Exercise Your Right To Vote Saturday

Saturday, April 7, will be an important day for local voters as school, city and hospital elections will be held throughout the county. Several interesting races will be decided in area communities.

A county-wide race in Knox County pits incumbents Vernal Zeissel and Richie Smith against Maurine Reeder and Ernie Eaton for two seats on the Knox County Hospital District board of directors.

Other area contests include:

Munday Trustee Race

Incumbent Von Marr has filed for re-election to his place on the Munday City Council, and Richard Albus is running for the other two-year seat. Gary Decker filed for the remainder of Bobby D. Burnett's term. Current councilman Doris Dickerson is the only candidate for mayor.

One incumbent is seeking re-election to the Munday Independent School District board of trustees. Larry Thompson is opposed by Bill Williams, Maynard (Sonny) Moore, B. R. Winchester and Gifford Wilde. Two trustees will be elected from these candidates.

Elections here will be held in the Munday City Hall.

Goree Voters Choose

Margie Allen, W. D. Robinson and Bob Presnall are running for three places on the Goree City Council. Mrs. Allen and Robinson are incumbents.

Leroy Russell and Tommy Decker will try to retain their seats on the

Goree school board, and they are opposed by Darrell Patterson. Two trustees will be elected. Voting place is the Goree Memorial Building.

Full Benjamin Slate

Benjamin voters will choose three councilmen, three school trustees and two water control board members, as well as turn down or approve a proposition to create an ordinance abolishing abandoned or junked vehicles.

None of the incumbent trustees filed for re-election, so three spots will be filled by newcomers. Candidates are Homer Rolston, Steve Wilson, Raul Barrientez, Janice Tolson and Trenna Cash.

A large slate of candidates filed for election to the Benjamin City Council, including incumbents Buddy Tolson and Weldon Gideon. Opposing these two men and vying for the third council seat are Bertha Driver, Sarah Meinzer and Lucille Moorhouse.

Incumbents seeking re-election to the Knox County Water Control and Improvement Board District 1 are B. B. Benson and Jack C. Idol.

KC To Pick Mayor

Ballots cast in Knox City will decide the mayor's race between current office-holder Buddy Angle and former mayor Charles Auburg.

Incumbents J. M. Emerson and John Gillispie face David Albus and Larry Deering for two school board seats. Elaine Lewis, Larry Staggs and Greg Kuehler are seeking re-election to the city council and have no opponents.

Weinert: No Contest

Weinert voters don't have much choice at the polls, as there are no contests in any of Saturday's elections.

Names on the ballot for school trustees are Rex Herricks and Ronnie Alexander, with two to be elected. Three city council seats will be filled by Tiffen Mayfield, Donald Griffis and Ed Murphy.

Candidates for the Haskell County Water Board District 1 are Bob Wood, Woody Turnbow and Hal Guess.

Rolling Plains PCA Plans Anniversary Celebration

Rolling Plains Production Credit Association will feature well known TV, radio and movie star Rex Allen as speaker and entertainer at its 50th Annual Stockholders meeting on April 6 and 7. The April 6 session will be at the City Auditorium in Childress beginning with a noon barbecue; the second session on April 7 will be held in the Stamford High School auditorium with registration beginning at 9:00 a.m. and ending with a noon barbecue.

R. C. Cobb, president of Rolling Plains PCA, announced that the association has completed its 50th year of service to agriculture. He also added that March ends a year-long celebration by Production Credit Associations across the nation in observance of the group's 50th anniversary.

Bishop Arthur J. Moore delighted in telling the story of a man in Georgia who came back to his home church after a dozen years spent in shady practices, in crime and in jail. But he was ready for the testimonial period, and when it came his turn he said, "I'm glad to be back in my own home church again. I want to tell you that while it's true I broke the law and beat my wife and served a term in jail, I want you to know, brethren, that I never lost my religion."

The humor (or the tragedy) in this story is the evident gross misunderstanding the

man had about the matter of connecting religion and life. Another sad incident that typifies the tragedy of human blindness concerning true religion is revealed in the statement of the man who shot the mother of Martin Luther King when he said, "God told me to do it."

