

Hayes Gets Bronze Star For Heroism

With the 24th Infantry Div. on Mindanso—Pfc. Delbert A. Hayes of Knox City, Texas, a former resident of O'Brien, has been awarded the Bronze Star medal for heroism during the historic assault on Corregidor.

Hayes stormed ashore under heavy enemy shelling as an anti-tank gunner. A buried land mine exploded, damaged the gun and wiped out almost the entire crew. Hayes took command and reorganized the squad. An enemy machine gun opened up as the men worked feverishly to put the gun into action.

Hayes and his comrades towed the gun by hand through a mine field, the entire time under intense fire. The rugged Texan, assisted by the only two men left, roared the gun into action. A heavy concentration of 37 mm. shellfire destroyed the enemy position. Hayes fought for 10 days on the famous island fortress and wears the Presidential Unit Citation for his battalion's outstanding achievements in the battle.

Hayes, a veteran of 34 months overseas and six major engagements with the 34th Infantry Regiment, is the son of Mrs. Hattie K. Hayes of Knox City.

Pvt. Harold Watson Describes Storm On Okinawa

The following letter from Pvt. Harold Watson to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Watson, gives a graphic description of the recent storm on Okinawa that resulted in loss of several lives and untold property damage.

Okinawa, October 11th Dear Mother and Dad: Hope this finds you both okay. I'm doing fine now. I don't know whether you heard over the radio or not about the storm here. It hit here Tuesday at noon pretty hard, then about 9 o'clock that night it turned back and I mean it took most everything with it. Everything but one big Jap building used as our battalion office, went. A few of us got in it and the others were in caves and any kind of a hole they could find to get in.

It lasted until 6 o'clock Wednesday morning and all our gear we didn't take with us, the next morning all we could find was little pieces of wood, etc. Some of the tents were battered up so you couldn't make a pair of shoestrings out of them. Boy, I don't ever want to be in anything like that again. No one was hurt, tho, and that was one good thing. I got all my clothes, bunk, etc. out this morning and lay them out in the sun to dry. We had a hard rain with the storm. I don't know how true it is, but someone said the Marines had a lot of mail unloaded down at the airfield and it was all lost.

Our major told us not to fix the camp up good because we wouldn't be here but just a little while. He said they had already got contact with the ships and we would start loading as soon as they came in. Personally, I think I'll run Christmas a close race coming home, if we leave anytime this month or not later than the 10th of next month.

School Bus Drivers Institute Saturday At Benjamin

County School Superintendent Merick McGaughey announced Tuesday that a countywide school bus drivers institute would be held October 27th, at Benjamin, in the county courthouse.

Under state law, it is mandatory that all schools drawing the State transportation aid must cooperate in the institute. School bus drivers are required by law to attend the institute and meet certain requirements that will be brought forth at the meeting.

The institute will consist of a school of instruction and timely advice brought by members of the Texas Highway Department, the State Safety Department and the Red Cross.

Patrolman Arthur Hill will discuss safety and school buses from the legal point of view. Guy Steen, county Red Cross First Aid chairman, will also address the gathering and explain general first aid and its application to minor and serious injuries.

Mr. McGaughey stated that he hoped to have some movie films on hand to better carry the message of safety as concerns school buses.

The institute is part of a movement sponsored by the State Department to cut down school bus accidents and make them safer for school children.

The meeting is open to the public and your attendance is invited.

He hopes to sell the business locally in order to assure Knox City of a milk supply, an industry that has created a demand right now that he can hardly supply with a larger herd than in past years.

Knox City must have a dairy and here is a golden opportunity for someone. We can't afford to let the business be broken up and moved to other localities.

Mr. Graham says he will make an attractive price on the business as a unit, to remain here and serve this community.
