Final Rites for Mrs. A. L. Lea

Funeral services for Mrs. A. L. Lea, 86, were held at the First Methodist church Wednesday at 2:30 p.m. with Rev. Walter Driver, pastor of the church, and Elder E. J. Norman, Primitive Baptist minister of Childress, officiating.

Mrs. Lea, known throughout Knox county as "Aunt Kate," died at 4:15 p.m. Tuesday after a long illness.

She was born Dec. 19, 1869 in Springtown in Parker county. She had lived 3 miles west of Knox City since 1900 and had made her home with her son, Ulric, for a number of years. Mrs. Lea had been bedfast for four years.

She married June 17, 1889 in Springtown and moved to Benjamin in that same year. Mr. Lea died in 1940 and two sons preceded her in death.

Survivors include her son, four grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

Interment was in the Knox City cemetery under the direction of Warren Funeral Home.

Counties represented in the committee are Knox, Haskell, Baylor and Stonewall. Committee chairman is S. N. Reed of Knox City, and W. L. Collins of Knox City is secretary. The survey was originated by the local Board of Commerce, it was stated.

The local play will be presented at an assembly program April 5, at 8:35 a.m.

Lincoln Bolin Asks Re-Election to Office of Public Weigher

Lincoln Bolin this week authorized the Herald to announce his candidacy for re-election to the office of Public Weigher, Precinct No. 5, Knox County.

"I will try to see every voter in the precinct before the primary election," he added, "but in the meantime I ask you to consider this a personal solicitation of your vote and support."

Sam Johnston to Seek Election as Weigher at O'Brien

Sam Johnston, long-time resident of the O'Brien community, this week announced his candidacy for Public Weigher of Precinct No. 7, Haskell County.

In announcing his candidacy Johnston said, "I have decided to make the race for this office due to the request of a number of my friends. As many of you know I was an unsuccessful candidate for the office four years ago but when I finished high school my class motto was 'If at first you don't succeed, try again'."

The public weigher's office is a good job, and the public weigher this year will be elected for a four-year term beginning next January. If you see fit to elect me, I pledge myself to step aside at the end of the four-year term and let someone else have the office.

"I will try to see every voter in the precinct before time for the Democratic primary," he continued, "but in the meantime I solicit your support and assure you I will sincerely appreciate any consideration you may give me."

Voters to Name Three Aldermen on April 3

Knox Citizens will elect three city aldermen from a field of five candidates in the regular city election next Tuesday, April 3.

Balloting will be at the American Legion hall. Election officials will be C. C. Hoge, presiding judge, E. L. Park, judge, and Porter Lowrey and B. B. Cochran, clerks.

Candidates include Z. E. Cone and E. R. Carpenter, incumbents whose terms are expiring. G. W. Coats, third alderman whose term expires, did not seek re-election.

Holdover officials are Barney Arnold, mayor, and Otis Cash and Russell Boyd, aldermen.

Cone, local manager for Ser-

vice Pipeline Co., and Carpenter, farmer and ginmer, have each served one year as alderman. They went into office last April when a full slate of city officials was elected, and drew one-year terms.

Other candidates seeking the offices are Eddie Carr, owner of a local cleaning plant, Doyle Graham, electrician, and Buddy Angle, farmer. Graham and Angle previously served as city commissioners, were appointed aldermen when the city government was changed to the aldermanic form, and served until the election last year.

On the ballot Tuesday, the candidates names will be placed in the order that they filed for office: Cone, Carpenter, Angle, Graham and Carr.

Every qualified voter in the city is urged to vote in the election Tuesday.

Six File for Trustee

In the school trustee election scheduled for Saturday, April 7, voters in the Knox City district will choose three trustees from a slate of six candidates, Horace Finley, school board secretary, said Wednesday.

Candidates are Finley and Lloyd Waldrip, incumbents, and Mat Verhalen, Robert L. Bailey, Clyde Voss and Bobby Burnett.

In the county trustee election, which will be held at the same time but on a separate ballot, Sam Leaverton of Benjamin is a candidate for re-election as county trustee-at-large.

County board members will be named in other precincts in the county. In Precinct 4, Munday and Goree, J. E. Cure is a candidate for re-election, and in Precinct 2, Benjamin and Vera, Gaylon Scott and Ernest Beck Jr. are candidates.

New Golfers Club is Named Lake Creek

A new name has been chosen for the Knox City-Munday merged golf and country clubs. The name is Lake Creek Golf Club.

Joe Averitt and Chad Wilson are Knox City directors while Winston Blacklock and J. D. Gillespie represent Munday.

Haskell has been invited to join the club and by-laws have been adopted by the directors, Averitt said.

He also emphasized that Knox City members have until April 1 to notify either of the two local directors if they wish to continue their membership. However, since April 1 is Sunday, Monday will be the last day. Some 38 Knox Citizens have been signed, he noted.

Tax Office Open All Day Saturday

The Knox County tax assessor-collector's office will remain open Saturday of this week until 5 p. m. in order that motor vehicle owners may purchase 1956 license plates on that date.

