Stanolind No. 1 G. F. Stubbs, on drillstem test at 4258-85, with tool open 90 minutes, recovered 30 feet of free oil, 90 feet heavy oil cut mud. Set 5-1-2 in oil string at 4258. Treated with 1000 gallons of acid and swabbed Wednesday. Reacidizing today and moving in larger swabbing machine.

Stanolind No. 1 C. A. Richardson, topped Palo Pinto reef at 4170, found good saturation at 4175. Drilled to 4247, still in saturated section. Operator plans to drill to 4268, and set pipe at an undisclosed depth. From all indications this well has possibilities of being the best in the block so far, since saturation was encountered about 8 feet higher than in the No. 1 Travis. Unofficial reports are that Stanolind has staked the No. 1 Howell, a diagonal offset to the Travis well, and two additional locations on the Verhalen tract.

Stanolind No. 1 W. D. Thomas, on completion tests pumped 104.45 barrels of 39 gravity oil per day, with 4 percent basic sediment and water. Rowan & Hope No. 1 T. P. Clonts drilling below 4270 with no shows reported to date. T & P Coal and Oil Co. No. B-4 McGregor drilling below 1700. Katz & Venable No. 1 Lorentzen, drilling below 3986 with no shows reported.

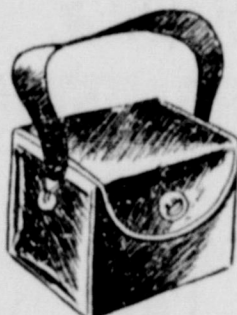

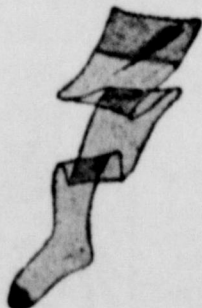

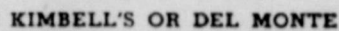
