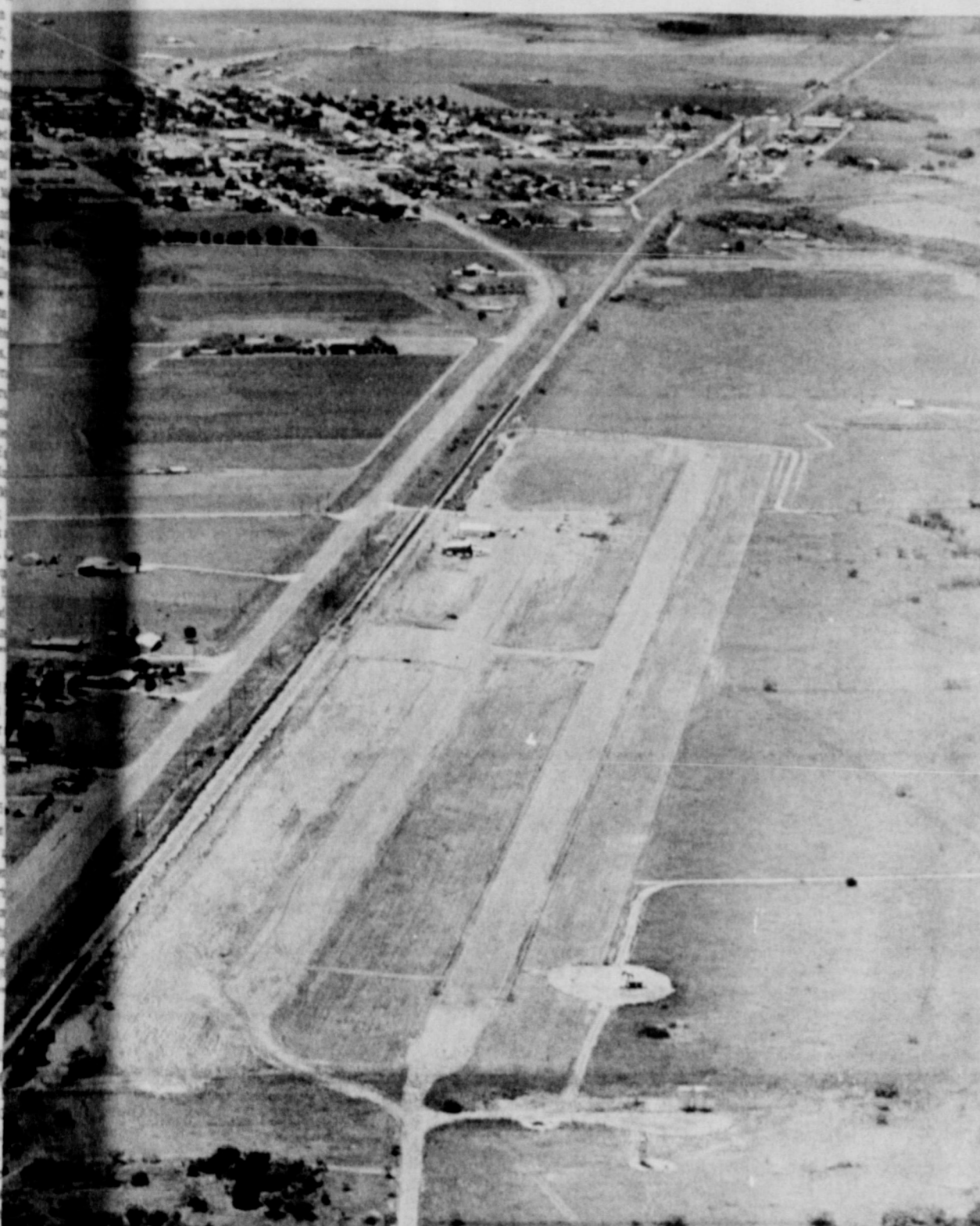

Peace Corps Placement Test In Abilene On Sat., August 17

Area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, August 17 at Abilene in Room 2201 of the new Post Office Building. The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive; an applicant can neither pass nor fail. Persons interested in serving with the Peace Corps must fill out an Application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before the test. Application forms are available from post offices or from the Peace Corps in Washington, D. C. 20525. Twelve thousand Volunteers are currently serving in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Pacific Islands, working with the people of those nations in self-help projects ranging from food production to health to education. More Volunteers are needed for programs which will begin this fall and winter.