One of the more notable examples of man's erroneous religious beliefs is found in the life of Saul of Tarsus (later known as Paul). He

sincerely believed that he was serving God by persecuting Christians. He was acting out with great energy and zeal his religious convictions - but he was wrong. It took a conversion experience on the road to Damascus to reveal to him just how wrong he was.

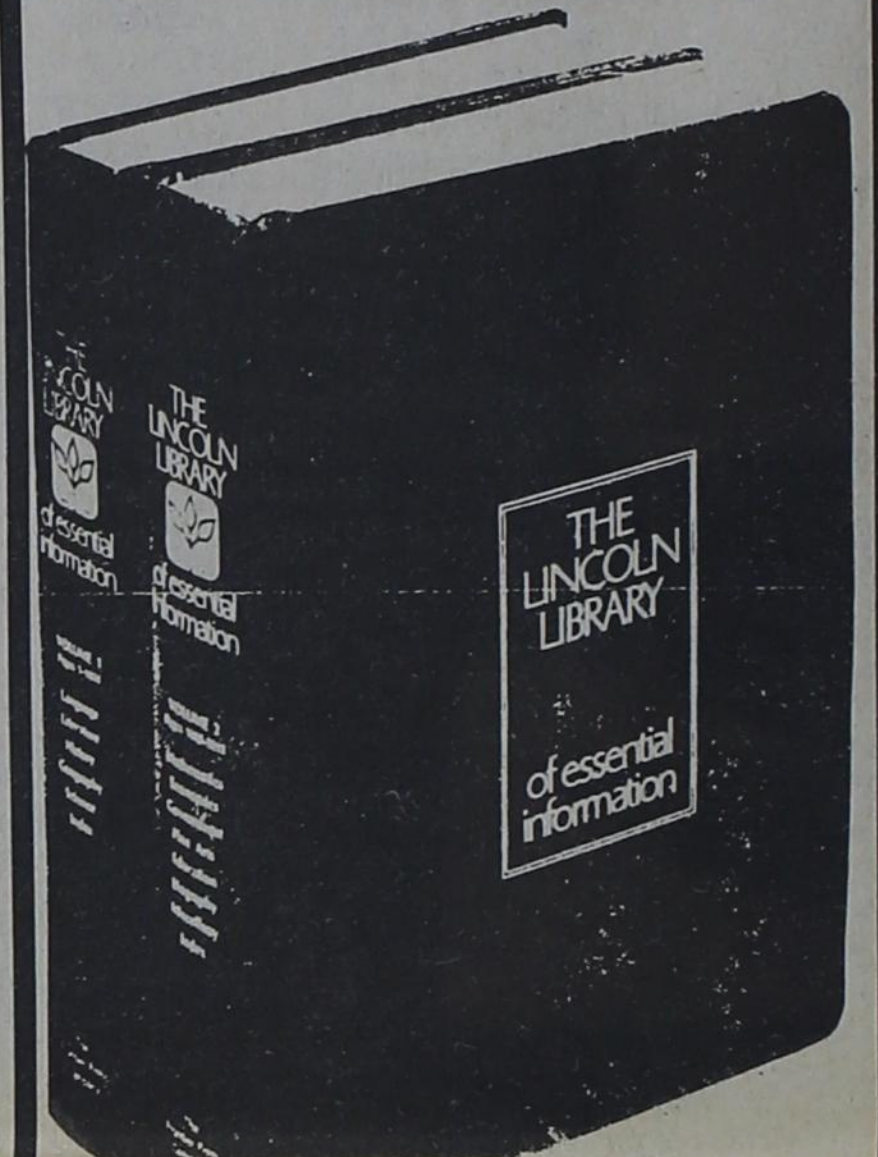
All of which should raise the question within us "religious" folks; "Am I merely religious, or am I truly converted to Christ?"

President Ulysses S. Grant was once arrested during his term of office. He was convicted of exceeding the speed limit on his horse and was fined \$20.