April 1 is deadline for purchase of the new plates, but due to the fact that it falls on Sunday local police officers, sheriff's department and the state highway patrol will allow one day's grace to residents of the county, giving them through Monday, April 2, to purchase and attach new tags.

It is emphasized, however, that you must drive within the county limits and be a resident of Knox county in order to have this extra day. After April 2 all local, county and state officers will start rounding up drivers who do not have 1956 plates, it was stated.

M. A. Bumpas Jr., county tax assessor-collector, stated that with approximately 2600 vehicles registered in the county, "we still have a long way to go."

Some 250 sets of tags were delivered to purchasers early this week, leaving about 1400 to go.

Quite a line will be facing late purchasers and some will, no doubt, be forced to pay a penalty for not obtaining licenses before the deadline, and quite possibly a fine added to the penalty, officials said.

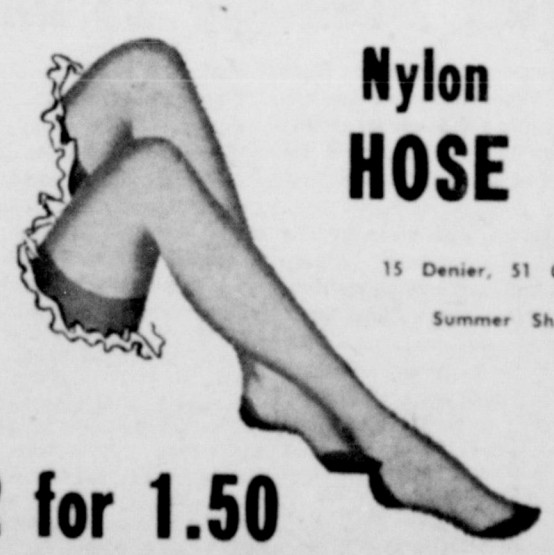

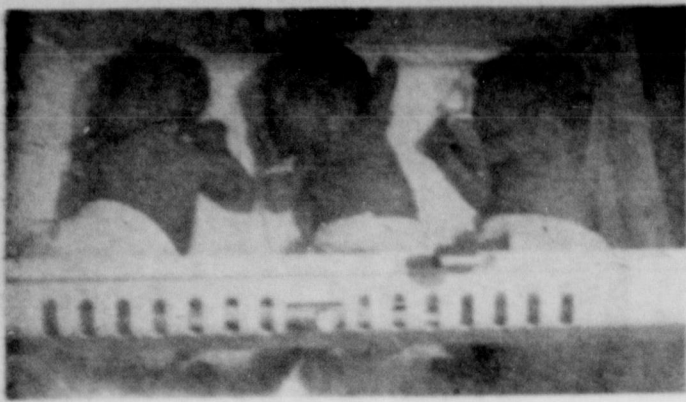

knocked out in a fight with the other two, according to reports. It would appear that they are All-American boys. On July 13, 1955, the "trips" all underwent tonsillectomies (everything runs in threes).

Always Hungry

According to their mother, "no one every fixed as many peanut butter sandwiches," and a question is "why did they ever put a door on the refrigerator? It is hardly ever closed!"

The Durhams expressed their appreciation for the "largest baby shower" ever given any couple. The mother explained that all 19 dozen diapers were used.

The triplets have made long strides in the past five years and many residents of the community still remember them as "their babies," and will continue to be interested in their well-being in the years ahead.

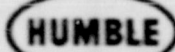

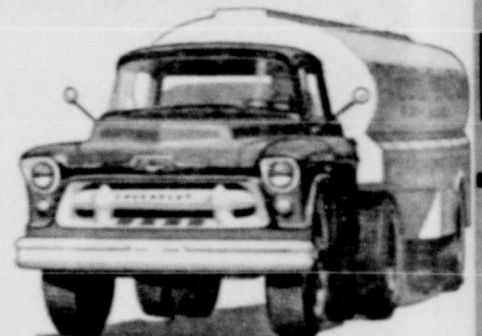

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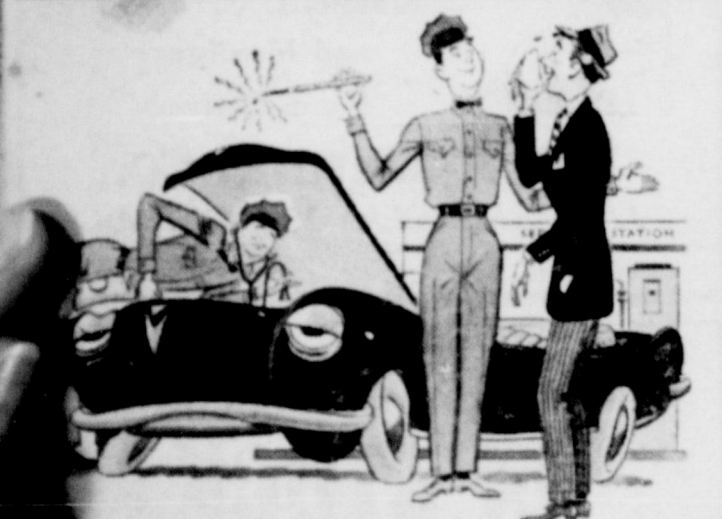