RETURN TO K. C. AND Boost SS Benefits

The C. E. Woodward family has returned to Knox City to make their home after being away for the past two years. They have rented a house on West Sixth St., and Knox City friends are glad to have them back "home". Since social security benefits to you and your family are based on your earnings, the higher your reported earnings, the higher your future benefits. For some workers, the amount of their social security benefits could be almost doubled if social security credit can be given for the amount of their tips. If you receive cash tips of \$20 or more in a month while working for one employer, these tips can be counted with your other earnings for social security. The procedure is simple; just give your employer a written record of your cash tips by the 10th of the month following the month when you received them. And make this report to your employer on time; a late report can mean that you will be liable for the delinquent taxes as well as penalties and interest that may be assessed by the Internal Revenue Service. If wages due you will not cover the amount of the social security tax on those tips, give your employer the tax money along with the report of your tips. Your employer will include the tips on the report he makes to the Internal Revenue Service every quarter, and will send in the social security tax. The best way to keep tract of your tips is to write them down daily, and your social security office has a special booklet No. 5635, especially for this purpose. The social security office is located at 1728 Fannin in Vernon. Telephone LI2-9346.

Licenses On Sale Early

Austin - The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department shipped 1.9 million licenses for the 1968-69 season Friday (August 9), the earliest date in several years, according to C. L. Friou, assistant director of administrative service for the Department. The licenses were mailed to more than 3,000 license deputies across the State and should go on sale Monday. However, the licenses will not become effective until Sept. 1. Friou said the shipment was rushed so hunters planning to participate in the early deer hunts in Aransas National Wildlife Refuge could buy their license, fill out the free hunt application card and return it by the 5 p.m. deadline, Aug. 27, for the Sept. 3 drawing. Officials said application cards for the free hunts would not be considered for the drawing unless they had the new hunting license number for each person on them, with limit of four persons per card. Basically, there is little change in the new licenses--the cost and general appearance are the same except for the color and dates. This year's hunting license has four tags--the two on the left are for a bonus antlerless deer and a mule deer buck only in the Trans-Pecos Regulatory District.

Veterans Advised To Apply Early For VA Certificate

Apply now for your Veterans Administration Certificate of Eligibility and avoid the fall rush. So the VA advises veterans who plan to enter school this fall under the GI Bill. Veterans already in training under the GI Bill who plan to change programs or schools this fall must obtain new Certificates of Eligibility from the VA. The principal advantage to the veteran of heading advice to apply now is that he can be certain that his GI Bill education allowance will be dated from the day school begins. If he fails to apply for the certificate until after school has started there may be a delay in payment of his allowance, according to the VA. To obtain a Certificate of Eligibility, a veteran planning to enter school or training for the first time under the GI Bill should get in touch with his nearest Veterans Administration office. A veteran who requires another certificate because of a change in program or school should contact the VA Regional Office which maintains his records on file. A veteran who is not changing programs or schools need not obtain another certificate.

Highway Use Tax Return Compliance

Dallas, Texas - Owners of trucks and buses in Northern Texas were advised today by District Director of Internal Revenue Ellis Campbell, Jr., that a thorough check will be made to insure compliance with provisions of the Federal Highway Use Tax Law. Mr. Campbell said that lists of owners of taxable motor vehicles are being compared with Federal Highway Use Tax returns filed, to assure that all taxable vehicles were reported and to determine whether they were reported in the correct tax categories. Mr. Campbell pointed out that highway use tax revenue collected by the Federal government is returned to the states to help pay the costs of the Interstate Highway System now under construction. IRS Publication No. 349, "Federal Use Tax on Trucks, Truck-Tractors, and Buses," can be obtained without charge by dropping a postcard to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service.

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PUBLIC NOTICE
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:
"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows:
"Section 52a. 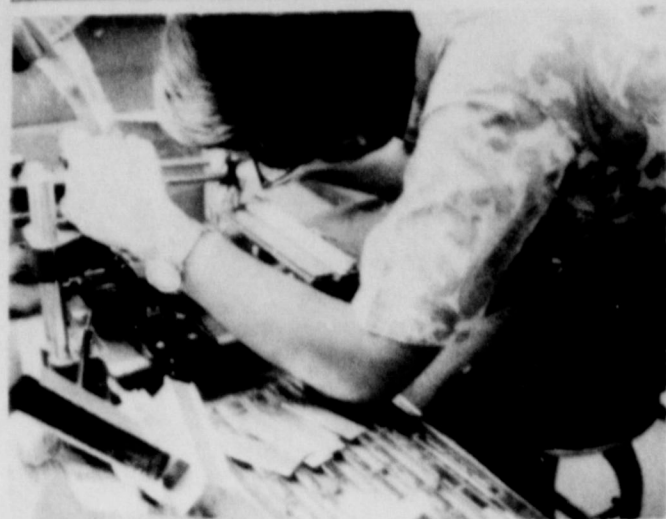

Farm and Ranch News

RAINFALL BENEFITS LATE GRAIN SORGHUM AND GRAZING CROPS

Rainfall Saturday night and Monday morning ranging from 1/2 inch to 3 1/2 inches in Knox County will be of great value to late grain sorghum and grazing crops. The heavier amounts fell in the south to southeastern part of the county. At the time of this writing on Monday afternoon the possibility of more rainfall appeared to be likely.

