Others listed are soft red winter, hard red spring, durum and white wheat varieties.

These 23 varieties were designated as undesirable by the Agricultural Research Service after consultation with state agricultural experiment personnel, agrono mists, cereal chemists and others on state and Federal staffs.

#### Farm and Ranch Notes By Roy England, County Agent

Luther S. Bird and C. D. Ranney, plant pathologists from the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, companied by Herbert Partridge pepper-cheese-onion salad, sliced and the county agent, made a tour of the irrigated fields of Knox County on Sunday, Sept. 9.

The pathologists were searching for diseases that commonly follow n the wake of irrigated cotton. In the area southwest of Munday, disease known as verticillium wilt was isolated. This fungus causes cotton to slowly wilt and die, unlike cotton root rot whih causes

a rapid dying of the plant.

This wilt disease will tend to become more prevalent as we continue to grow cotton under irrigation, and only through a program of crop rotation can we hope to control it. This is also true in respect to cotton root rot, which is increasing rapidly in our irrigated Mansfield, reporter. sections. Planting of small grains and grain sorghums in the rotation plan are effective because these plants are entirely resistant to the disease and offer no food for the bacteria to feed on.



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


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
