"Good morning, may I help you? I ain't got no jar lids, though!"

This was the greeting we received a while back when we walked into a store in a neighboring town, seeking an item that was almost as scarce as jar lids. We didn't get our item at this place, either.

This brought to mind again the acuteness of the jar lid situation.

It all came about when it was determined that we had an energy shortage, along with inflation, rising prices and a bunch of other ills that inflict our nation.

It was decided that all who could should help whip inflation by planting small garden plots, even raise vegetables in our flower beds, etc. Then when the products of our labors became ready for harvesting and preserving, we were faced with a lid shortage.

This hadn't come home to us until early last fall when we were provided with a batch of cukes. Bread and butter pickles were on the agenda for the Mrs., and she couldn't fine the jar lids.

In Haskell for another purpose, we decided to pick up a batch there. Inquiries at several places revealed none, with none expected.

Somebody's gotta have jar lids, we think, so en route home we tried John Mayfield's place in Weiner, and came up with a zero. We met with the "same success" everywhere we tried. We decided they'd quit making the blamed things.

Bridge was successful in borrowing enough from nearby neighbors to get her pickles pickled. Then, so far as we were concerned, the shortage was over.

Everybody will become stocked up when the canning season is over, we surmised. The shelves became stocked briefly. We purchased two dozen lids, and forgot about the shortage.

Later we learned that the stock of lids lasted about as long as an ice cube placed on the sidewalk and exposed to the hot July sun.

We met Buddy Gafford of Vashti in Quanah one day. He was en route to Taos, N. M., with a load of his pottery, and had stopped in Quanah to try to pick up some jar rings.

He had the prettiest garden ever, and it seems he had the lids but no rings. We don't know the success he had, or didn't have, but from the timetable he gave for arrival at his destination, he planned other stops.

About that time, we noticed a piece in the paper stating that the demand was far exceeding the supply. One manufacturer, so the story read, was producing lids on a 24-hour basis with three shifts of labor, and couldn't supply the demand.

Another story was told about a certain "concoction" being used on the jar rings that caused them to seal that was sort of placed on the "taboo" list by the government - and they couldn't produce the rings without this product, hence the shortage of rings.

The story went the rounds, too, that many stores had jars complete

Benjamin Plans For Bicentennial Event

Ninety years after the first settlers started the town of Benjamin, its citizens are preparing to celebrate the nation's 200th birthday. The official Bicentennial Celebration will begin on Saturday, July 26, on the Courthouse Square as Benjamin is presented the national and state Bicentennial Certificates and national flag.

Ceremonies are slated to begin at 7:00 p.m. with a parade around the square. Knox County Judge Sam E. Clonts will serve as master of ceremonies for the program beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Mayor Vernon McCanlies and James Bisbee, chairman of the Benjamin Bicentennial Committee, will accept the flag and certificates from Dr. Art Beyer, professor at Midwestern State University and chairman of the Wichita Falls Bicentennial Committee. Edward Lee Kirk of Abilene will be the guest speaker.

When the official ceremonies are concluded, the festivities will take over. The County Seat Kickers, Benjamin's own square dance club, will kick off an old-fashioned evening of fun and entertainment which will include music and refreshments for all.

The bands of Son Propps, R. C. Daniel, Paul Bullion, and the Westernaires will provide music for the Jamboree following the short square dance. A concession stand will open at 6:30 p.m.

Other projects planned for the future recognition of this Bicentennial period are in the planning stages. *****

Tax Bill To Be Aired

All school superintendents, school board members, Commissioners Courts and county judges of the 15-county 101st state representative districts have been invited to a meeting at the local high school on Friday night to discuss ways and means of combatting the increasing school taxes resulting from the passing of a new school financing bill passed in the recent session of the Texas Legislature.

Invitations have gone out to other interested schools adjoining the district, and between 300 and 400 people are expected for this meeting.

The meeting will be opened with registration at 5 p.m., and a barbecue dinner will be served at 6 p.m.

The general session will follow, in which it is hoped ways and means will be devised to replace ad valorem property tax burdens imposed on local school districts because of this legislation.

Principal objections to the bill lies in the fact that it requires that property be revalued for taxation at full market values, possibly requiring statewide equalization of property values.

Hosts for the local meeting are: State Rep. W. S. (Bill) Healy of Paducah, Knox County Commissioners Court, Benjamin School Board, Goree School Board, Knox City School Board, and the Munday School Board. *****

**T. L. Thompson, Retired
Farmer, Dies Last Friday**

T. L. Thompson, 87, well
known retired farmer of
Munday, passed away at the
Methodist Hospital in Lub-
bock at 12:05 a.m. Friday,
following a short illness.

He was first hospitalized
at Knox City and was
transferred to the Lubbock
hospital about a week prior
to his death. He was re-
ported recovering, then
suffered a kidney malfunc-
tion.

