The project will consist of twenty apartments laid out in horseshoe shape, with 12 units facing east, four north and four south. The open side of the horseshoe will be to the east. Each of the units will have floor space 16 feet by 24 feet, with a bath, kitchenette and ample closet space. The living room-bedroom in each unit will be 16'x16'. The baths will be of masonry tile, and Mr. Tank-
