Cautious When Buying A Home

guaranteed by the Veterans Administration are advised by the VA to be cautious about getting involved in "side deals" or "tie-in-sales" as a condition to purchasing a home.

There have been cases in which veterans have been requested or even required to purchase items of furniture or other merchandise. These are paid for in cash and not from the proceeds of the loan guaranteed or insured by the VA. In some cases the items have been so overpriced as to constitute additional consideration for the purchase of a home.

Sometimes these offers are legitimate and benefit the veteran, and the VA has no objection to such purchases so long as they are not paid for with the proceeds of the loan.

In any case where the seller and purchaser have entered into a "side arrangement" or "tiein-sale" involving personal property to evade the GI statutory requirement that the purchase price of the home not be in excess of the reasonable value established by the VA appraisal, the VA is required to investigate the matter thoroughly.

In cases where a "side deal" or "tie-in-sale" appears to be involved, details must be revealed to the VA, which refore approving a loan.

Total U. S. production of cotton for 1967 has been estimated at 7,618,000 bales by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, according to Charles Bragg, executive vice president of RPCG,

Texas' crop has been placed at 2,067,000 bales compared to 2,759,188 bales a year ago. The current U. S. crop compares with 9,575,000 bales last year and 14,935,000-bale average for 1961-65, as stated by Mr. Bragg.

"Adverse weather conditions throughout West Texas, as well as the entire South, are largely responsible for the reduced per-acre yields," said Bragg. "Payments offered by the government for idling cotton land is another reason for the short 1967 crop.





But everyone knows how fast he normally drives a car!

We are told that walking will not reduce a person, but will keep the pounds from coming on, and keep them from coming back once they have been lost by other means. A normal brisk walk of a mile or two does not make the walker hungry, and it is an observable truth that habitual walkers are characteristically not over-

It has been recorded that a fairly long stride, at a fairly rapid pace, puts less weight on the feet, and is easier and less tiring than a slow walking speed. This is a difficult art to practice on crowded city streets, although it is estimated that city people, because of their "extra steps" up and down curbs, around sidewalk obstacles, to avoid bumping people, to beat traffic lights, actually walk more than country people do, although not as

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING WEEDS AND GRASS TO BE CUT UPON PREMISES AND THAT RUBBISH AND TRASH BE RE-MOVED THEREFROM; AND FIXING A PENALTY FOR FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH SUCH ORDINANCE, AND PRO-VIDING THAT SAME SHALL BE DONE BY THE CITY IN THE EVENT OF SUCH FAILURE AND PROVIDING FOR THE FIXING OF A LIEN UPON THE PROPERTY FOR THE EX-PENSE INCURRED IN REMOV-ING AND DECLARING THAT ALLOWING WEEDS TO GROW AND TRASH AND RUBBISH TO ACCUMULATE TO BE A NUI-

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KNOX CITY, TEXAS:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any owner, lessee, occupant or any person in charge of any premises in the City of Knox City to allow weeds to grow upon the premises, or trash or rubbish to accumulate upon said premises to such an extent as is reasonably calculated to create a fire hazard or calculated to become injurious to the health of the citizens of Knox City, and either act is hereby declared to constitute a public nuisance.

Section 2. Whenever weeds are allowed to grow, or trash or rubbish allowed to accumulate upon any premises of the City of Knox City as prohibited by this ordinance the Board of Commissioners shall hear evidence and determine whether or not such accumulation of rubbish and trash or the growth of weeds thereon, or both, are sufficient to constitute a nuisance as herein defined, and if they so find, they shall pass a resolution declaring that the growth of weeds accumulation of trash rubbish upon such premises, or both, constitutes a public nuisance, and shall order same removed by the owner,

Section 3. In the event the owner of the premises upon which is located a nuisance as prohibited by this ordinance can not be found or served with notice, and there does not appear to be any person of such premises or occupancy, or in the event the nuisance is not abated by cutting the weeds and removing the trash and rubbish or either of them, as the case may be, then said nuisance shall be abated by the City of Knox City, and the expense incurred, which shall include salary and wages of all employees, and reasonable charge for machinery and tools, vehicles, etc., used in abating said nuisance shall be a personal charge against owner of said premises and shall be assessed as a lien against the property on which such nuisance is located and removed therefrom, and shall be due and payable to the City Tax Collector the following tax paying period, that is, the first day of March following the date at which such nuisance is abated and failure to pay when due shall cause a ten per cent penalty to be added and same shall bear interest from the date the same is due, at the rate of six per cent per annum.

Section 4. Failure to cut weeds and remove trash and rubbish or to do either of them when notified to do so, as set out in this ordinance by any party obligated to do so by this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50.00) and each day that such nuisance shall continue after the time for abatement as herein set out shall constitute a separate of-
