KNOX COUNTY MAY BE ON LABOR "BLACKLIST"

According to an Associated Press story carried in daily newspapers last week, Knox County farmers may be unable to get farm labor from Mexico because of discriminatory conditions existing in the county.

Names of 52 counties where discriminatory practices have been reported were released by Thomas S. Sutherland, executive director of the Texas Coun cil on Human Relations.

"Unless immediate action is the taken to prevent it, careless united the couple in marriage human relations will rob the farmer of his labor and the merchant of his profits from sales to cotton pickers," Sutherland said.

"This information should be known in the respective counties because otherwise farmers may invest in premature trips to Mexico in search of labor." he stated.

"Immediate local action should be taken by all counties having problems in Anglo-Latin relations, and especially those where over a period of time there has been a repetition of discriminatory acts," Sutherland suggested.

He said local committees should work to eliminate discrimination in schools, by public officers, and in places serving the public.



ROY DAY WELL GAUGED

Largest producer so far in the Katz Field is the Skelly Oil Co. No. 1 Roy Day, which has been officially gauged at 1,159 barrels of 39.5 gravity oil per day, flowing through 4-64 choke with 180 pounds flowing pressure on tubing. Casing pressure was zero. Production was from 36 perforations at 4,800.06 feet and from the open hole at 4,842-65 feet. That potential was based on a potential of 193.2 barrels of oil in four hours. The well had flowed 90 barrels in one hour on a drillstem test of the lower zone.
