K C Schools Need Additional Funds

When the new building was planned the Architect figured the old School building in as a \$4,000.00 salvage item, but since the contractor has been thru the old building and made his estimate on the old material he figures there will be enough material in the top story alone of the old building to cover all used material he will be permitted to use in the new building.

Contractors and others who have reviewed the situation fully deem it advisable to save the old building, so by raising \$5,000.00 additional funds, the present building program can be completed and the top story torn off the old building and used as salvage in the new, and replacing a flat top on the old building same as the other buildings making it entirely safe. This will save the School District an 8 room building easily worth \$20,000.00 which cannot afford to be sacrificed and according to the contractor will be safe for many years to come.

In order to complete the present building program there will be a bond election called for \$5,000.00 of which \$4,000.00 will be used in the new building and equipping the auditorium; the remaining part will be spent on the old building to best advantage.

The Board has already made requisition for federal funds and the Architect advises a work order will be issued in the next few days and the new building should be under way soon.

MOTHER'S DAY FOR ALL MOTHERS

Next Sunday is Mother's Day and millions of American children will express affection for their mothers in some tangible way. This is a splendid idea and all of

should appreciate the opportunity it offers. Affection and love for one's own mother is the natural order of living and in some individuals has grown into a veneration for motherhood in general and is marked by increasing concern for the physical well-being of all mothers.

Mother's Day will not have achieved its purpose in our lives until we, as a people, reach this last stage. Unhappily, the number of deaths that accompany motherhood in the United States every year indicates a tragic failure on our part to do all that should be done. Encouraging, however, is the sentiment that has demanded that steps be taken to assure proper safeguards for all mothers and to save the lives of many women needlessly sacrificed each year.

The individual reader of this article may think that his, or her, influence is small, but nevertheless we urge everyone to take some interest in the problem. Certainly civilization has not reached a very high level when such a condition continues to exist without effective protest from children who have grown into maturity and understand the factors involved.

IT JUST DOESN'T WORK

All want higher standards of living. All want larger salaries and wages. That desire has been reflected in laws and regulations to achieve that happy end.

Unfortunately, basic facts are often forgotten. On the theory that higher prices would result in higher wages we have given laws restricting the production of necessities. We have voted laws restricting or penalizing methods of distributing necessities that lower prices through greater efficiency, faster turnover, and smaller profits, in an effort to encourage less efficient business.

But the only income that counts to an individual is "real income" income measured in the light of purchasing power. A dollar is nothing but a measure of value. Two dollars that will buy twenty pounds of sugar are not as valuable as one dollar which will buy twenty-five.

This is not an argument for forcing prices down to profitless levels. It is an argument against laws or practices which force prices, directly or indirectly, to artificial levels, to the detriment of the public. It is an established fact that purchasing power always lags far behind law-made boosts in price structures. If it is made illegal to distribute and sell products in the most economic manner, the 125 million American consumers are going to suffer.

Supply and demand is still the economic law. It cannot be circumvented without courting disaster. Legislation and special class taxation to penalize one group to aid another legislation that would promote scarcity—legislation that forgets the consumer, robs every family in the nation by increasing household bills.

Spring is here! And to millions of us, the lure of the open road will soon become irresistible. Then off we'll go, for fishing trips, picnics, eight-seeing drives.

Last year, 28,000 corpses dotted the streets and highways of the United States. If the ten percent of drivers who cause 90 percent of the accidents aren't curbed, the record will be worse.

Do you belong to that 10 per cent? You'll undoubtedly say you don't—it's a rare driver who will admit to carelessness or recklessness or incompetence. And here's hoping you really don't! But it won't do you any harm to think over your driving practices.

Do you ever pass on curves on hills? If so, you have been guilty of an act that has caused thousands of fatalities and millions of injuries.

Do you ever drive on the wrong side of the road, or weave in and out of traffic, impatient to save a few minutes to be spent later telling your friends what a hot-shot driver you are? If so, you are a potential killer.

Do you regard speed restrictions as something for the other fellow—who, naturally, isn't in your class as a driver—to obey, and for you to break at will? Excessive speed is the principal single cause of motor bloodshed.

