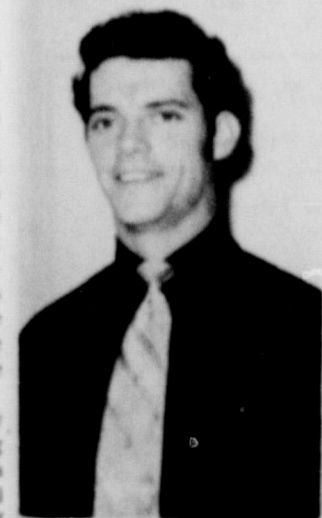

## First Baptist Church To Have Youth Revival

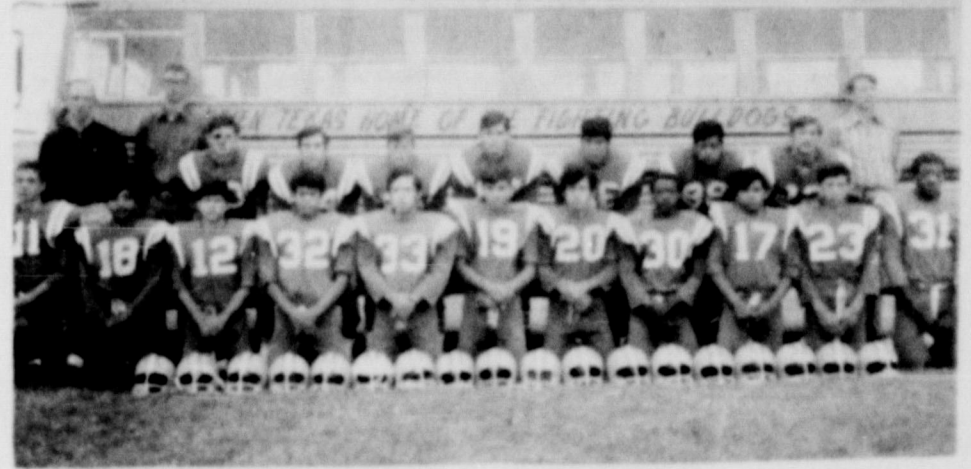
