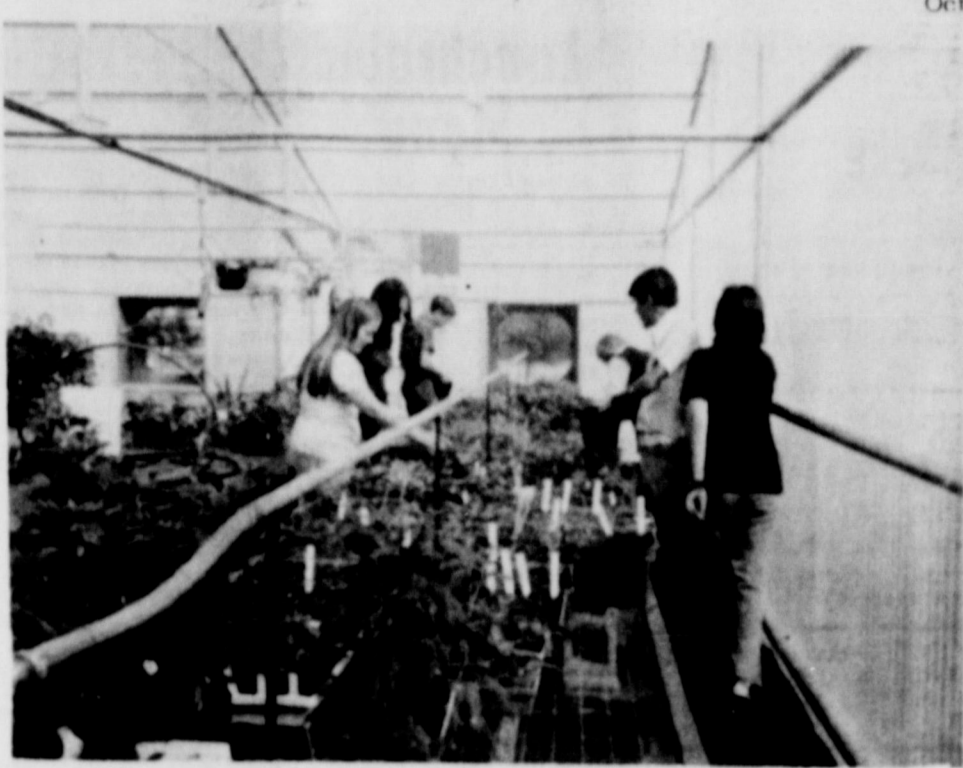

Greenhouse on KC Campus Part of Expansion Under New Program

As part of a new program begun this year in Knox City High School, eleven students are taking a two credit Pre-employment Lab course in Ornamental Horticulture. Instructor for the two hour course is Jim Dillon, who, with his wife, Melanie, has just moved to 206 South 4th in Knox City.

Dillon received his Bachelor degree in Agriculture Education from East Texas State University at Commerce in 1970. He received his Master of Science degree in 1971 from East Texas State University, also.

Dillon taught agriculture at Wilmer Hutchins in Fort Worth for a year before coming to Knox City. A native of Fort Worth, Dillon and his wife, who is from San Angelo, are members of the United Methodist Church.

Dillon's class, available to junior and senior students, spends almost all of its time in the greenhouse, only recently completed on the Knox City campus. The 40' x 120' building, constructed of plastic fiberglass, is divided into three separate rooms, each of which may be set for a completely different climate, as each room contains:

automatic temperature and humidity controls. Fans, heaters, blowers, and sprayers cut on and off automatically to maintain the temperature and humidity for which each room is set. The fans, heaters, and blowers are located on the north side of the building.

On the south side of the building are pads that are automatically sprayed with water, and automatically open and shut as humidity is needed in the atmosphere inside the building. The water used on the pads is contained in a 5' x 4' sunken tank containing two pumps which recirculate the water through the humidity system, with the only water loss being through evaporation.

A sophisticated watering system has been installed in the greenhouse. The system involves time clocks and measuring devices which make it possible to automatically water 12 different places, each place set to water for different lengths of time, different amounts of water at different intensities, from a fine mist to a heavy sprinkle, a different number of times during the day or night.

In the east room of the greenhouse, 132 tomato plants are set out. Each of the students in the class of five girls and six boys has 11 tomato plants in his or her care, as has Mr. Dillon. The students are responsible for the complete care of their own plants.

