KC Chief Home From Fire School

Knox City Fire Chief A.T. Drew Holcomb was among approximately 1400 men from Texas and several other states who attended the 43rd annual Texas Firemen's Training School July 16-21 at Texas A&M University.

The school is conducted by the Engineering Extension Service cooperating with Texas Education Agency and sponsored by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association.

Over 500 highly qualified and experienced instructors and speakers are made available by municipalities, industries, manufacturers, state and federal agencies, and the armed services for the annual school. Equipment and supplies are loaned or donated for this intensive and practical training program.

Mr. Holcomb, owner and operator of Holcomb's Garage takes time away from his business each year to attend the training program as credit is allowed in the city key rate based upon the successful completion of the necessary Fireman (not fire marshal) completes the work, a three percent credit is allowed.

New Vocational Program Added To KC Curriculum

Classes in Home Economics Cooperative Education are the most current addition to Knox City High School curriculum, according to a recent announcement by Superintendent W.R. Baker.

These classes afford students of Junior and Senior standing both on-the-job and classroom education in a variety of occupations. Practical work experience is provided the student through part-time employment at some cooperating business within the city.

The course is set up for one or two years and carries two credits each year. Students receive pay comparable to that paid beginning workers in the same occupation.

The program will operate under the direction of Mrs. Vera Newton, teacher coordinator. Mrs. Newton will be responsible for selection and placement of students and will correlate their classroom and practical education. An advisory committee of local business people will be set up by the school to assist Mrs. Newton in organizing and operating the new program.

The addition of this type of program will do much to provide the youth of Knox City with a well-rounded educational program that will fulfill the need for practical and useful training.

It is hoped it will enable a large portion of our students who desire to become occupationally competent to enter full-time employment upon graduation from high school.

Mrs. Newton was in Austin last week attending a related workshop in preparation for the new course.



Seymour Resident Is Man Of Year In Agriculture

Thomas E. Craddock, landowner and lifetime resident of Seymour in Baylor County, has been named a "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture" for 1972 by the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association.

Nominated by the county agents of District 3 of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Craddock is one of seven Texans selected for the honor.

Each year the awards are presented to outstanding leaders in agriculture and related industries, explained Wichita County Agent B.T. Hawx, president of the state association. The awards also recognize contributions in improving levels of living and in boosting the economy of communities, counties, the state and the nation.

Craddock will receive his award during the association's annual meeting, August 6-8, at the Hilton Inn in El Paso.

"As manager of the B-K Electric Cooperative, Inc., which serves Baylor, Knox and Haskell Counties, Craddock has spent much of his adult life in service to farm families, furnishing them electricity to improve the standard of living in rural areas," Baylor County agent Lowell B. Cure said.

Craddock supports all phases of agriculture and programs of the Extension Service. He was instrumental in sponsoring the 4-H hill board recognition throughout the state. He has contributed financial support to the Rolling Plains Economic Program, an expansion program designed to boost the total economy of the Rolling Plains area.