Cotton producers viewed the wet weather with mixed emotions. Some producers felt the dryland cotton needed rain, while many were thinking it will only bring on more boll weevils

and boll worms in the next few days.

Cotton bollweevils are fairly numerous at this time in several fields and boll worms are building up in a few fields. Cotton should be watched carefully and control applications may need to be used in some fields where they have not to date been started.

For late grain sorghum producers, it is suggested sorghum midge control be considered on all sorghum not having seed set at this time. Sorghum midge adults are quite active over the county.

WHEAT VARIETIES FOR FALL SEEDING

Wheat producers will soon be selecting varieties to plant this fall and the choice can be very important in obtaining a satisfactory yield.

The choice of variety should depend upon the producers needs. Factors influencing this choice include whether the crop is to be seeded on dryland or irrigated or in low or high fertility conditions and whether the crop is to be for grazing or grain production or a combination of the two.

Disease and insect reaction, lodging and shattering are also important considerations in selecting a variety. Quality of the grain is of utmost importance.

Texas has built up an enviable reputation for good quality wheat in recent years.

For the High and Rolling Plains, the varieties Tascosa, Caddo, Scout, Warrior, and Sturdy are first choice because of their yielding ability, high quality and good storm resistance. It should be remembered Sturdy would only be recommended for irrigated land.

Second choice for irrigated land are the Triumph strains, Crockett, Concho, and Wichita. Under dryland production, they often have good milling and baking quality but are weaker than desired under irrigation. Agronomically, they are less desirable because of weak straw or tendency to shatter.

Comparable yields over a period of years at Chillicothe show no great difference in average yields of Improved Triumph, Triumph 64, Scout, Kaw, Crockett and Caddo. Where leaf rust is a problem, Quannah can be added to the recommended varieties. Also, caddo is one of the better leaf rust resistance varieties.

VARIABILITY AND "OFF-TYPES" IN STURDY WHEAT

Variability in height and maturity, as well as distinct "off-types" in Sturdy wheat have been of concern to the originators of Sturdy, as well as to growers and the seed certifying agency, the Texas State Department of Agriculture, according to Dr. I. M. Atkins, Small Grain Section Leader, Texas A&M University. The following explanations of possible causes of variability and mixtures may help in understanding the situation.

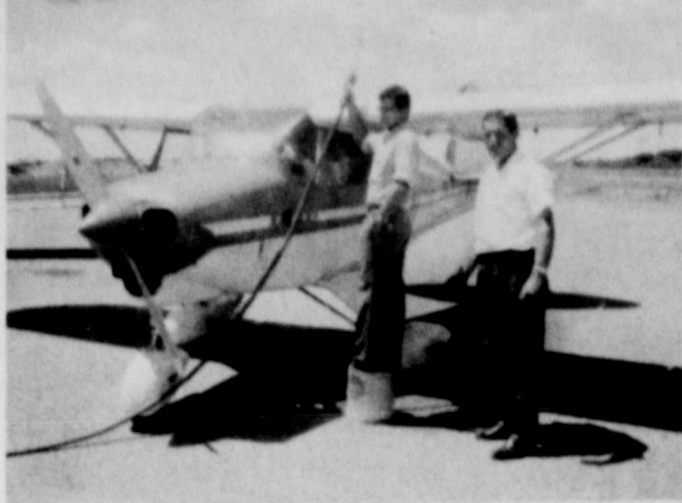
1. Plant progenies used for a new variety may not be completely uniform for characteristics such as height and maturity.

2. Environmental conditions may cause the production of shorter or taller tillers and these frequently are later in maturity.

Late tillers may be caused by late freezes, drought followed by late rains, or rains immediately after the main tillers have reached full height. Such variability can be observed in any variety if the proper environmental conditions occur. Sturdy appears to respond to such situation more than many varieties.

3. Unusual characteristics of flowering which encourage natural cross pollination and production of hybrids.

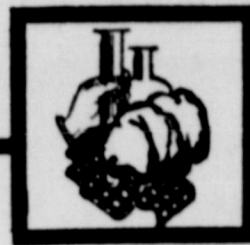

ROLLING PLAINS COTTON GROWERS INC.



Chances of Congress passing a new farm program or extending the Agricultural Act of 1965 before next year are very slim, directors of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. were advised in a meeting here last weekend.

Charles G. Bragg, RPCG vice president, spent the first four days of last week in Washington to lend representatives of other farm and producer groups whatever aid he could in persuading the House to enact legislation which would extend the life of the 1965 Act beyond 1969.

The Senate had previously voted to extend the farm bill for four years with minor changes. After two days of bitter debate, during which several congressmen from the larger cities frequently referred to farmers as "fat cats with a pipe line into the Federal treasury", a one year extension of the present program was voted after the House tacked on a \$20,000,000 payment limitation to individual producers.

