Five Knox County LVNs To Graduate

Knox City - Five Knox County women will be among the twenty-three nurses who will receive their LVN licenses in graduation exercises to be held Thursday evening at 7:30 in the Crowell High School Auditorium.

Wayne O'Neal, minister of the Church of Christ in Crowell will present the invocation. Mrs. Ruth Stapp will provide music for the professional and recessional.

Superintendent of Crowell Schools and administrator of the Greenbelt School of Vocational Nursing Henry Black will deliver the main address, and Mike Bird, president of the Crowell School Board will present diplomas. The five Knox County women receiving diplomas are Mrs. LaDean Feem-

ster, Mrs. Merle Bishop, Mrs. Lela Pack, Mrs. Albina Carden, and Mrs. Ruth McElroy. Mrs. Edith S. Roark, RN and director of the nursing school will present class pins to the graduates and Mrs. Ailene Williams, LVN, will lead the class in the Nightingale Pledge.

The 1968 class of the Greenbelt School of Vocational Nursing will host a reception for the graduating class in the Crowell High School Cafeteria following the exercises. The Knox County graduates began LVN training November 18, 1968. The training included five months classroom training and demonstrations in Crowell and floor duty in the Knox County Hospital which began with one day each week and progressed to four days floor duty each week. Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Robbins moved to the Oak Manor Care Home in Gladewater this week to be near their daughter's family. Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Reed, The Robbins are long time residents of the Knox City-O'Brien area having moved to O'Brien in March of 1918 when the bank opened there.

Robbins worked as cashier in the bank at O'Brien until it sold and was moved to Knox City in 1922 and he was made vice-president. Later in 1934 Robbins was elected president of the Citizens State Bank in Knox City and served in that capacity until his retirement in December of 1943. 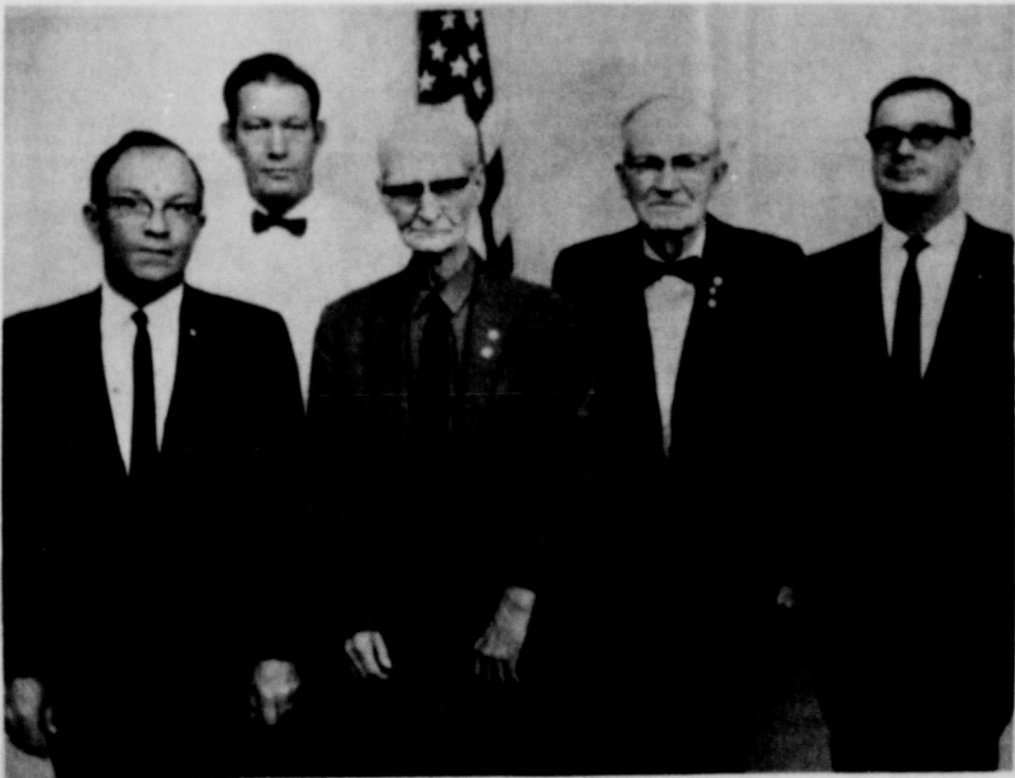
