Fun Fling Is Fun! Another Set Friday

A night of laughter and thrills was experienced by all who attended the first "Whing Ding Fun Fling" held Friday night, July 8, at the football field. This event is sponsored to raise money for the purchase of a new fully equipped maxi-van ambulance for Munday and the surrounding communities.

A large crowd enjoyed the first event, which was the running nose relay. One team member held the feet of the other as they attempted to push a ball with nose, while walking on the hands. This might look easy, but the contestants can easily verify the difficulty as one team member from Knox City collapsed and couldn't continue. As the teams crossed the finish line, Munday was first, Weinert second, Gilliland third, Benjamin fourth, Goree fifth and Knox City sixth.

The golf cart frolic with an obstacle course was the second event. The male player was blindfolded and the female passenger gave directions. There were problems, the biggest of which seemed to be that the female kept pointing and making gestures, trying to get her point across. The poor driver couldn't see her. Munday again claimed first, Benjamin second, Weinert third, Knox City fourth, Gilliland fifth, and Goree sixth.

The pie relay was the third event. It started with one player dipping pie onto a paper plate. That player relayed it over a hurdle to another, who threw it over a door to the last player who finally caught it and laid it on the table. You should have

seen the way those players slung that hash! That's right, all over each other and the field. Benjamin won first, Gilliland and Knox City tied for second, Goree third, and Munday and Weinert tied for fourth.

The crowd really enjoyed the play pen game where one member stood in a playpen filled with balloons. The other players had 30 seconds to stuff as many balloons into the large overalls worn by the first. They then helped the overstuffed player out of the playpen, who had to waddle across the finish line with as many balloons as possible. Goree took first, Weinert second, Munday third, Benjamin fourth, Gilliland fifth and Knox City sixth.

The fish market relay, the last event of the night, proved to be the downfall of just about everyone. A tank with a greased pole placed across it was filled with water. Things seemed to be going fairly well for each team, but some team members just couldn't seem to stay out of the water. Weinert claimed first, Gilliland second, Munday third, Benjamin fourth, Goree fifth, and Knox City sixth.

Team totals for the first night were Weinert first with 48.5 points; Gilliland second with 32 points; Munday third with 29.1 points; Benjamin fourth with 26 points; Goree was fifth with 18.6 and Knox City finished sixth with 14.6 points. Each

of these six teams will compete for two more Friday nights and the top three after three nights of competition will be back to vie for the championship title Friday July 29th.

These amounts added to the \$1803.40 already in the bank gave the ambulance fund the total of \$3408.05. This fund can not be used for anything but the purchase of an ambulance.

Some two weeks ago, a push on a computer button started oil flowing through the trans-Alaska pipeline that opened America's last resource frontier. It is said the "treasure trove" may last a century.

So far, it hasn't eased the energy crises to much, or any, extent.

There's still much ado about the energy crisis, with the president considering gas rationing as one of the combatant deals.

And there have been comments, both favorably and unfavorably, about the new oil source.

Alaska's first governor said: "It's a great day for America. It's the beginning of development of other upland and off-shore resources in a planned way. Alaska could have up to 100 years of supplying petroleum products to the nation."

Dissenters, however few they may be, have indicated that the 800-mile north-south line is an environmental disaster.

They claim the line and its haul road open the mineral-rich Arctic to relatively easy development—and the possible ravages of tourism. "The question is not whether it works or not, it's what it does to Alaska," said the head of an environmental group whose lawsuit blocked pipeline construction for years.

While we in Texas are inviting tourism each season, it appears that some people of far-away Alaska are opposed to a surge of tourism.

A former attorney general of Alaska said it was astonishing how strongly the pipeline was opposed and that it took so long and cost so much to build. The cost was a mere \$7.7 billion!

The pipeline was termed as being perhaps the first time in history that industry, government and science got together to solve the

said they had started on the final 10 acres of their 200-acre crop.

Operations at the two processing sheds in Munday were completed last week. Earlier, Jack Colville of Colville and Wilson said they would finish by July 7, and by Monday everything had been cleaned up around the shed.

The Munday Vegetable Growers Co-op finished operations about the same time. Danny Kiser said Monday that the Co-op group came out pretty good on their operations this year. Most of their spuds were contracted, and at first the market was higher. In the final stages, however, they were protected against the price drop.

A rough estimate was that the crop in the Munday area averaged around 190 to 200 sacks per acre on the No. 1 and No. 2 grade of potatoes.

The price at first was as high as \$9.00 per hundred on No. 1 potatoes; however, it fell far below this figure as the harvest advanced, growers said.

Local growers had around 1,050 to 1,100 acres in potatoes; and, with an average of 200 sacks per acre—well, that's a lot of 'aters!

problems. Alaska's oil fields represent more than 30 per cent of the nation's total petroleum reserves, it was said.

As the oil started flowing slowly, a break occurred in the huge pipeline, and everything was shut down until this was repaired and the long stretch of pipe was checked again over the route.

Two weeks from the time oil first entered the pipeline, and explosion and fire put one of the pump stations out of commission-and the project was stopped again.

News over the airwaves Saturday were to the effect that all of the 100 or more pump stations along the 800-mile route would be checked before oil started flowing again.

So far, the fact that oil from Alaska hasn't altered

the talk and concern about an energy crisis. People in Alaska, especially the big-wigs, are worrying about "unfair competition" as the oil is being marketed.

The fact that oil is available should be hailed, we think, as a deterrent to the energy crisis, giving our nation more time for developing other sources of energy to bring relief to a long-suffering public.

Things should work out for the good.

Reminds us of a statement we coined when a small oil well was brought in years ago on the Dr. A. A. Smith place, southeast of town.

"Oil's well that ends well," we proclaimed in the paper. And this is another time we hope everything will turn out oil right!

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TEXAS TALK
By Tommie Harper

Short-season cotton is getting a fair trial in Texas' Lower Rio Grande Valley. Seven producers improved their profits by \$50 or more per acre with the short season varieties. Cutting the growing season from the usual 160-180 days for upland varieties to 130-140 days, decreased production inputs yet maintained or increased yields. There were fewer insecticide applications, fewer irrigations, less loss from rainfall during harvest, less boll weevil and tobacco budworm damage. Right now short-season cotton is best suited for the more arid cotton-producing areas, but the scientists are looking for solutions to the problems that have prevented them from raising the crop in the Southeast and Delta regions.

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
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Nursing Applications Now Being Taken
