'Hounds And Pied Pipers Of Hamlin Scrimmage Here Friday

The Knox City Greyhounds' first scrimmage was with the Aspermont Hornets last Friday night at Aspermont. The Greyhounds found the Hornets much improved over last year. It was a defensive battle with Knox City being stopped on the 7 yard line. (This was the closest either team came to the goal line).

Quarterback Joey Swain didn't suit up due to a knee injury sustained last week during workouts, but Will Whiteley did a good job of filling in for Swain during the scrimmage. Considering the switching that

had to be done, we felt that we were adequate on both offense and defense with the best playing on defense.

Philip Newton was the leading rusher with 166 yards while Joe Huff had 16 yards. Blocking up front were Danny Woodall, Stanley Newton, Cliff Ray, Rob Harrison, Bobby Reeves, and Greg Clonts. Will Whiteley went the distance as quarterback while Gary Carver substituted some for Joe Huff. Nefro Gonzales played split back until he was retired with an arm injury late in the scrimmage. Gonzales was still in some pain Monday and is a doubtful starter this Friday. Art Crowover

took his place at split back.

The KC defense started off slow but progressed during the scrimmage. The last 15 plays on defense Aspermont had a minus 40 yards. On defense were Will Whiteley at end, Rob Harrison at guard, Robert Taylor at guard, Bobby Reeves, at end Philip Newton at corner, Cliff Ray at middle linebacker, Stanley Newton at middle linebacker and Gary Carver at corner. Sept. 13 At Plant Materials Center

Plans Underway For Field Day

A field day will be held September 13 at the Knox City Plant Materials Center, State Conservationist Edward E. Thomas announced this week.

The center serves Texas and Oklahoma.

Livestockmen, seed dealers, sportsmen, and others interested in the search for improved plants are being invited to attend the field day, according to Jacob C. Garrison, manager of the local center.

Harvey Davis of Temple, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, will be the principal speaker.

New grasses, forbs, legumes and other plants under evaluation at the center will be discussed during the day. Some 1200 strains of 325 plants are being grown at the center.

Chief goal of the SCS plant materials work is to find new strains of plants that will solve specific conservation problems. Since livestock and wildlife co-exist on the same land, the search extends to grasses, legumes, forbs and shrubs which have dual values. Such plants are needed by land-owners and operators for including in range seeding mixtures, for use in travel land seedings, in border plantings or for other uses.

Strains that appear promising at Knox City are then grown and evaluated under field conditions on farms of soil and water conservation district co-operators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections that prove superior to other plants available commercially are then released by conservation districts to seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

A new grass variety, Mason sandhill lovegrass, was certified and released earlier this

year as a result of work done at the center in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Selection 75 kleingrass was released in 1968. Other grass strains proven and put into use by SCS include El Reno, Uvalde, and Vaughn sideseed; King Ranch bluestem; green sprangletop and Greenville switchgrass.

Some of the groups who cooperate with SCS in its plant materials work in Texas include Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A & M University, Prairie View A & M, Abilene Christian College, U.S. Air Force, U.S. Corps of Engineers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and soil and water conservation districts.

Ag Teachers Tour Center

Sixteen vocational agricultural instructors toured the Knox City Plant Materials Center Wednesday, August 16.

The tour was scheduled as part of the summer workshop where instructors are brought together in an effort to coordinate the study program at the various colleges. The sixteen instructors represented nine colleges in central Texas.

They expressed the opinion that the Center is a very valuable tool for implementing in teaching plant identification as well as for special use plantings. There are 1150 specimens of plants growing at the Center at this time, the majority of which are native to Texas.

Grasses, forbs legumes and woody plants are all represented, according to Jacob C. Garrison, manager of the Knox City Plant Materials Center.

NOTICE AND INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS

Date: August 31, 1972.

1. Sealed bids will be received by City of Knox City, Texas hereinafter referred to as the "Owner", for performing the work as set forth in the Plans and Specifications attached hereto for Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvements on or before 2:00 p.m., Friday September 22, 1972 in the City Hall at Knox City, Texas, at which time said bids will be publicly opened and read.

