As of this week, Friday, April 15, to be exact, this publication might be in the mood for kicking up its heels, or celebrating in some other appropriate man-

Imagine, if you can, anything like a newspaper, publication, "rag" "sheet" or whatever, kicking up its heels! It can't do it, we reckon.

But its owner, or owners can! The reason: A load is being lifted.

It was in the final days of February, 1973, that we completed negotiations with Marion and Mattie Waggoner for the exchange of ownership of the Munday Courier.

We had operated the newspaper from its "birth", which occurred on Thursday, October 15, 1971, when Munday's original newspaper, The Munday Times, failed to "make the mails". Munday nad no newspaper on that mailing date.

We became upset, as did officials of he Munday Chamber of Commerce. Then, when subscribers failed to get heir local paper at the appointed time, hey also became upset. The grapevine nad carried the news that "Knox Couny's leading newspaper" had gone byeye, via the bankruptcy route.

It was after consulting the telephone lirectory and making "hurry-up" teleshone calls that a group of some 35 or nore interested citizens met to discuss he situation.

It was during this discussion that we emarked: "If the merchants of Munday vant a newspaper, I'll start one. But as oon as it's on its feet, it's for sale - I'd ather not be back in the newspaper ousiness."

Support was pledged. We called in Bill Bowley and Cheryl Berryhill, and the hree of us (with volunteer support and nelp of Callie Ann Combs) started work on next week's paper. Since everything related to printing a newspaper was shut ip inside the building and "closed in pankruptcy" tagged the front door, we started (as often remarked) with nothing out a pen and notebook, a borrowed typewriter and office space furnished inside the Chamber of Commerce office.

The days that followed were trying, but fruitful!

After some 16 months of operation, the Waggoners (Marion and Mattie) ap-

peared on the scene, and we began talk-Waggoner said all of his experience

had been in the mechanical department (he was then employed with the Abilene Reporter-News) but he felt that he could handle a weekly newspaper. "It's been a long-time desire of mine to have a newspaper of my own," he said.

After a couple of meetings, or so, the sale price was agreed upon. The three of us hied ourselves to the office of Clyde Boose, who went to work with his legal "expertise", and a sales contract was soon completed.

We signed a batch of papers and obtained copies. We completed the transaction, and all details of the transaction were finished on February 27, 1973. We signed over ownership to the Courier and received a check in part payment and a document entitled "Schedule of Direct Reduction Loan".

On this document was a payment number, payment of principal and interest, and the loan balance. This was numbered from 1 to 120. The Waggoners became "Munday's official newspaper


As the Courier continued to be printed by offset at the Quanah Tribune-Chief, we often had contact with that paper's owners. It was quite often that Ed R. Eikin reminded us of how lucky

It wasn't always peaches and ice cream for the new owners, neither did they expect to be placed right in the middle of a rose garden. Marion and Mattie kept plugging along, and payments were made almost on the button. If one was a day or two late, the next one

New City Hall Is Prospect For Munday

More positive thinking is being generated regularly in regard to construction of a new city hall for the City of Munday, the days and months go by.

"If and when the new city hall is built it will be with city funds entirely," Walter Hertel, administrator, said last Monday. "We are not looking forward for any financial help from any government agency."

With construction in view, the City Council has been setting aside general revenue funds annually for financing the new structure.

Hertel said there is already some \$50,000 set aside for this purpose. This is invested in certificates of deposit and drawing interest, and the money can not be spent for any other purpose unless designated by the mayor and city alder-

One has but to look around to determine that Munday is badly in need of a new "government house". A casual inspection will reveal that the present city hall, erected in 1918, is in a bad state of deterioration and disrepair. Concrete floors are cracking, caused by walls breaking away and leaning.

It is being recommended that no action be taken on the city hall construction until the present \$500,000 H.U.D. drainage and paving project has been completed.

Deadline Nears For Bid Offers

Friday, April 15, is the final day to offer a bid on loan or reserve wheat, grain sorghum and corn in excess of your PIK needs. All offers bidding a "O" percent will be accepted - in other words, you can forfeit your loan in excess of your PIK needs. If you do not wish to forfeit your loan, you may offer a bid on what percent of the loan you would be willing to keep as your profit. If your bid is accepted, the government will pay off the loan and give you the portion you bid, which you may sell on the open market. The government will take the remainder of the offered quantity to supply PIK needs of other farmers. You do not have to be in PIK to bid.

If your bid is accepted, you must pay back any unused storage on the loan quantity offered. This is necessary since Commodity Credit Corporation will take up the storage and handling from the date title changes on the commodity. By the same token, you will probably be due a refund of unused storage from the elevator where the grain is stored. All loan repayments and storage refunds must be made by a certified or cashiers

If you submit a bid offer and it is for a joint loan, all interested parties must sign the bid or be signed by someone having a power of attorney for the indi-

Bids will be opened after 5:00 p.m. on Friday, April 15, at the Knox County ASCS office. The bids will then be submitted to Kansas City for processing. County offices will be notified of the results as soon as review and evaluation is completed.

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

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"Farm Talk" Column Cites **Vegetables In Knox County**

In a recent issue of the Abilene Reporter-News, Kent Dunlap's "Farm Talk" devoted space to vegetable production in Knox County, following an interview with Charles Siepel, county agent. His comments follow:

"Unlike in some vegetableproducing areas of the country, the wet winter didn't hamper the planting of spring potatoes and onions in Knox County, according to county extension agent Charles Siepel.

"Siepel said several hundred acres of spring potatoes and more than 600 acres of onions were planted on time and, for the most part, were not affected by wet weather.

"The weather didn't affect any plantings that I know of," Siepel said. "The potatoes were planted in late February, and they are already coming up.

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

Before I continue this article, I would like to announce our forthcoming Vacation Bible School. It will begin the first week after school is out, May 23-27. We would like to invite each one of you to come and spend some time in God's Book. We'll be glad to have you.

In the last issue, I emphasized our creed, the Bible, and who is in charge, Christ. This week I would like to share with you our organization and worship.

Churches of Christ have no modern day organization. There are no governing boards - neither district, regional, national or international - no earthly headquarters and no universal or-

ganization. Each congregation is autonomous or "self-ruled" and is independent of every other congregation. The only tie which binds the many congregations together is a common allegiance to Christ and the Bible.

However, many congregations unite to help one another in supporting different children's homes, mission

work, etc.; yet each congregation does so voluntarily, because each congregation has its own selected elders that have been chosen by its members and follow their wisdom in meeting the needs of benevolence.

Elders are selected in each congregation by its members according to their qualifications. The qualifications of elders are found in First Timothy chapter three and Titus chapter one.

How Do We Worship?

Worship in churches of Christ centers in five items and we believe the first-century pattern is important. Jesus said, "God is spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth" (Jh. 4:24).

To worship God according to truth is to worship Him according to His Word because His Word is truth (Jh. 17:17). Therefore, we must not include any item not found in His Word.

The five items of worship mentioned in the New Testament as having been observed by the first century church are: singing, praying, preaching, giving, and eating the Lord's Supper.

Next week will be my last issue in a series of three, to inform you about the churches of Christ. The last issue will contain some more information about our worship, what kind of music, facts about the Lord's Supper, and requirements for membership.