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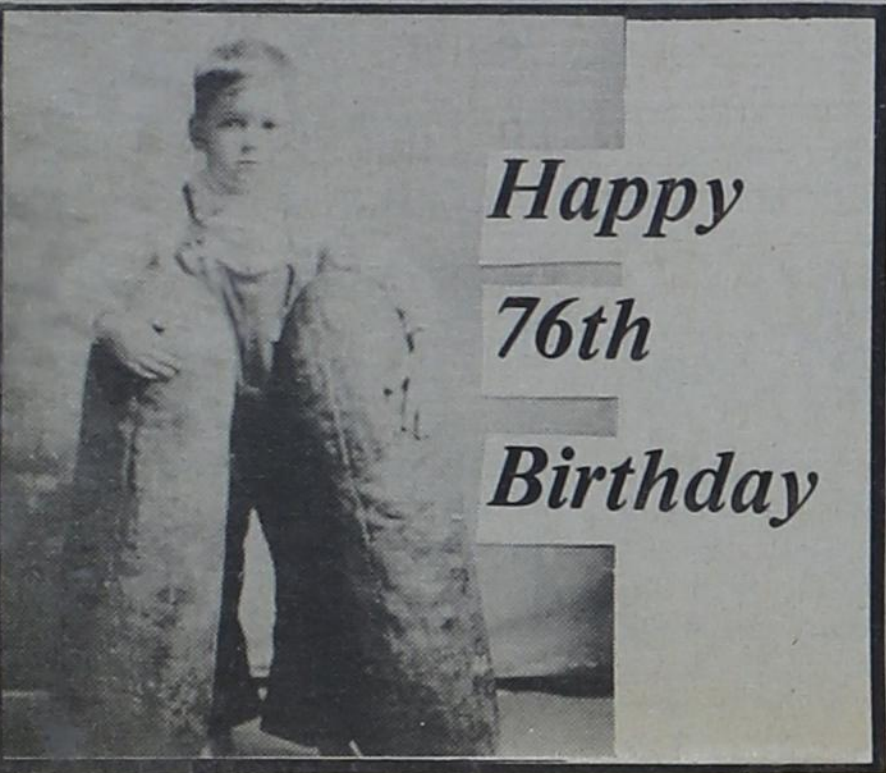
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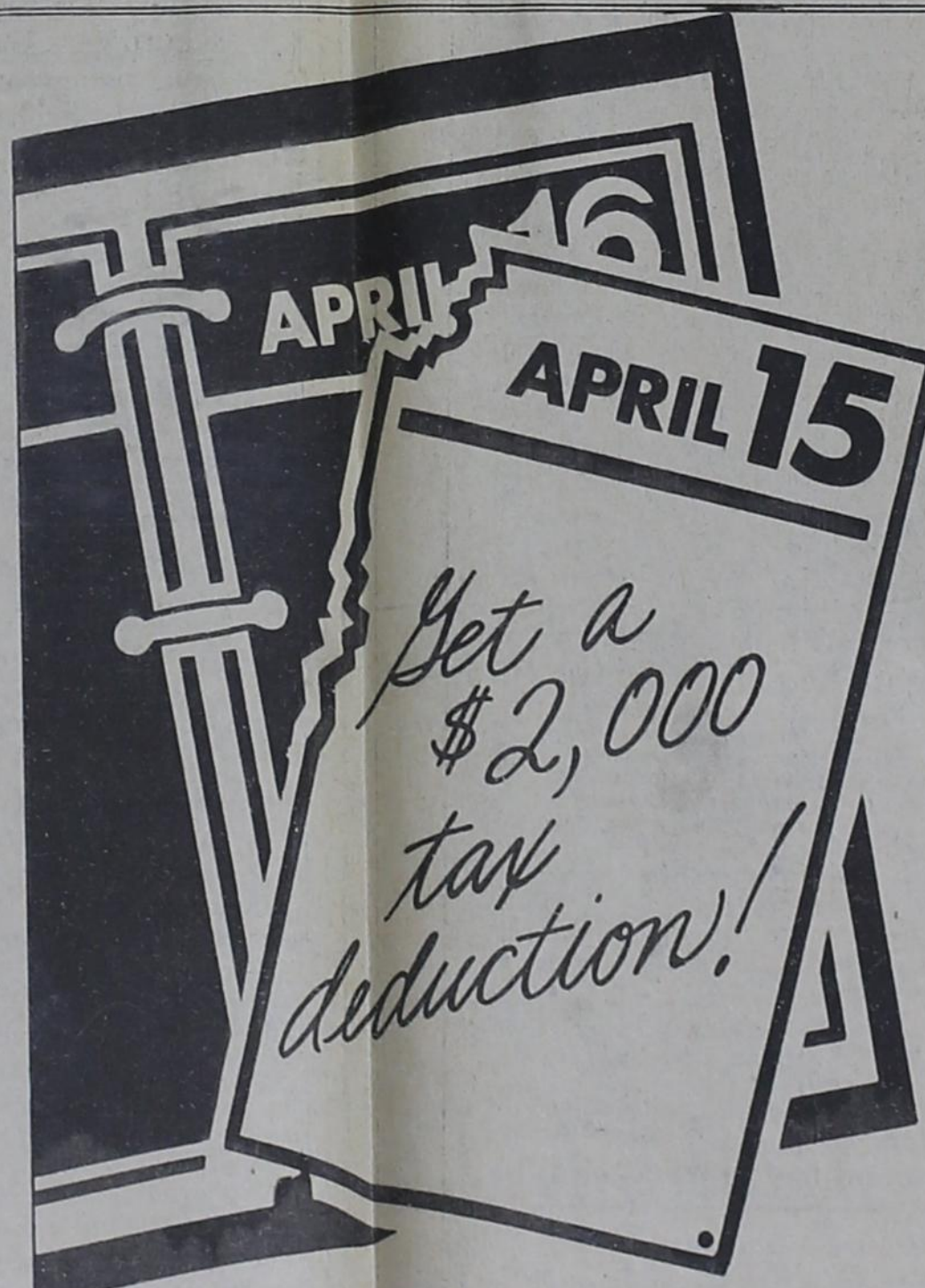

