SS Benefits Total \$162,000 For County

Social security benefits were being paid to residents of Knox County at a rate of \$162,000.00 a month at the close of 1973, Kenneth R. King, social security manager in Vernon said today.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Knox County, 945 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 290 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and 135 are getting benefits as disabled workers or their dependents.

King pointed out that although most social security beneficiaries are older people, about one out of every four is under age 60. In Knox County, 225 people under age 60 are collecting social security payments each month. Nearly 120 are under age 18, receiving payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits. Most of the beneficiaries in Knox County between 18 and 22 years of age are getting student's benefits under a provision in the social security law permitting the continuation of a child's benefits beyond his 18th birthday, and up to age 22, if the child is attending school full time.

Also in the 18-22 age group, King said, are some other types of beneficiaries, illustrating the broad family protection that the social security program provides workers of all ages. Some are children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers who became disabled before they reached 22 and who will probably never be able to work and become self-supporting. The monthly benefits of these young people, severely handicapped by physical or mental disabilities, will continue indefinitely. Benefits are also payable to the mother if the disabled son or daughter is in the mother's care.

King said that another relatively small but significant group of youthful social security beneficiaries are those who are receiving benefits as disabled workers. Since December 1973, King said, social security benefits have increased 11 percent, with 7 percent of the amount payable in March 1974 and 4 percent in July 1974.

Texas Oil Production Declines During 1973

DALLAS -- Despite 12 months of production at 100-percent of the maximum effective recovery rate in most Texas fields, a drop of nearly 6.3 billion barrels of crude oil from the state's all-time record high production year of 1972 occurred last year.

Texas production in 1973 amounted to almost 1.3-billion barrels, tops among the nation's oil producing states and representing 38.6 percent of total U.S. production, according to statistics compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil - Gas Association.

In 84 years of recorded production, Texas oil fields have produced some 38-billion barrels of oil--approximately 36-percent of the U.S. total.

"The decline in production indicates the basic task of the state's oil men--the more extensive development of Texas fields," said the Association's president, Sherman Hunt, a Dallas independent oil producer. "But if Congress will adopt economic policies to encourage the search for new fields, we feel this trend can be changed."

Despite the drop in production, the oil that was produced last year in 203 of the state's 254 counties was valued at some \$5-billion, an increase of approximately \$500 million over the value of oil produced in 1972. This increase partially reflects the increased prices paid for some Texas crude oil during the latter part of 1973.

In addition to larger payments to royalty owners, the higher prices also have been reflected in the state comptroller's reports of increases severance taxes paid by oil men of Texas.

Knox County, which has had recorded production since 1946, last year produced

780,680 barrels of oil at the rate of 2,139 barrels a day. Production in 1973 boosted Knox County's total through the end of the year to 37,968,081.

In 1973, some 33 counties produced more than 10 million barrels of crude oil, with Borden County being added to the list. The top half-dozen, all with production in excess of 50 million barrels, remain the same as the year previous. They are: Scurry, 91.8 million barrels; Ector, 72.6 million barrels; Yoakum, 66.0 million barrels; Gaines, 61.3 million barrels; Andrews, 60.4 million barrels; and Gregg, 53.2 million barrels.

Gregg County, the only Texas county to produce more than two billion barrels of oil in the history of recorded production, remains the all-time leader with a cumulative production total through 1973 of almost 2.4 billion barrels. Other counties with cumulative production in excess of one billion barrels are: Ector, 1.9 billion barrels; Andrews, 1.6 billion barrels; Rusk 1.5 billion barrels; Harris, 1.1 billion barrels; and Scurry 1.1 billion barrels.

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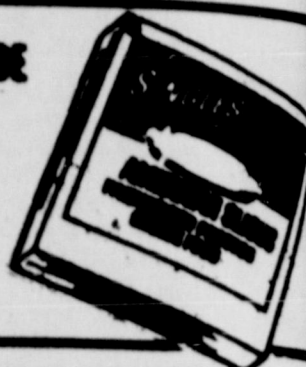

may find this to be the worst possible time to market his grain." Harp quoted two main reasons for the variation of prices between corn and grain sorghum.

(1) Cattle feedlots have cut back sharply on numbers of fed cattle throughout the sorghum production belt. Feedlots that bought ahead are finding themselves in a grain surplus situation and some are reselling a portion of their grain. Others are waiting to see if they are going to have any cattle to feed before purchasing grain.

(2) Countries competing with the United States, such as Argentina, Australia, and South Africa, have been capturing much of the foreign grain market sales during the past few months.

As the cattle situation improves, the GSPA executive feels that feedlots will resume a more normal operation, which should automatically help the grain export situation.

With the corn/sorghum price spread of \$1.00 cwt., Harp said it is likely that there soon will be a large shift of purchasing from corn to grain sorghum to take advantage of the price break.

An example of price comparisons between corn and sorghum a year ago was the February 1973 Gulf Export Price for grain sorghum of \$3.73 cwt. compared to \$3.64 for corn. In June of 1973 the Gulf Export Price for grain sorghum was \$4.37 cwt.

compared with \$3.85 for corn. During other months a year ago, corn and sorghum alternated as to which grain was selling at highest prices in the export market.

Harp said, "As buyers begin now to purchase more grain sorghum, we feel that it will not be long before sorghum prices start moving up in relation to corn. Therefore, we encourage those who have grain to sell to watch the markets very closely and not sell too cheap."

Harp stated that a producer who is concerned about the market dropping below its current level can protect himself by setting a "stop order" to hedge his grain in case the market does start dropping. He said this would give price protection and a seller also would get the advantage of future increases in market prices.

If the corn and sorghum crop continues to deteriorate, Harp said the prospects for a smaller than estimated grain crop becomes clear and some increase in the market price for corn and grain sorghum can be expected.