2. All bids must be made on the blank form of the Proposal attached hereto.

3. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or bidder's bond payable to the Owner for five per cent of the total amount of the bid. As soon as the bid prices have been compared, the Owner will return the check or bond of all except the three lowest responsible bidders. When the contract is awarded, checks or bonds of the two remaining unsuccessful bidders will be returned. The check or bond of the successful bidder will be retained until the contract and surety bond have been executed and approved, after which it will be returned.

4. Separate performance and payment bonds for public bodies such in the amount of 100 percent of the contract price with a surety company (corporate) approved by the Owner and the Engineer, will be required for the faithful performance of the contract, and the bidder shall state in the proposal the name and address of the surety of sureties who will sign these bonds in case the contract is awarded to him.

5. The party to whom the contract is awarded will be required forthwith to execute the contract and surety bonds within ten calendar days from the date when the written notice of award of the contract is mailed to the bidder at the address given by him. In case of failure to do so, the Owner may at his option, consider that the bidder has abandoned the contract, in which case the certified check or bidder's bond accompanying the Proposal shall become the property of the Owner.

6. The Owner reserves the right to reject any and all bids or to accept any bid. Contractors' Proposals shall hold firm for sixty days to allow the Owner to complete its financing arrangements and to secure necessary approvals for awarding contracts. Mutually agreed upon extensions of time, may be made, if necessary.

7. Before the award of the contract, any bidder may be required to furnish evidence satisfactory to the Owners and to the Engineer of the necessary facilities, ability, and pecuniary resources to fulfill the conditions of the said contract.

8. Prior to signing the contract, the Contractor shall submit on a form acceptable to the Owners and the Engineer an overall construction schedule for the project. This construction schedule shall start with the proposed date of signing the contract, and the completion date shall be the date specified in the contract.

9. Bidders must satisfy themselves by personal examination of the location of the proposed work, by examination of the Plans and Specifications and requirements of the work and the accuracy of the estimate of the quantities of the work to be done, and shall not at any time after the submission of a bid dispute or complain of such estimate nor assert that there was a misunderstanding in regard to the nature or amount of work to be done.

10. The Construction Contract and the Detailed Specifications contain the provisions required for the construction of the project. No information obtained from any officer, agent, or employee of the Owner on any such matters shall in any way affect the risk or obligation assumed by the Contractor or relieve him from fulfilling any of the conditions of the contract.

11. Proposals which are incomplete, unbalanced, conditional or obscure or which contain additions not called for, erasures, alterations, or irregularities of any kind or which do not comply with the Notice and Instructions to Bidders may be rejected.

12. A bidder may withdraw any proposal he has submitted at any time prior to the hour set for the closing of the bids provided the request for withdrawal is signed in a manner identical with the proposal being withdrawn. No withdrawal or modifications will be permitted after the hour designated for closing bids.

13. For the purpose of clarification it is understood that the work to be done will probably be financed in whole or part by means of funds secured from the Federal Government, or others. The bidder hereby agrees to comply with all requirements of the Federal agencies, or others.

14. Computations of quantities that will be the basis for pay-

ment estimates, both monthly and final will be made by the Engineer.

15. The word "Owner" means the City of Knox City, Texas. The Owner will be responsible for payment in accordance with terms of the contract. The word "Contractor" means the person, firm or corporation to whom the award is made. Subcontractors as such will not be recognized. The word "Engineer" refers to Ernest L. Andrews, P.E., Consulting Engineer, designated by the Owner as its engineering representative during the course of construction to make appropriate inspections and computations of payments.

16. Plans and Specifications may be obtained from the Engineer, Ernest L. Andrews, 2015 Santa Fe, Wichita Falls, Texas, 76099, upon a deposit of \$25.00. Full amount of deposit will be returned to bidder returning plans and specifications along with a fully qualified bid. Only one-half of the amount of the deposit will be returned to bidder returning plans and specifications if fully qualified bid is not filed.

17. Inspection trips for bidders will be arranged by the Engineer.

18. Notice of Requirement for Certification of Non-segregated Facilities; Bidders are cautioned as follows: By signing the contract for which these bids are solicited, the bidder will be deemed to have signed and agreed to the provisions of the "Certification of Non-segregated Facilities" as contained in the specifications for this project.

