League Ranch represented Knox County very well in the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show last week with a number of wins in the cattle division of the show.

In the Commercial Stocker Heifers, League won the Grand Champion honors with a pen of 10 heifers and Reserve Champion honors with a pen of 20. In the Feeder Steer Class—car load class—they placed first and second in Heavyweight and Reserve Champion in this group.

During the sale two stock in pen one averaged 694 pounds and brought \$29.80 per hundred and pen two averaged 756 and brought \$27.80 per hundred. Jack Idol, manager, said the pen of stocker heifers brought \$207.50 per head and were sent to Bowling Ranch in Nebraska.

Sam E. Clonts, Knox County farmer, has announced that he will be a candidate for the office of County Judge.

In making his statement to the public, Clonts said "My main objective is for the best government possible for the people of Knox County."

"The office of County Judge is one of the most important in our county. Beginning next year (1967) the duties of County School Superintendent will be administered by the County Judge."

"The County Judge is also Chairman of the Commissioners Court, together they oversee the spending of approximately \$420,000.00 of our tax money. This is possibly the largest business in Knox County."

Clonts, 36, has lived in Knox County all of his life. He attended the public schools in Knox City and in 1951 he was graduated from Texas Tech with a B. S. degree. He is married and has three children, Karen, 14, Greg, 11, and Jami, 8. He and his family are active members of the Methodist Church, where he has served several years as a member of the Official Board.

Clonts, was a member of the School Board for 6 years and for the past three years has served on the Knox County Hospital Board, acting as Chairman the past two years. He is also a member of the Lions Club.

In conclusion, Clonts said, "I feel I am well qualified to fill this office and I would like very much the opportunity to serve the people of Knox County as your County Judge. Your vote and influence will be appreciated."

O'Brien To Begin Construction Of Sewer Shortly

O'BRIEN TO start construction of a sewer system in the City of O'Brien has made application with the Farmers Home Administration to purchase the sewer bond issues that were voted last June, it has been reported to the Herald.

The City of O'Brien expects the bonds to be delivered within the next 15 days and construction to start shortly thereafter.

The bonds will be 3 and 3-4 per cent bonds.

In addition, the city will utilize a \$10,000 grant from the U. S. Department of Health and Welfare.

The grant was approved in November.

Total cost of the project will be approximately \$72,000. E. L. Andrews of Wichita Falls is the engineer for the project. Contract for construction will be let in the very near future.

In planning your home landscape program, don't overlook the native Yaupon, for use in areas requiring a medium-sized evergreen shrub. It can be trained as a small tree by proper pruning. It responds to shearing and makes an excellent formal hedge or it can be allowed to develop naturally into a dense informal hedge. While native to Central and East Texas, it will grow well under most Texas conditions. It will withstand drought and high temperatures better than any other Holly.

Dwarf selections of Yaupon are available from nurseries. These are excellent compact plants and are the best evergreen plants available for the exterior planted box.

Beware of the itinerant door-to-door salesman, or the fly-by-night peddler who locates his truck on a vacant lot. These individuals sell on price alone and the buyer usually gets what he pays for. It is safer and in the long run more economical to purchase landscape materials from reputable well established nurseries and garden stores in your area.

The itinerant nursery salesman may give a verbal guarantee with his plants but how does one locate him when the plant

Size should be one of the least important factors to consider when selecting dormant bare-root nursery stock. Characteristics to consider are plumpness of buds, condition of the bark and cambium layer, and the condition of the packing material around the roots. If the roots are dry and brittle it is a good sign the plants have been properly cared for. The general appearance of the sales yard and the overall appearance of the plants can usually give an excellent indication of the care the plants have received and the condition they will be in if purchased.
