



New City Well Being Completed

A new city well was expected to be put into operation sometime today, and city officials hope it will help relieve the late-afternoon water pressure troubles.

Located east of the hospital on the same block with another city well and the 200,000 gallon concrete reservoir, the well is a "good three-incher" which will pump 150 gallons per minute, and may improve, according to the driller. It is on the northeast corner of the block from the other well, which is a four-inch well.

Water Witcher E. Q. Warren, who spotted the well for the city, says the two wells are pumping from separate streams of water, according to Mayor Barney Arnold.
