Delegate agencies will be the Mitchell County CAP, the Haskell County CAP and the Stephens County CAP.

Counties served are Taylor, Mitchell, Stephens, Jones, Kent, Haskell, Stonewall, Knox, Throckmorton and Shackelford.

The effective date of the grant is May 1, 1977 and the duration of the programming is for a twelve-month period.

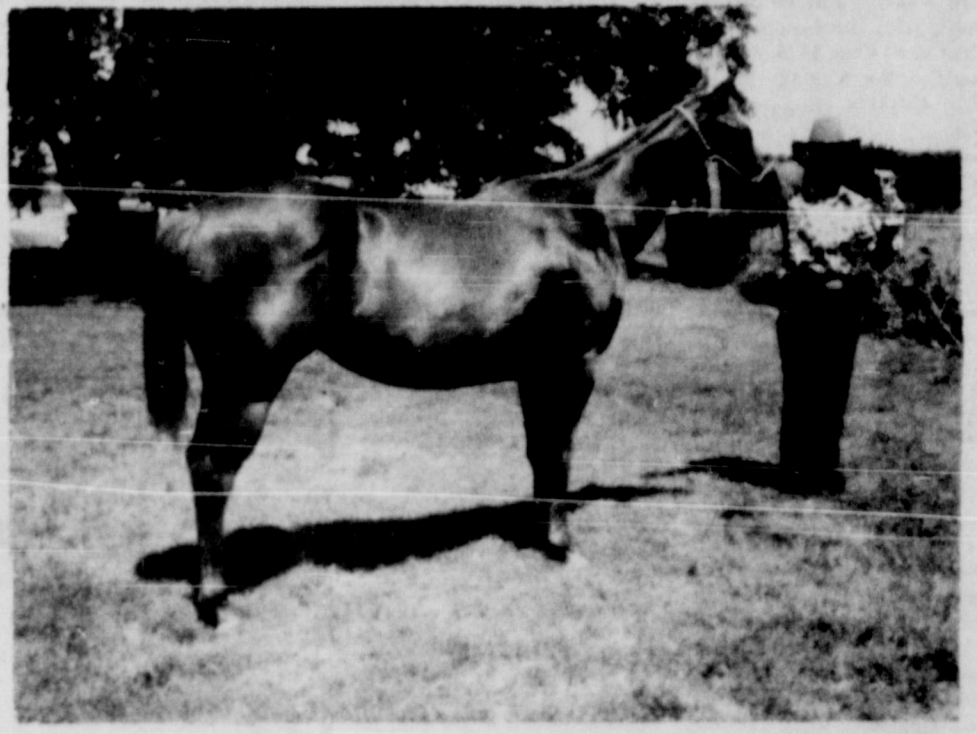
The Program provides youth programs, senior citizens programs, comprehensive outreach and referral, community organization, economic development, manpower services and legal aid.

## Ryder Rites Held Monday

Funeral services for Marvin D. Ryder of Saginaw, brother of William Edward (Bill) Ryder Jr. of Benjamin, were held Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the Benjamin Baptist Church with the Rev. K.E. Woolley, retired Baptist minister, and the Rev. Dale Jackson, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Gilliland officiating. Burial followed in the Benjamin Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Ryder, 56, was dead on arrival Friday at 4:20 p.m. in the Fort Worth All Saints Hospital after suffering an apparent heart attack while at work as an equipment operator.

Born February 28, 1921 in Gilliland, he was the son of the late William Edward and Lilly Ryder. During World War II, he served in the U.S. Army. He married Ellen Vada Hackney on February 9, 1946 in Seymour, and they moved to Fort Worth in 1971 from Gordon and Weatherford. Ryder was employed by Brown and Blakeny, Inc. as a mechanic.

Survivors include his wife, three brothers, William Edward Jr. of Benjamin, Melvin of Burlington, Iowa, and Myers of Wichita Falls; and two sisters, Mrs. Eva Faye Jones of Fort Worth and Mrs. Edith May Cash of Truscott. Nephews served as pallbearers.

## Billion Dollar Cotton Crop Is Reported

AUSTIN -- Cotton production during 1976 totaled over \$1 billion, just under the record set in 1973, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Total value of last year's crop was 84 per cent over the 1975 crop, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. A total of 3,307,000 bales were produced last year.

"All indications point toward an even bigger crop in the state this year," Brown said. "There is little indication so far that foreign demand will lessen and prices should remain good, despite the increased acreage."

The average price per pound of lint in 1976 for Texas upland cotton was 62.4 cents, over a third higher than 1975. American Pima sold for an average of \$1.18 a pound. Cottonseed prices moved up to \$99 a ton, above the \$89.80 mark set the previous year.

Upland cotton lint brought \$990,513,000; American Pima, \$4,191,000 and cotton seed \$127,314,000.

Farmers in Texas pay more than \$188 million annually in farm property taxes, according to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

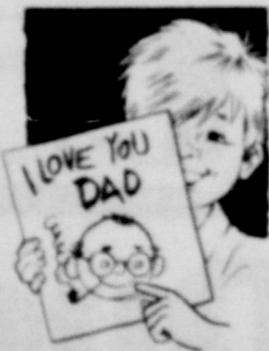

## Briscoe Signs Bill To Amend Act

AUSTIN -- Governor Dolph Briscoe Friday signed into law House Bill 1745, which amends the Texas Agricultural Protective Act and the Citrus Bonding and Licensing Law, the Texas Department of Agriculture has announced.

"The law gives added protection for the state's fruit and vegetable producers and handlers and provides produce dealers with a workable alternative to the current bonding procedure," according to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. Brown, along with representative leaders from the produce industry, was present for the official signing.

Most important of the revisions is the establishment of the Produce Recovery Fund and administrative board, to be headed by the Agriculture Commissioner. Other members, appointed by the governor, will include a producer, a

licensed commission merchant and a member of the general public.

Brown explained that monies for the fund would be supplied by a fee paid by commission merchants at the time of licensing. Producers losing money in a marketing transaction can file a claim against the fund. If a claim is paid against a commission merchant, he must repay the fund or lose his state license for a four-year period.

"In the past, commission merchants were required to be bonded," Brown explained, "which created problems for everyone involved. More and more of our most reputable produce dealers were having problems getting bonded--the insurance companies just don't want to fool with them."

"This bill will provide the necessary protection for the farmers and is a commendable effort by the produce industry at self-regulation," Brown said.

The new regulations will go into effect September 1.

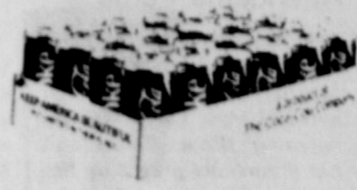