In spite of advice from farm block members from both parties in the Senate and House Committees on Agriculture, that limitations are unworkable, a proposal by Republican Silver O. Conte of Boston, Mass. to limit payments to \$20,000.00 was approved by a margin of 230 to 160 votes. A \$10,000 ceiling was defeated earlier, 122 to 72, and a sliding scale of limitations was rejected 104 to 49, even though it had the approval of one of the major farm organizations, the National Farmers Union.

Since the Senate has registered a heavy vote in opposition to limitations, the Senate-House Conference Committee will be faced with a real problem if and when the bills are referred to it for arbitration, Bragg said. At last report, Rep. Findley of Illinois was blocking House efforts to refer the Bill to conference. Since Congress has adjourned for the political conventions, further action on the measure will be delayed until September at the earliest.

"Our best bet now", said Bragg, "is to fight for a simple one year extension, without limitations. Congressman

"The vote on limitations was a shocking disappointment from our standpoint", Bragg stated. "In agriculture as in manufacturing, the Nation has the capacity to produce considerably more than the market needs. While the Conte amendment will only apply directly to ten percent of our farmers, market prices almost certainly would be forced into sharp declines by oversupplies created by forcing the larger growers to produce outside the program. All farmers, regardless of size, would be injured. The limitations could lead to destruction of our farm program".

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR61)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day of each Regular Session and each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government not to exceed one round trip per month during such time as the Legislature is in session, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and

most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

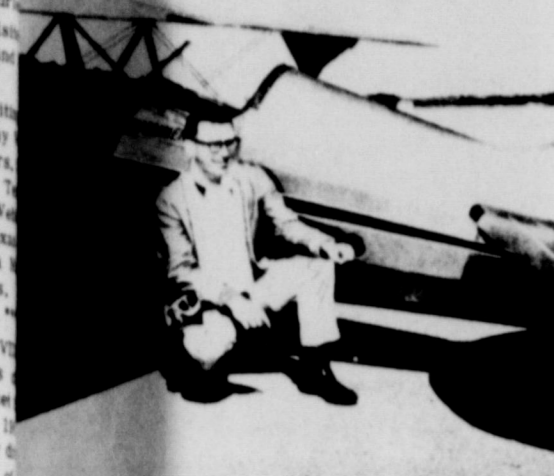

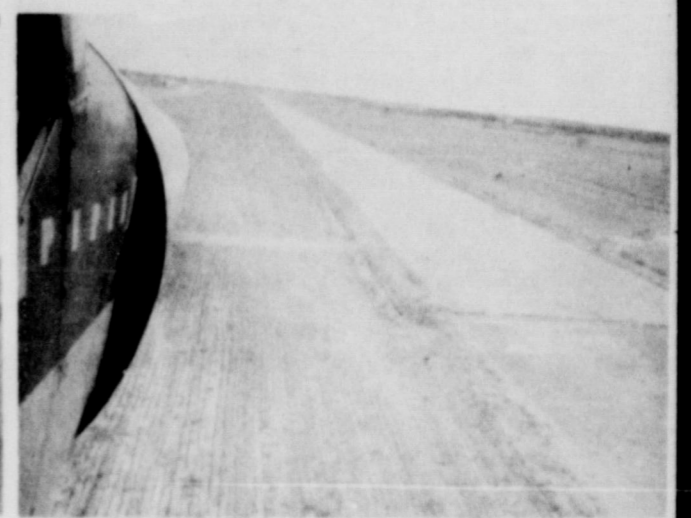

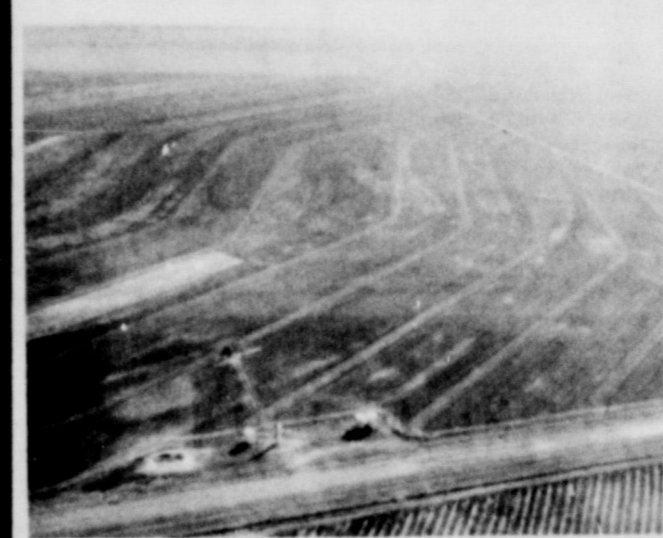
