev Farming Methods



Farmers and greenhouse owners are learning to use flexible plastic Farmers and greenhouse owners are learning to use flexible plastic films in a number of new ways to step up operational efficiencies. The current widespread interest in plastic film as an aid in the conservation of farm water, for instance, is dramatized in this experimental installation completed recently under a program sponsored by the College of Agriculture at the University of California. Lengths of film were taped together to form a water-retaining liner for this farm reservoir which is 130 feet long and 100 feet wide.

In regions where rainfall provides inadequate moisture for normal plant growth, film-lined irrigation ditches can distribute supplementary water to thirsty crops. The plastic effectively eliminates the water losses caused by seepage.

Protection of silage is another promising on-the-farm use. Properly covered with plastic tarpaulins, silage stored outdoors remains in a high state of preservation. Tarps are easily rolled back for interim feeding of livestock.

The same material is used in greenhouses as an airtight covering during steam sterilization of seed beds and soil fumigation and, as a watertight liner, the plastic permits double decking of greenhouse The applications look so promising that one supplier of fumigants and agricultural specialties, Larvacide, Inc. of New York, already is offering a line of vinyl plastic tarpaulins and film rolls tailored to the

These heavy duty tarps and rolls have built-in resistance to sunlight, steam and gas fumigants. With proper care, they may be used for several years.

payment equal to 44.9 percent of the net proceeds of the wool they marketed during the 1955 marketing year, says A. B.

Wooten, extension economist The national average price to producers for shorn wool marketed from April 1, 1955 through March 31, 1956 was 42.8 cents a pound, grease basis. To bring this average up to the incentive level of 62 cents a pound for the mar keting year, Wooten says 19.2 cents a pound will be added to the national average.

Here is how the amount of incentive payment is figured. Example: If the producer sold 1,000 pounds of wool which netted him 55 cents a pound, his net proceeds would be \$550. \$550 times 44.9 percent is \$246.95, which would

be his incentive payment.

In the case of lambs and yeartings sold for slaughter, in wool, and during the 1955 marketing year, payment is figured at the rate of 77 cents per hundredweight of live animals. This rate, according to Wooten, was determined by multiplying the average

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of animals (5 pounds) by 80 per-cent of the 19.2 cents (difference between incentive and national

average for 1955). Since the national average price for mohair was above the announc ed support level, no payment will be made to producers on their 1955 marketings. Local ASC offices, on July 2, began releasing payments to wool producers, the specialist said.


