Seventy-nine percent of the Cotton had micronaire readings in the desirable 3.5 - 4.9 range, 19 percent 5.0 - 5.2, and 2 percent had readings of 5.3 or higher.

The club is one of hundreds throughout the country that conduct the NRA Sighting-In Day program each year. The NRAaffiliated clubs open their ranges to sportsmen prior to the hunting season as part of the overall Hunter Saftey Program that has continually reduced the hunting accident toll and increased hunting skill.

With more than 21 million licensed hunters taking to the fields this year, the program has assumed major importance.

In addition to cooperating with clubs in the Sighting-In Day activities, NRA provides other hunter services. These include Casualty Report, which analyzes information from 33 states and three Canadian provinces on the causes of hunting accidents: technical services on hunting equipment and techniques; and the NRA Hunter Safety Training Program, which is required in 13 states U.S. states and one Canadian province and which is voluntary in 24 other states and three other provinces. The Hunter Safety Training Program has graduated more than 3 million students and has grown to the stage where approximately 500,000 participants complete the course each year,

The Selective Service boards are sending 4,650 for this examination in November.

The state's 155 draft boards will be called upon to furnish 924 men for induction in Decem-Inductions are scheduled the period December 1 through December 15.

This compares with quotas of 1,159 for November, 977 for October, 1,180 for September, 1,421 for August, and 974 for July.

Local board quotas for inand pre-induction examination in December already have been figured and sent to the state's 155 draft boards.

The Texas quota of 924 for December is the state's share of a national call for 18,200, all for the army.

SS Announces Change In Disability Benefits

Edwin Draughon, Social Security Manager in Vernon, reminded residents today that under changes in the social security a person need not be totally disabled in order to receive

disability benefits. "If you have an impairment which prevents you from engaging in substantial work and the condition is expected to last (or has lasted) up to a year, you may be eligible for monthly its annual Uniform Hunter benefits," Mr. Draughon said. Previously a person could only receive disability benefits if he had a mental or physical impairment that was expected to continue for a long and indefinite time, or to result in death.

An applicant must have a total of five years of covered work during the ten year period before he became disabled, but the five years need not be continuous.

Mr. Draughon also pointed out that the law has special work provisions for blind He advised all blind persons who have some work under social security to get in touch with the social security office at Vernon, telephone number, Linden 2-9346, to get further information about the

Free literature available to anyone who may be interested in the disability provisions include Pamplet No. 871 and Booklet No. 29.