The tomato "field" is watered with plastic pipe equipped with individual water outlets for each plant. In another room, a variety of plants have been potted in peat moss and perlite mixture by the students from cuttings brought by them from home or from friends' homes. Hanging baskets, containing a variety of plants suitable for this purpose

have been started, as have poinsettias, which the class hopes to have ready for Christmas.

The class plans to offer plants for sale after they have established enough stock. It plans to offer bedding plants, such as petunias, for sale in the spring. Among the plants they now have, which will also be offered for sale, are carnations, coleus, begonias, jews, mother-in-law tongue, devil's backbone, pepper plants, and hydrangeas.

Plans call for future expansion of the greenhouse under programs now available. These programs are also making possible construction of additional space on the present vocational agriculture building.

An open house is planned for the public to tour the greenhouse soon, at which time each family attending will receive a plant potted by the students at the greenhouse. In the meantime, anyone will be welcome to visit at the greenhouse at anytime, according to Mr. Dillon.

Also on October 8th, registration will be held at Sagerton, starting at 6:00 p.m. at Faith Lutheran Church. Rev. Joe Alabue will be in charge.

Knox City will register students on Tuesday, October 9th, at 7:30 p.m. at the Knox City High School.

On Wednesday, October 10th, at 7:30 p.m., students will register at Old Glory High

School. Munday, Rochester, Gore and Aspermont plan to announce registration dates later enough interest is shown in classes.

These classes are for anyone who has not finished high school or needs extra training in certain areas. Reviews will be given to enable students to pass their G.E.D. tests. Special classes will be held for those who do not speak English, or speak little English. Also there will be classes for those who need training in Government, in order to apply for and pass the tests for citizenship. Typing classes will be taught if there is enough demand for the course in the location where it is wanted.

Coaches' Comments

 Disregarding the score, we thought the Greyhounds represented Knox City very well Friday night against Quana. We had the best defensive effort for the year, and with a strong kicking game, we were able to hold Quana to only 7 points. Anytime you play a team that is rated 24 power points above you, and do as well as we did, then a lot of credit is due to the Greyhound team.
 We lost Nefro Gonzalez for the year early in the second quarter with a broken collarbone. He is to undergo surgery sometime this week in Wichita Falls General Hospital.
 Later in the game, we felt that if we hadn't lost our quarterback we probably could have scored once and maybe twice.
 Our defense was well-balanced with five players scoring 40 or more points. Stanley Newton had a good night and led with 57 points, followed by Randy Egenbacher, 47, Robert

Taylor, 41, Donald Swearingen, 41, and Jimmy Lynn, 41 points. Six more players had double figures also. Egenbacher, Taylor, and Flynn each covered a fumble while Jimmy Lynn and Art Crowmover intercepted a pass each, to halt Quana each time.
 Our offense was completely shut off for the first time in two years, although we had a team grade of 66%, which is higher than last week... but when you play a stronger team, you must grade much higher to win.
 The top offensive grades this week were Nefro Gonzalez, 83%, Art Crowmover, 71%, Stanley Newton, 71%, Roy Posey, 71%, and Robert Taylor, 70%.

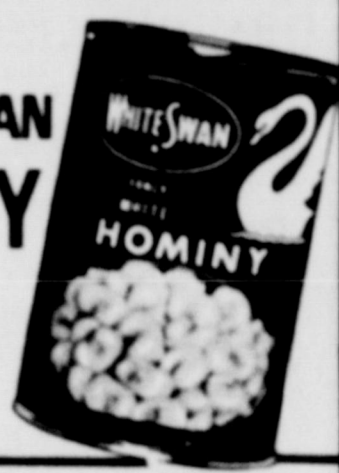

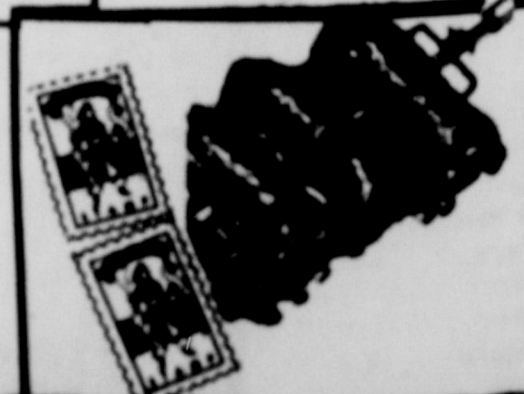
