Mr. Melton and his wife were returning from a Colorado vacation when he was stricken with a heart attack Friday night at the home of his son, Leroy Jr. in Lubbock. The Meltons had stopped in Lubbock to spend the week end with their son and his family.

Born in Allen, Texas, he moved to Knox County with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Melton in 1907. His father was a former sheriff and judge of Knox County.

Mr. Melton was a registered pharmacist for 35 years. He owned and operated a drug store in Benjamin until 1957 when the building was destroyed by fire. He then moved to Seymour, where he continued as a pharmacist.

He married Ruby Gore of Knox City on June 20, 1926, in Wichita Falls. He was a member of the First Christian Church of Seymour, a 32nd Degree Mason and a member of the Maskat Temple Shrine of Wichita Falls.

The body remained in Seymour from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Sunday at the Elliston Funeral Home and then was taken to the Benjamin Christian Church.

Election Set In Knox County On July 22 Calling For Creation Of Hospital District and Levy of Ad. Tax

An election has been called in Knox County for the creation of a hospital district and calling for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed 35 cents per hundred dollar property evaluation.

The need for additional funds to the county hospital has been felt for some time with the tremendous overall increase in the cost of living. Consumer costs have seen a great rise during recent years, hospitals are not excepted. Drugs, supplies, equipment and labor have continued to go upwards.

All of these things have contributed to a need for additional funds to the local hospital.

Five questions pertaining to the proposed hospital district creation and the tax levy are answered below and hospital board members have said that information concerning the election will be more fully explained in the Herald and county papers next week.

Question—Why A Hospital Dist.?

Answer—To create an ad valorem tax for operation and purchase of equipment for existing hospital. No building program is foreseen in the future.

Question—How Much Tax?

Answer—The tax will be 35c (maximum) per \$100 valuation of which all 35c may stay in hospital district.

Question—Why not raise county tax?

Answer—County is at maximum tax rate and it would take an increase of approximately 40% raise in valuation of all property in Knox County of which 47 cents per \$100 valuation goes to the State.

Question—Who governs hospital district?

Answer—There will be 7 people on governing board of which 4 are appointed, one from each precinct, and 3 will be elected from the county. This board will have powers and will be operated similar to Independent School Dist. All existing indebtedness will be assumed by the hospital district and will acquire all plant facilities.

Question—How will charities cases be admitted?

Answer—Charity cases will be accepted in accordance with constitution and by-laws adopted by hospital district board.

The election will be held Saturday, July 22, 1967.

Absentee ballots can be obtained from County Clerks office in Benjamin. Absentee ballots must be in by July 18.

New Curbs Should Be Ground Level

AT CEMETERY

City manager Charles Lankford has asked that persons building concrete curbs at the Knox City Cemetery keep them at ground level. Lankford has explained that the new city lawn mower used to keep the cemetery in its present attractive condition cannot be maneuvered next to the curbs and that leaves an area necessitating hand work.

The new lawn mowing machine is designed to run over smooth sections and a much neater job could be accomplished if those constructing new curbs would install them at ground level.

The city has been doing an excellent job at the cemetery and the grounds have taken on a de-servingly respectful appearance.

New Fogging Machine Bought For Knox City

Knox City will have a new \$850 fogging machine before the current week is out. The City Council voted unanimously in favor of purchasing the machine at its regular meeting held on Monday night, July 3.

The fogging machine will be used in fighting mosquitos and will meet a definite need here. In the past the city has used equipment from Tulsa.

The new machine is expected here within the next day or so and will be put into immediate operation.

CUTOFF DATE FOR WW 11 LOANS ON JULY 25, 1967 The cutoff date for the World War II GI home loan program is July 25, 1967, the Veterans Adm. said today.

That date is the absolute deadline for applications for VA guaranteed or insured GI Home Loans for veterans of World War II, according to Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Adm. Regional Office in Waco.

Veterans of the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam era veterans are not affected by the WWII cutoff date. For Korean Conflict veterans, the absolute deadline is January 31, 1975.

For post Korean Conflict veterans the loan deadline formula is the same as the one for previous programs; 10 years after the date of discharge, plus one year for each three months' active duty, but not in excess of 20 years from date of last discharge.

