## Cyclethon Set For Saturday

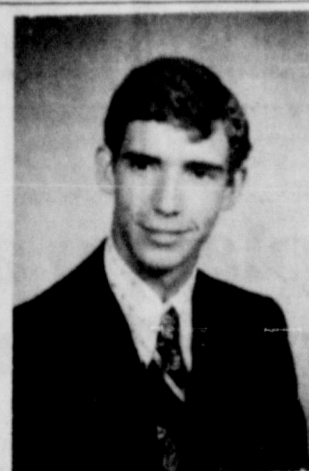

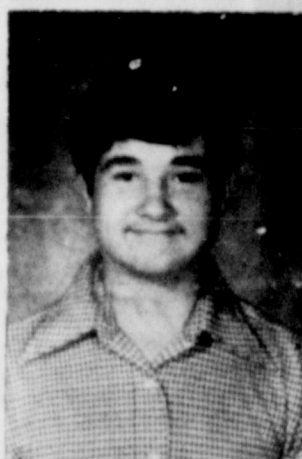

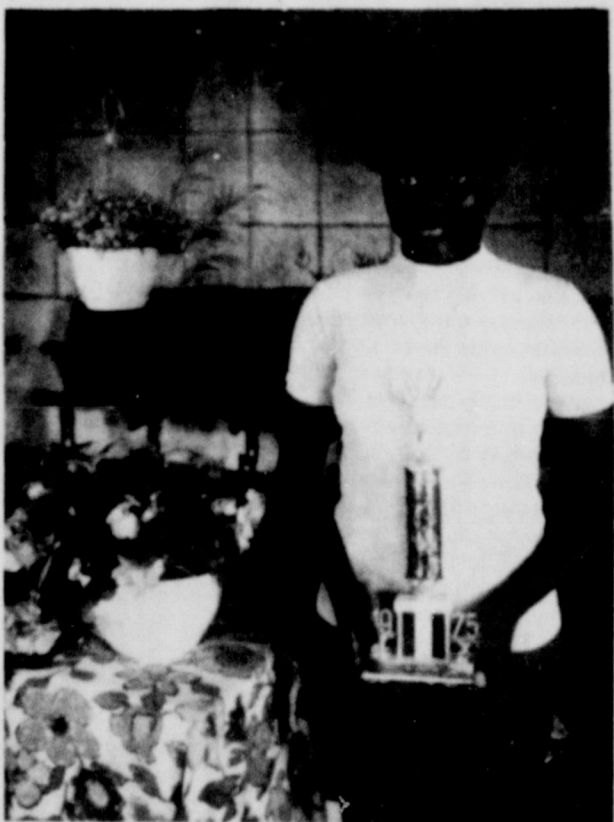

Garbage and trash mixed with water or other liquids must be drained thoroughly before being put in containers. All garbage subject to decomposition must be bagged or wrapped in paper before being deposited in garbage containers.

Dogs, cats, or other dead animals shall not be placed in garbage containers.

Chicken or fish remains must not be put in containers unless properly bagged.

If any garbage should spill into the container, it should be washed out and aired for sanitary reasons.

Unless rules are complied with, garbage will not be picked up.

A schedule for the pickup of all trash which is not household garbage will remain as near the first and fifteenth of each month as possible.

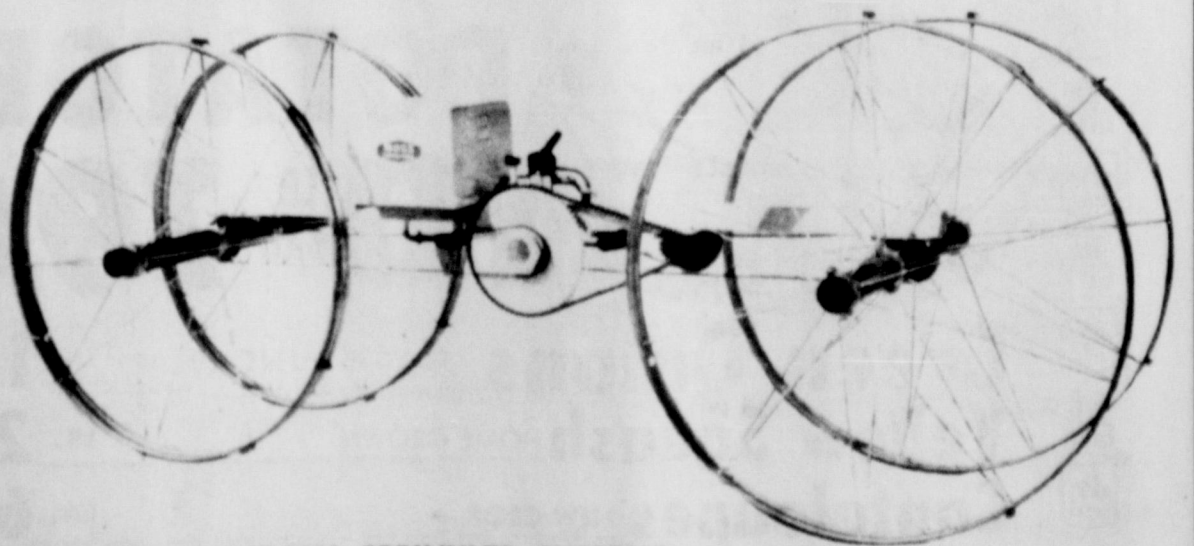

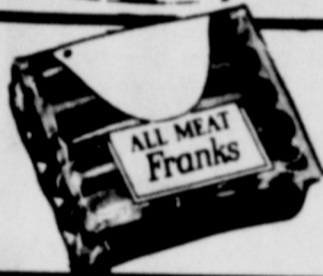
