Former Resident Dies While Working On Drilling Rig

Funeral services were held in Quannah Monday at 3 p. m. for P. L. (Tommy) Tomlin, 37, former Knox City man who died Friday while working on an oil well drilling rig near Lovington, N. M.

Rites were held at the Quannah Baptist Church with Rev. Norman, pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. Carl Rea of Snyder. Masonic burial services were held at the Quannah Cemetery.

Attending the funeral from Knox City were Mr. and Mrs. John Lewis, Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Wheeler and Mrs. E. L. Florence.

Tomlin, who was living in Hobbs, was working as derrickman on the rig when he was stricken, and died a few minutes after he was lowered to the derrick floor by fellow crewmen, shortly before midnight Friday.

Crewmen told of first becoming aware that something had happened to the derrickman when the driller sent up blocks for Tomlin to latch on to a stand of drill pipe. A prolonged delay came with no move on the part of Tomlin to attach the elevators to the pipe and the driller walked out on the catwalk and looked up. He saw Tomlin's body slumped over the platform from which the derrickman works in the rig.

Two crewmen went up and found Tomlin still alive, but he died before a doctor could arrive from Lovington.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Edna Tomlin; a daughter, Patsy, 2; one son, Frankie Lee, 15, of San Antonio; his mother, Mrs. J. A. Bynum of Quannah; two brothers, A. S. Tomlin of Houston and James Tomlin of Quannah; a sister, Mrs. F. P. Williams of Quannah; a half-brother, John J. Moore of Quannah; a step-daughter, Mrs. Coy Hewitt of Knox City; and a step-son, Jerry D. Beasley, a member of the Armed Forces in Hawaii.

Racial Referendum to Be On County Ballot

The racial referendum will be on the Democratic primary ballot in Knox County as ordered by the state Democratic Executive Committee, it was announced this week by Leroy Melton of Benjamin, Knox County Democratic Chairman.

At least three Texas counties have said the referendum will not be included on the ballot, and Democratic committeemen in the counties have been threatened with legal action.

Petitions calling for the referendum—purpose of which is to allow voters to express their wishes—were signed by 153,868 persons. Some of the petitions were circulated in Knox County. The

state committee ordered the referendum placed on the ballot, noting that such action is mandatory on demand of 10 percent of the qualified voters of the party.

The questions in the referendum are:

1. Repeal of the compulsory school attendance laws when white and Negro children are mixed in the public schools.
2. Perfection of the state law barring intermarriage between Negroes and whites.
3. Use of interposition to "halt illegal federal encroachment" on states' rights.

Melton said absentee voting in the primary will begin July 8. Application for absentee voting must be made through the county clerk.

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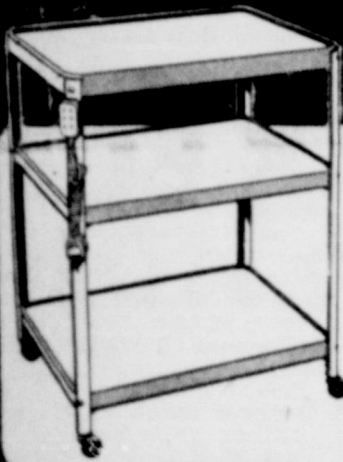

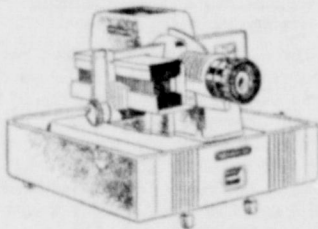

Terms of Acreage Reserve Program

allotment for winter wheat and certifies that this was done because of adverse weather conditions; or
3. He has complied with his farm allotment for a particular crop, but an acreage of the crop was not harvested because of destruction by natural causes.
Maximum and minimum acreages of the basic crops which may be placed in the Acreage Reserve have been established as follows (except that where the allotment is less than the specified acreage minimum or maximum, the total allotment shall be considered the minimum or the maximum):
For wheat the maximum is the larger of half the wheat allotment or 50 acres. The minimum is the larger of 10 percent of the allotment or 5 acres.
For cotton the maximum is the larger of half the allotment or 10 acres. The minimum is the larger of 10 percent of the allotment or 1 acre.

Payments Listed

The payment which a farmer may earn for participating in the Acreage Reserve will be determined by multiplying a base unit rate by a yield factor. The national average rates for 1956 crops are: Cotton, 15 cents per pound; wheat, \$1.20 per bushel.
The payments will be determined as follows:
For underplanting 1956 wheat, because of adverse weather, the payment will be \$4 per acre.
For destruction due to natural causes or for plowing or otherwise physically incorporating the crop into the soil, or for clipping, mowing or cutting the crop, the payment will be based on the smaller of an appraised yield for the field or the normal yield for the farm, but will not be less than \$5 per acre.
Provisions of the Conservation Reserve part of the Soil Bank will be announced as soon as practical. Under this part of the program a farmer will be able to earn two types of payment—an annual payment to help compensate for income he would have received if the reserved land had been in crop, and a payment representing a percentage of the cost establishing conservation practices on the land.
The same acreage on a farm may not be included under both the Acreage Reserve and the Conservation Reserve.