As microwave ovens have become increasingly popular, the choices of models have also increased. Presently, microwave ovens are available from about 35 manufacturers. Shopping with your family's situation and cooking preferences in mind will help you decide which model to buy.

Several styles are available: countertop models and built-in ovens, combination microwave/convection models, over-the-range models and single cavity microwave/conventional models.

There are some basic considerations we all need to look at when purchasing microwave ovens.

First of all you should check the size of the unit to be sure it will fit in the space where you plan to use it. Check the needed clearance and circulation spaces in relation to the location of steam vents. Models that can be installed in place of the exhaust hood over an existing range might be a good solution for the kitchen with limited counterspace.

A convenient door opening style is also important. Some open down, others open on the side.

Microwave shoppers should select an oven cavity large enough to meet the needs of their family. Most models have a cavity of 1 to 1.5 cubic feet. Cavity size is not related to speed or efficiency of cooking.

Another factor is the output wattage or cooking power. Generally, the higher the wattage output, the faster the food will cook.

All microwave ovens have some types of energy distribution system such as stirrer fan, revolving shelf, antenna, or dual feed to help eliminate hot and cold spots in foods. When buying a microwave you need to see what type best suits you but some manual turning and stirring of foods may be needed even with the newest improvements.

Check controls to see which types are easiest for you to read and operate. There is a very large selection of controls available.

A very important consideration to many people is the ease in cleaning the interior. You may choose from acrylic coated steel and stainless

steel interiors. The decision is one of personal preference, as either choice works equally well.

Other features to consider are the amount of noise the oven makes, electrical requirements, costs, warranty

and servicing.

Many microwave features are "extras". Some of these options are: provision for browning, temperature probe, humidity sensor and programmed controls.

Later on I will discuss

microwave oven cooking utensils, cooking techniques and safety.
