Second Dose of Toxic Given

Knox County Ranks Second In State

Wednesday morning the second dose of toxid was given to near seventy five children of Knox City by the county health officer and nurses. The small pox serum was also given to nineteen children.

Doctor Slover, Miss Celso Moore of Austin and Miss Susie Durden, the district nurse, were present and in charge of the work. Doctor Stover states that Knox County ranks second in the state in the carrying on of the state wide health program. This record, however, is only typical of the type of cooperation and progressiveness of Knox county.

It was also stated by Dr. Stover that between the dates of July the first and fifth, the exact date to be announced later, that he and the nurses would be again in Knox City to administer the antitoxin for Diphtheria and Typhoid and that all ages would be included. At this date any vaccine will be given the antitoxin.

Bob Edwards' standing crops and Mrs. Brock's standing crops are here this improvement of the year. Mrs. H. H. Schoffelmayer, Mr. E. 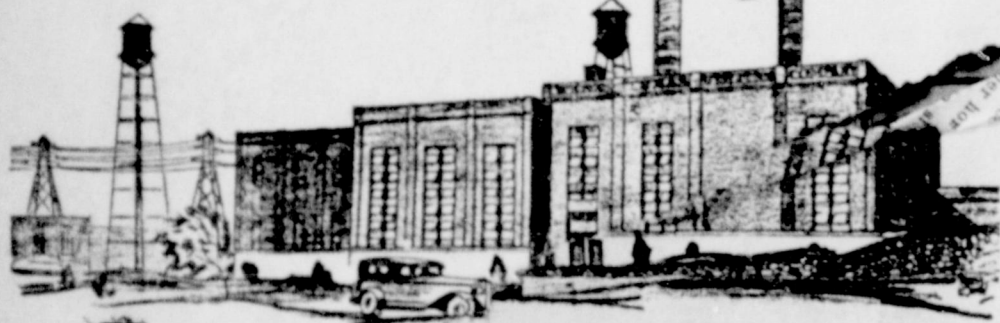

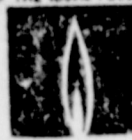

WOMEN OF KNOX AND DAWSON COUNTIES WIN ROOM CONTEST

District winners in the fourth state wide improved living room contest have been announced by Mrs. Bernice Claytor home improvement specialist in the Extension Service, Texas A. & M. College and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The contest is conducted annually by the home demonstration agents of Texas in cooperation with the Semi-Weekly Farm News, a Dallas farm publication. The contest this year involved 873 farm women in 86 counties. At least ten times that number of neighbors made partial improvements. Judging was by home demonstration agents who exchanged districts for judging.

Winners of District 2 (Northwest Texas) were: Class 1—First, Mrs. I. T. Wright, Benjamin, Knox County; second, Mrs. J. O. McCluer, Loving, Young County; third, Mrs. Russell Morrie, Seymour, Baymor County. Class 2—First, Mrs. J. H. Adkins, Lamesa, Dawson County; second, Mrs. W. E. Logan, Amherst, Lamb County; third, Mrs. Lynn Martin, Ivan, Stephens County.

Class one included those making improvements that cost less than \$50; class two, in excess of that amount. First place district winners in each class will be judged during the next few weeks by Miss Mildred Horton, state home demonstration agent, for announcement of state winners at the Farmers Short Course at A. & M., July 27 to August 1. District and state prizes are given by the Semi-Weekly Farm News.

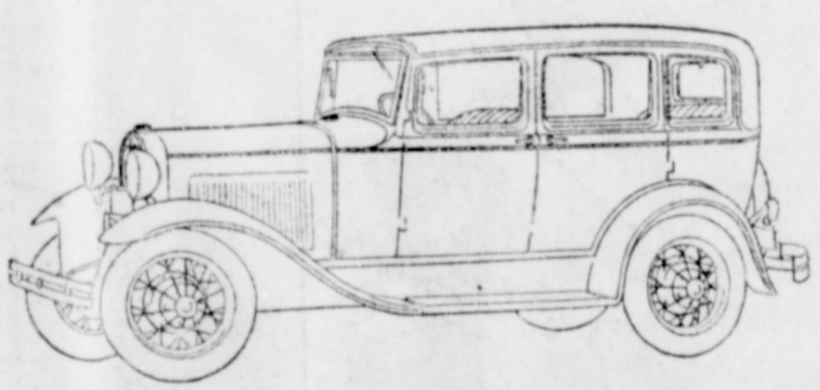

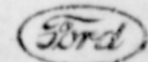
