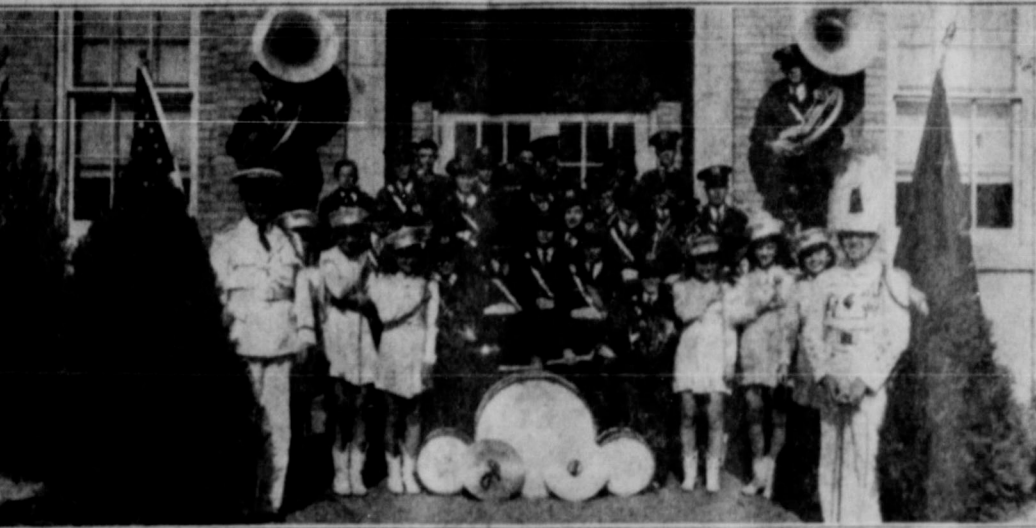
BOOK CLUB

There will be plenty of room for those wishing to come over overnight. Just write a card to any member of the organizing committee, saying when you will be here, and we will have a room when you arrive.




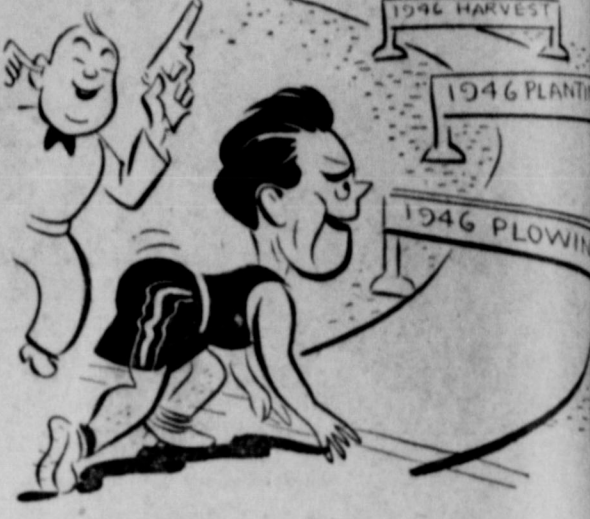
