City Sales Tax Check Down \$100 For Second Quarter

Knox City's net city sales tax check for the second quarter of 1972, which ended June 30, was received last week from the State Comptroller in the amount of \$4140,61, reflecting a difference of only \$100 for the same period a year ago. The second quarter in 1971 netted \$4240,53, according to Mrs. Faye Railsback, city secretary.

Hundreds View Groundbreaking For Millers Creek Reservoir

of dirt at Il a.m. Friday at the dam site of Millers Creek Reservoir in southwestern Baylor County, marked the beginning of a future water supply for four West Texas towns and the end of more than 15 years of planning. Doing the honors in ground-

breaking ceremonies was L. B. Patterson Sr, of Munday, president of the board of directors and one of the original planners of North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, which was organized April 19, 1957. Master of ceremonies, R. C. Couch Jr. of Haskell, vicepresident of the board of directors, introduced dignitaries and recognized Patterson for his dedication to the project. Couch said the Millers Creek project, which will be a fresh water supply for the cities of Haskell, Knox City, Munday, and Goree, was the most memorable project instituted in this area. It is something that we have dreamed about, and now it is a thing of reality.

Patterson did not make a speech. He read a poem about the importance of not quitting in the face of adversity. "And we never gave up," he said. "There is not a single town in Knox or Haskell counties with state-approved water," Patterson said,

Approximately 300 persons traveled to the groundbreaking ceremonies and officials of all four cities, the Texas Water Development Board, Current and past members of the water authority board, were among those attending.

Current board members are Patterson, Couch, V. E. Moore of Munday, Thomas W. Watson of Haskell, Leon Burkham and Joe Clonts both of Knox City and Jack Beaty and Willie B. Neighbours, both of Goree. Pete Beecher of Munday, who joined the project in 1959 as an eva-





Nov. 2 is the last day for a voter who has moved from one election precinct to an other within the same county to transfer his registration to his new precinct for voting in the general elec-

Last day for absentee voting in person, and the last day for application to vote absentee by mail is Friday.



According to relatives Tuesday afternoon, Mrs. Adam's condition is reported as "good"



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
