O'Brien Man Gin First **Area Cotton For Season**

Covey was again responsible for the season's first bale of cotton. The 2,080 pounds of burr cotton were brought to the O'Brien Coop Gin Saturday afternoon and ginned Monday afternoon about 4:00 o'clock,

The hand-pulled cotton produced a 541-pound bale and 940 pounds of seed, It was gathered from approximately six acres in a 25-acre plot belonging to R. T. Carney just south of the O'Brien Baptist Church, The dryland cotton, Northern ion, Darnall Army Hospital, Star 38-5, was planted May 11 and received very little rainfall, Mr. Covey said, Those who pulled the bolls told Mr. Covey they believed that they had pulled less than half of the cotton on the six acres.

> This is the second time Mr. Covey has had the first bale of cotton, the first being in August

All motor vehicles and certain classes of trailers registered in Texas are subject to the mandatory inspection of certain equipment which includes brakes, lighting, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, steering, wheels and rims, exhaust system, exhaust emission system, and front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages are part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the ve-

The inspection fee is \$2,00, with adjustments or repairs extra if needed.