Thomas Luther Thompson
was born on July 1, 1888, in
Georgia, and married Millie
A. Shipman on December 3,
1911, in Wise County. They
moved to the Munday area
in 1922. She preceded him
in death in 1948. Mr. Thomp-
son was a successful farmer
of this area for a number of
years, retiring about the
time he reached his 80th
birthday.

His favorite pastime was
fishing and maintaining a
small garden plot at his
residence, where friends

were welcome to come help
themselves. For a few years,
he planted this plot in
zennias and they became a
showplace for those passing
by.

Funeral services were
held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday
from the First United
Methodist Church, of which
he was a member for many
years. Officiating was his
pastor, Rev. E. Hardy Cole,
and burial was in Johnson
Memorial Cemetery under
the direction of McCauley-
Smith Funeral Home.

**PROCLAMATION
BY THE
COUNTY JUDGE OF KNOX COUNTY**

TO ALL WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:
I, Sam E. Clonts, County Judge of Knox County, do
hereby declare the week of July 25-30, 1975 as FARM
AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK in Knox County, for the
following reasons:

WHEREAS, the citizens of Knox County are proud of
our farm and ranch families from whom comes our
abundance of food and fiber; therefore, our citizens are
deeply concerned about the safety and well being of this
segment of our population; and

WHEREAS, records show that at least 285 farm and
ranch people died during 1974 at the following rates:
traffic - 97; tractors - 34; drownings - 34; firearms - 24;
fires and burns - 21; falls - 18; machinery - 15; animals -
13; electric current - 10; and miscellaneous - 19. Knox
County recorded no farm/ranch deaths; and

WHEREAS, our farmers and ranchers have become
increasingly concerned with a new phase of agricultural
safety through regulatory requirements for their hired
labor and the added cost of new equipment (Roll-Over
Protective Structures for Agricultural Tractors) as a
result of these regulatory requirements; and

WHEREAS, during this week, a renewed emphasis on
rural accident prevention education is being undertaken
by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch
Safety Council, the Texas Safety Association, the Texas
and Knox County Agricultural Extension Service, Texas
4-H Clubs, Community Improvement Associations, Texas
Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America,
Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and
the Knox County Farm Bureau with the theme,
"Planning Prevents Accidents"; and

WHEREAS, planning for accident prevention includes
a combination of proper attitudes, combined with
practical, common sense precautions. The planning
should include employee operating instructions for
agricultural tractors and equipment; compliance of other
agricultural safety standards; use tractors with roll-over
protection, Slow Moving Vehicle Emblems, fire
extinguishers, legal lighting equipment and rear-view
mirrors; and

WHEREAS, the farmer and rancher can develop a
check list for himself, members of his family and
employees which would include the following: enroll in
the (NSC) Defensive Driving Course; (NRA) - Hunter &
Home Firearm Safety Courses; (ARC) Basic First Aid
Course; and Basic Learn to Swim Course and include
SAFETY in the Program of Work and Program Calendar
for schools, clubs, churches and other group meetings.

**"Ma Eiland" Moorhouse Of
Galveston Dies on Monday**

A loveable person whose
life-span of about 62 years on
the Knox Prairie made
inroads upon the lives of
hundreds of people in all
walks of life answered the
"final summons" at about 5
a.m. Monday in Galveston.

She was "Ma Eiland"
Moorhouse, 87, who left
Munday some seven years
ago but who remained in
memory among many local
people. She reared her
family in Munday and made
many contributions to the
community.

She was born Exie
Rosser, daughter of Mr. and
Mrs. I. P. Rosser, in Alaba-
ma, and the family moved
to Munday in 1906. About
a year later, in 1907, she
was married to David Ansel
Eiland, member of another
pioneering family. Together,
they cast their lot in Knox
County - at Benjamin, and
at Munday, except for one
year in Colorado, in 1917.
They operated the telephone
exchange in Benjamin for a
number of years, and Mr.
Eiland was also a barber by
trade. Mr. Eiland died in
1932.

"Ma Eiland" operated the
Eiland Hotel, beginning in
1932, for some seven years,
and those who lived in the
hotel became "her boys" and
"her girls".

She then began working
for her son, the late Dr. D.
C. Eiland, in his offices in
Munday, where she remained
from 1939 until 1968, when
her grandson, Dr. D. C. Eiland
Jr., closed the offices here
and moved to Galveston.

She was married to Chas.
Moorhouse in 1952. He
passed away in February,
1975.

In 1959, at a gathering in
Knox City, "Ma Eiland" was
honored by Munday and
Knox City doctors for her 20
years of service to the
medical profession. At this
time she received a large

portrait of herself as a
surprise gift.

Because of failing health,
Mrs. Moorhouse also moved
to Galveston in 1968 in order
to be near her eldest daugh-
ter, Mrs. B. F. Hood.

Funeral services and bur-
ial were at Galveston on
Wednesday of this week.