Do you drink and drive? Alcohol and gasoline mix into a fuel that has taken a legion of people on the longest journey of all—to the Great Beyond.

Do you put off repairs to your car until a tomorrow that may never come? Bad brakes, defective lights, uncertain steering are friends of the casket maker.

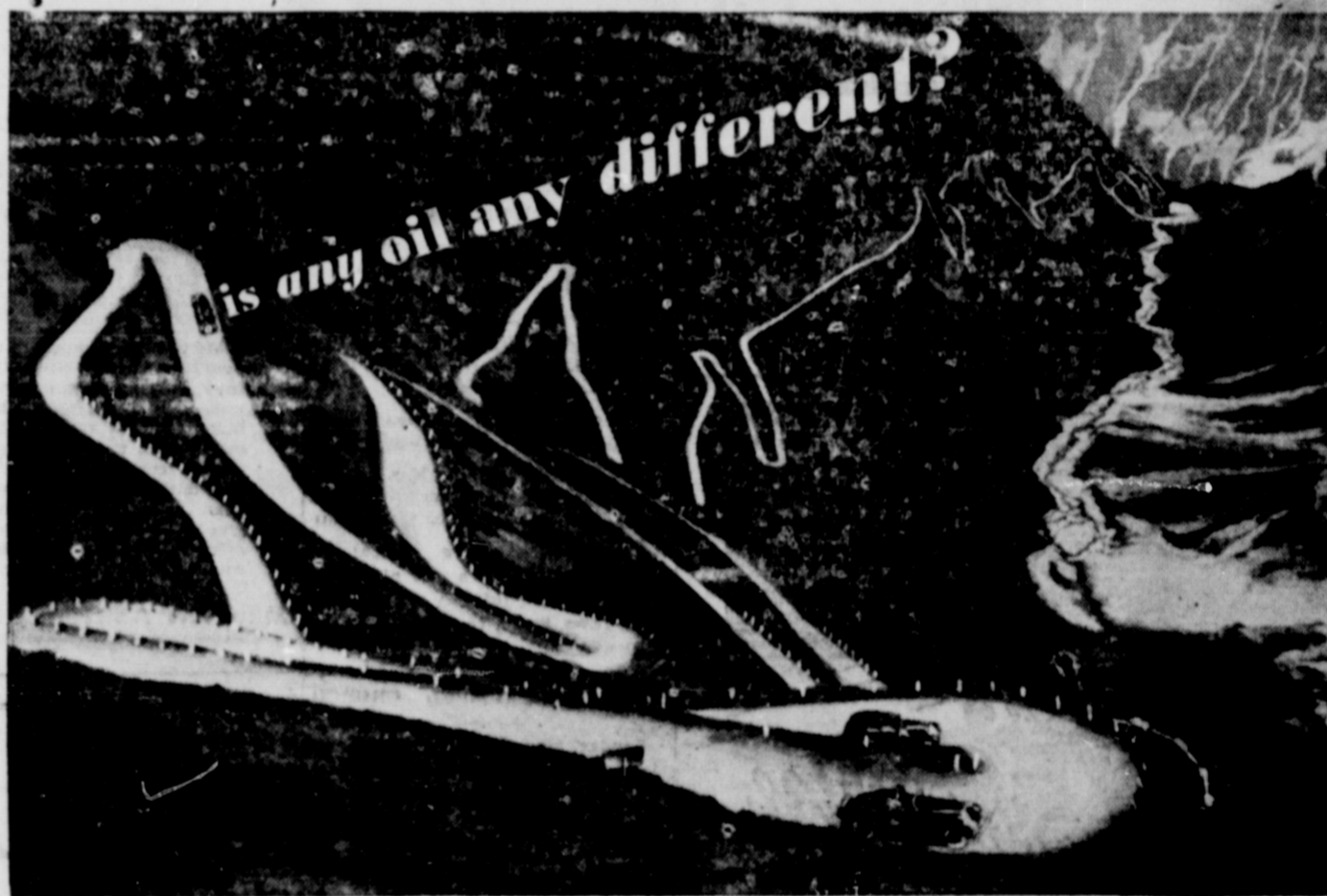
