## School Board Sets Dates For Start of 1955-56 Term

Friday, September 2, was officially set as the first day of the 1955-56 term by members of the Knox City School Board in a regular meeting Thursday night, Aug. 4. Supt. Chas. E. Silk announced this week.

Registration will begin Wednesday, August 31, at 8:30 a. m. and continue through Thursday, Sept. 1. Friday morning the school buses will make their regular routes and lunch will be served in the school lunch room.

Seniors will register Wednesday

morning, August 31, beginning at 8:30. High school juniors will register that afternoon, beginning at 1:30.

Thursday, Sept. 1, high school sophomores will begin registering at 8:30 a. m. and members of the freshman class will begin at 1:30 p. m.

Elementary pupils will not report until Friday morning, Sept. 2, and a full day of school will be held.

All beginning students, those 6 years old on or before Sept. 1, were reminded by the superintendent to bring their birth certificates with them the first day. The certificates will be returned. They must also have a doctor's certificate showing successful vaccination for smallpox, diphtheria, or Shick test.

The first general faculty meeting will be held Tuesday morning, August 30 at 9 o'clock. The principals will announce meetings for the elementary school teachers and the high school teachers.

The faculty is complete except for a science and math teacher in high school, Supt. Silk said. Mrs. Fuller Shannon was employed as an elementary teacher at Thursday night's meeting, filling a vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. Erma Liles of Weinert.

Assignments of the teachers will be made by the superintendent and announced in next week's Herald.

## McGee-Ward School To Begin Monday

The McGee-Ward School, Knox City colored school, will begin next Monday, August 15, Supt. Chas. E. Silk announced Wednesday. School will be dismissed later in the year so the pupils can work in the cotton harvest.

Principal and teacher will be Joseph C. Todd, graduate of Texas College, Tyler, and now working on his master's degree at Prairie View A & M. His major is elementary supervision education. He is 38 years old, married, and a veteran of five years military service. His home is in Rusk, Texas, where he taught two years in a veterans' school. He also served as regular substitute teacher in the Rusk school district.

Mrs. Exelena Williams of Sweetwater will be another teacher in the school. She is a graduate of Butler College, with an elementary education major. She taught five years at Centerville in the primary grades. Her husband is founder and pastor of the Mt. Rose Baptist Church in Sweetwater and recently held a meeting in Knox City. Mrs. Williams comes from a family of teachers, with two sisters and two brothers now in the teaching profession.

The new teachers replace Mrs. Mozelle Outley, principal, and Mrs. Talley.

Preparation for the opening of McGee-Ward will begin tomorrow (Friday) when the new teachers arrive.

## Benjamin Awards 3 Contracts for Water Project

Residents of Benjamin are one step nearer having a bountiful supply of cool, clear water.

Three contracts totaling \$100,173.36 were awarded Tuesday night by the Knox County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, in connection with obtaining municipal water from a well on the Ted Hertel farm, eight miles southeast of Benjamin.

Walter Ellerd of Lubbock was awarded the contract to furnish 49,500 feet of water line and all accessories, on his low bid of \$88,758.98. The line will be made of asbestos cement pipe.

Baker Tank Co. of Arp, Texas, was awarded the contract to furnish welded steel ground storage tanks on a low bid of \$2,728.82.

Clowe and Cowan, Inc., of Lubbock received the contract for the well pumping equipment, on a low bid of \$3,975 turned in by Lane Wells, Inc., for drilling the well was turned down. This was the only bid submitted for drilling the well, and board members felt something could be worked out in regard to the bid.

Freese and Nichols of Ft. Worth, engineering firm for the project, was represented at the meeting by J. C. Sells, engineer in charge.

Work is scheduled to begin in the next 30 days and to be completed in about 60 working days. Plans call for the water to be pumped from the well to tanks at the Benjamin city lake, and pumped into town with facilities existing at the lake.