19. Notice to Prospective Federally Assisted Construction Contractors:

(A) A certification of Non-segregated Facilities, as required by the May 28, 1968, order (33 F.R. 7808, May 28, 1968) on Elimination of Segregated Facilities by the Secretary of Labor, must be submitted prior to the award of a Federally assisted construction contract exceeding \$10,000 which is not exempt from the provisions of the Equal Opportunity Clause.

(B) Contractors receiving Federally assisted construction contracts exceeding \$10,000 which are not exempt from the provisions of the Equal Opportunity Clause will be required to provide for the forwarding of this notice to prospective subcontractors for supplies and construction contracts where the subcontracts exceed \$10,000 and are not exempt from the provisions of the Equal Opportunity Clause.

As a result of their efforts, the community has 386 new low-cost homes and jobs and incomes are up because of the construction work. In North Carolina, citizens mounted a driver education campaign as a small but vital part of their Statewide effort to connect more rural workers with more better paying jobs.

Rural development is an idea whose time has come—mostly because increasing numbers of local groups are taking it upon themselves to make sure that it does.

Safety's Hidden Helper

In Miami, a woman sued the city for damages after her heel caught in a manhole cover. In short order, the city bought 500 new manhole covers with smaller holes.

Nonskid rug pads began to sell better in Philadelphia after a home owner was held liable to a visitor who slipped on a loose rug.

A major chemical company, concerned about possible lawsuits, reexamined hundreds of its labels and found 60% of them dangerously inadequate. All were changed for the better.



In Santa Monica, hundreds of nesting trees were chopped down because of a court ruling on liability for falling branches.

These examples illustrate the positive side of an off-maligned, oft-misunderstood social institution: the damage suit. As a spur to safety, as a stimulant to the prevention of accidents, the damage suit has an influence that would be hard to exaggerate.

True, only a limited number of individuals or companies ever face the ordeal of actually defending themselves in court. But the effect of these cases is enormously multiplied by the legal doctrine of "precedent."

According to this doctrine, each case sets a standard of behavior which will apply, in varying degree, whenever a similar situation arises again. Each finding of liability is a warning to one and all that similar conduct in the future may well result in similar liability.

Of course, the damage suit (like many valuable institutions) can have unfortunate side effects. A playground director, nervous about the possibility of being sued, removed every swing, slide, and carousel from the premises. Doctors, fearful of malpractice claims, may "play safe" by avoiding the use of new treatments which their professional judgment would approve.

But such things do not change the basic virtue of the damage suit: the subtle, steady pressure it exerts toward careful conduct.

When a gaffer behind you halts "Fore!", he may be motivated by a sense of etiquette. Or he may be motivated by simple kindness. But he may also be motivated—very powerfully—by visions of winding up at the target end of a lawsuit.

In the girls department the still-popular layered look will emerge in knit dresses, cuffed pants, stretch bodysuits, pleated or flared skirts, tops and sweaters—including twin sweater sets, Mrs. Carmichael predicted.

"Skirts will be mostly knee-length or ankle-length with a generous sprinkling of culotte style shorts. Pants will feature turned up cuffs, flares and modified bell bottoms," she said.

In the boys aisle, jean styling will remain the top favorite, but fabrics and special treatments will vary widely, with corduroy and denim remaining popular, the home demonstration agent noted.

"Knits and stretch wovens will make inroads, because they're sleek, allow body movement and snap back to shape after laundering," she said.

Mrs. Carmichael referred to fall shirt fashions for boys as still highly patterned—often coupled with solid pants as a complement.

"Knit sport shirts reflect the classic, long-sleeved, front-button collar trends, cotton, polyester and blends feature geometric patterns, animal motifs and leaf prints. Plaids show up in denim work shirts, western and lumberjack styles with wide appeal to boys," she explained.

Advising shoppers to mix and match fashions for fall, Mrs. Carmichael added, "Shop carefully for the most mix-ability and machine wash-and-dry ability."
