District Show Begins Today

The District III 4-H Horse Show gets underway Thursday (today) in Vernon and will continue through Saturday.

The first activity will be the invitational roping event to be conducted at the Wilbarger County 4-H Horse Arena east of Vernon beginning at 1:00 p.m. According to officials, this is a new activity in the district horse show and will include tie-down-judged roping as well as breakaway roping and team roping. A total of 34 horses and 64 entries have been received for this portion of the show. Judge for the roping events will be Ken Cook of Lubbock, county Extension agent.

Knox County qualifiers along with their contestant numbers include Brett Boone, 67; Kelley Boone, 68; Doug Brown, 69; Tammy Carver, 70; Stacy Carver, 71; Lynda Brooke Hudson, 72; Brand Cude, 73; Tamie Grindstaff, 74; Gaylynn Burkham, 75; Tonya Mayo, 76; and Kristi Boone, 77.

The regular show will begin at 9:00 a.m. Friday and will run through Saturday afternoon at the Santa Rosa Rodeo Grounds. It will include 184 entries throughout the district. Judge for the show will be Mrs. Suzanne Jones, well-

known quarter horse breeder, trainer and judge from Tatum, New Mexico.

Twenty of the top winners in this year's show will advance to the State Horse Show in July.

City's May Tax Check Is Received

The state comptroller's office has mailed the sales tax checks for the month of May and Knox City received \$4,963.10, down from the same month last year, but a four percent increase over last year in taxes received to date.

Neighboring O'Brien and Benjamin received amounts of \$195.31 and \$506.53 respectively, with O'Brien up 31% over last year's \$179.18. Benjamin's prior amount of \$426.99 raised their percentage by 19 per cent.

Comptroller Bob Bullock's office noted changes in the sales tax laws which the 1977 legislature made. Now exempt from state and city sales taxes are syringes and hypodermic needles used for medical purposes, newspapers and subscription sales of magazines effective August 29, and rental of motion picture film to or by movie theaters and television stations.

Sales taxes received by area towns are: Anson, \$5,737.29; Aspermont, \$4,023.02; Goree, \$595.73; Hamlin, \$7,505.26; Haskell, \$13,250.54; Rule, \$2,033.91; Munday, \$4,758.40; Seymour, \$11,664.84; Weimert, \$296.77; Rochester, \$2,126.24; Rotan, \$7,573.32; and Stamford, \$15,554.76.