## Pilot Killed in Crop-Duster Crash Near O'Brien



This charred skeleton was all that remained of the crop-dusting plane that crashed early Tuesday on the Elmo Stephens farm near O'Brien. The crash took the life of the pilot, Carl Edward Clymer.

Carl Edward Clymer, 30, was killed early Tuesday morning when the light plane he was piloting failed to clear an electric line on the approach to a cotton field.

The crash occurred on the Elmo Stephens farm about two miles southeast of O'Brien. Clymer had made his turn and was approaching the field for another run when he hit the wire. Other pilots theorized that he failed to see the wire in the early-morning light.

Clymer was thrown from the plane which crashed and burned. He died shortly after arriving at the Knox County Hospital.

Clymer, whose home was at 4519 Denley Drive, Dallas, where he was reared, had been living in Knox City the past three weeks. He had two planes, an Aeronca duster and an Aeronca sprayer, under contract from Roy E. Taylor. He received his pilot's license in 1942, and began his crop-dusting career in Knox City three years ago. One of the first fields he dusted in this area was the field in which he crashed Tuesday.

During winters, Clymer worked as a house painter for W. C. Surritt, Jr., a Dallas contractor.

Survivors are his wife, the former Josie Lee Way, a son, Carl Edward Jr., 10, and his father, W. B. Clymer, all of 4519 Denley Drive, Dallas; and a sister, Mrs. Lorene Bales of McKinney.

Funeral services were to be held at 2:00 p. m. today at Lamar-Smith Funeral Chapel, 800 Jefferson, Dallas. It was suggested that in lieu of flowers, friends send contributions to an educational fund for the pilot's son.

## Football Game Is Scheduled for 1st Day of School

Football season for the Knox City Greyhounds will get off to an early start this year. Their first practice game is scheduled for Friday night, Sept. 2—the opening day of the 1955-56 school term.

Training will begin August 22, and Coach Les Cowan expects about forty boys to be out for practice.

There will be two work-out periods a day, in the early morning and early evening.

Coach Cowan reports that the athletic field is in good condition. The first game will be with Trent, and will be played on the local field. This will be the first time the two teams have met.

September 9 is an open date. On Sept. 15 the 'Hounds will go to Stamford for their annual game with the Stamford B team.

The Greyhounds' Sept. 23 opponents will be Hermleigh, last year's regional champions. After an open date on Sept. 30 they will meet Newcastle on Oct. 7. Newcastle was a finalist in its region last year.

Both the Hermleigh and Newcastle games will be played on the local field.

On October 14 the Greyhounds will play Moran at Moran, and on Oct. 21 they will be hosts to Strawn, second in its district to Baird last year.

The first two district games will be with Aspermont at Aspermont, October 28, and with Rule at Rule on November 4.

The 'Hounds will be hosts to the Rochester Steers in their annual Armistice Day contest, November 11.

The season will end with the November 18 game with Lueders, also on the local field.

## First 1955 Cotton Ginned In Knox City and O'Brien

The first bale of 1955 cotton harvested in the Knox City area was brought in Monday morning by Russell Boyd.

Boyd also ginned the premium bale here in 1953.

The 2200 pound bale, ginned at Paymaster Gin, turned out 520 pounds of lint cotton and 900 pounds of seed. The cotton was planted in April on the Dick Varnell place east of town.

Gin manager E. R. Carpenter said the bale was the first reported in Knox County.

Carpenter purchased Boyd's cotton at 35 cents per pound.

The O'Brien Gin received its first bale Monday afternoon, according to Bert Davis, manager.

Grown by M. L. Verhalen on his farm northeast of Knox City, the 1980 pound bale ginned out 488 pounds of lint cotton, which was purchased by the O'Brien Gin at 33.75 cents a pound. The cotton graded middling 15 1/16.

Verhalen's cotton was planted on April 21. The bale was ginned at 2:00 p. m. Monday and may have been the first ginned in Haskell County.

Both Boyd and Verhalen had their cotton ginned free and will receive other premiums for producing the first bales.