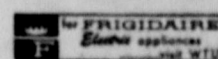

SPEECH: HOW FREE?

"I believe in free speech," a recent letter to the editor. "And anyone against it should be silenced."

There in a nutshell is one of the great dilemmas of our day. We are pulled both ways. We want speech to be free, yet we want to silence speech that we don't like. Where shall we draw the line?

Some call for total freedom, with no limits at all. At the first sign of restraint, they argue:

"The Constitution guarantees freedom of speech, with no ifs, ands, or buts. Freedom means freedom, nothing else."

But our courts don't go that far. They hold that, even tho the Constitution doesn't say so, certain implied exceptions cannot be avoided.

Thus freedom of speech may be limited as to time and place.

According to research and experience of many producers, the present time is one usually considered a good practice to let beneficial insects build up.

Cotton fields over the county as an average have not shown a severe boll weevil build up, up to this writing, July 3. Apparently a few fields of older cotton have shown considerable boll weevil damage and a few boll worms are becoming evident in scattered fields. Past research has shown early season control type applications applied in July, often lead to increase of boll worm problems.

the law puts limits on the content of speech.

One such limit is on speech that is defamatory. Without this limit, your neighbor could spread vile rumors about you—with no basis at all except malice.

Another limit is on speech that is obscene. Without this limit a kindergarten teacher, if so inclined, could read hardcore pornography to her pupils.

Another limit is on speech that is seditious. Without this limit, a speaker could incite a mob to open and violent revolution.

Yet, even in these special areas, the limits on freedom of speech are flexible. Thus:

Defamatory statements may be held lawful if honestly made on a matter of legitimate concern to the speaker.

Gross vulgarity may be held lawful if it has "redeeming social importance."

And wrathful political dissent may be lawful if it poses no "clear and present danger" of serious evil consequences.

In short, the law says we must have limits on freedom of speech—but we must keep those limits to a minimum. Limits are the exception. Freedom is the rule.

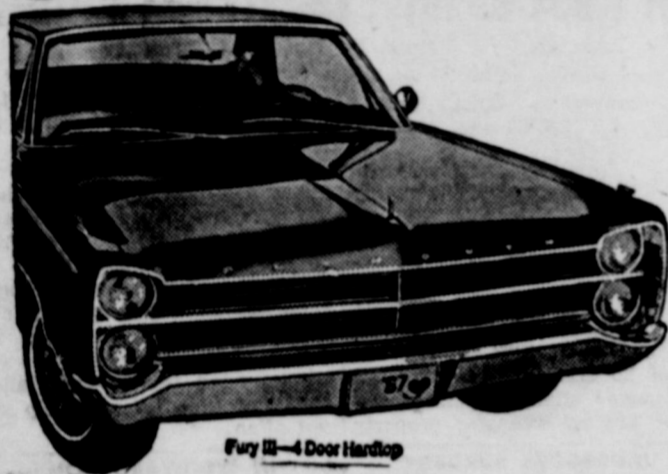

Land Coming Out of Conservation And Headed For Crop Adjustment May Need Treatment; Help Available

Producers having land coming out of the Conservation Reserve within the next few years or land going into the Crop Adjustment Program need to start planning for the future.

Bill Baker of O'Brien is one of the producers who is thinking of the future. He decided that while his land is in Conservation Reserve was a good time to plant and get a good stand of permanent grass growing. He recently applied for assistance through the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District. Larry Pfau, Soil Conservation technician at Knox City helped him in preparing a complete con-

servat on plan on his farm. Baker realizes his sandy land farm needs a good cover of grass to protect the soil from wind and water erosion. By planting his farm to permanent grass, he can control this erosion while at the same time realize a profit from the land.

Now is a good time to start planning land treatment for the Conservation Reserve land that will be coming out within the next year or two.

Help can be obtained through the district. The Soil Conservation Service will provide technical assistance to farmers and ranchers upon request.

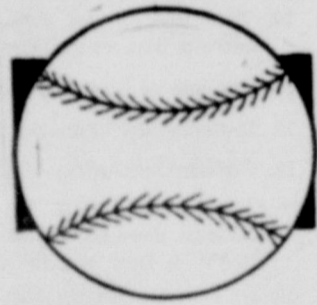