Surviving her are a son,
Andy Eiland of Galveston;
two daughters, Mrs. Hazel
Hood, also of Galveston; and
Mrs. Laverne Martin of
Milwaukee, Wisc.; nine
grandchildren and twelve
great-grandchildren.

The SS lesson was great Sun morning over coming Hindrances to growth. Acts 10; 1 Corinthians 2:1-5; 2 Corinthians 4:7-16.

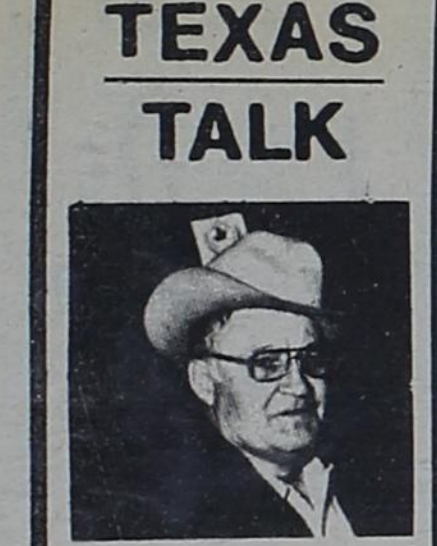

TEXAS TALK

By Tommie Harper

Officials are predicting a decrease of no more than 20 per cent in domestic purchase of feed grains during the current marketing year. Others are saying that an improved livestock market will cut the decrease to even less. USDA projections are for the production of about 220 million short tons of feed grains with about 165 million tons sold in the United States and another 42 million tons exported to foreign countries. According to the figures released by the Department of Agriculture, total carryover of feed grains by the end of the marketing year should not exceed 30 million tons. Although that's a lot of grain, records show it to be only about 60 per cent as much as the carryover at the end of 1971. Officials citing these figures are predicting relatively stable prices for grain sorghum. Major factors which could produce a change in the situation include the extent of recovery of the cattle market and, as always, the most variable of all, the weather.

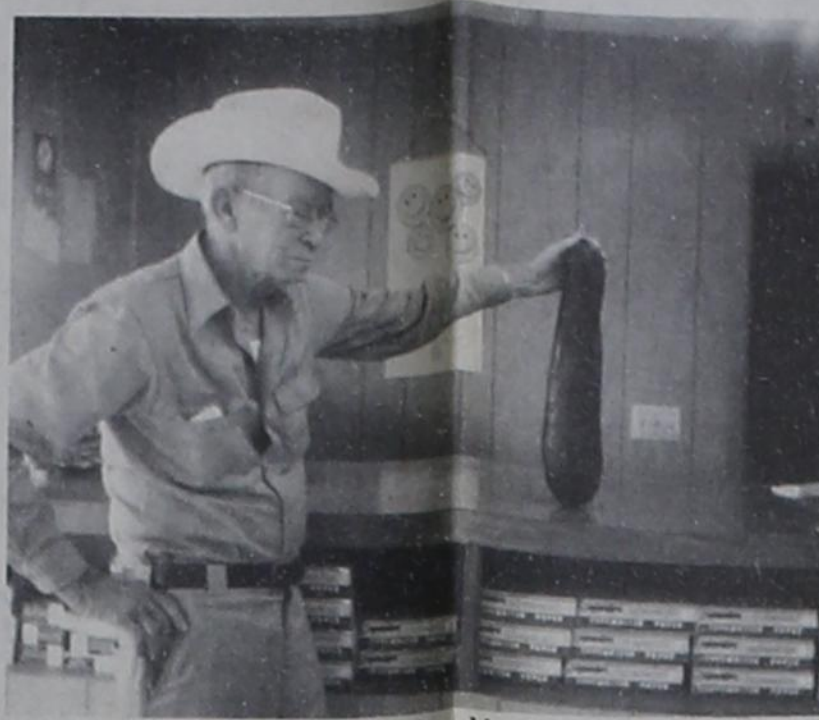

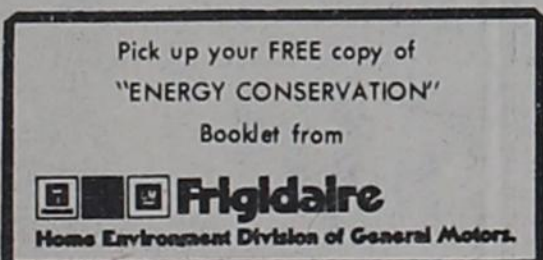
Our Highway Committee reports the 24-hour truck traffic survey showed 320 trucks through Munday. A breakdown is being done with this information to indicate how many fuel trucks, oil field supplies, campers, etc. This does not include the 25,000 or more, that is used during harvest of potatoes, wheat, grain and cotton. We estimate there is approximately 125,000 trucks only that pass through Munday annually, excluding pickups. This year Munday produced eighteen million, five hundred-thousand pounds of potatoes, almost fifty million pounds of wheat with evidence of a bumper crop of milo and small grains to be harvested yet. The Munday area can feed a lot of people.
