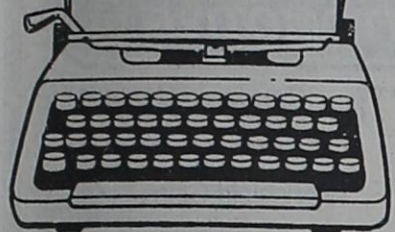


Views From Another Point

Munday And Haskell To Meet In Season Opener

The Munday Moguls will open their 1990 football season on the road Friday night, September 7 as they travel south to take on the Class AA Haskell Indians. Kickoff is at 8 p.m. for the opening night battle that has become a tradition for both teams in the past few years.

The junior varsity Moguls will host Haskell on Thursday in a 7:30 p.m. contest. Local fans are urged to be on hand for both actions to show their support for the Munday teams.

The Moguls looked good again in winning their second scrimmage of the year last Friday night against the Class AAA Merkel Badgers.

Munday won the scrimmage by a margin of four touchdowns to one, with Merkel's score coming against the JV.

Haskell's new head coach, Walter Hargrove, has seven returning offensive starters and five on defense from last year's squad that won only two

games. Strength of the Indians this year is the backfield squad and commitment.

New CPR Training Manikin Donated To Munday EMS

The Munday E.M.S. volunteers were honored to be chosen as recipients of a complete CPR training unit donated by the National Automobile Dealers Charitable Foundation and the Texas Automobile Dealers Association. Mr. John Conner, West Texas Regional Manager of the Texas Association, and Mr. Eddie Medford of Medford Buick, Pontiac, GMC of Haskell, were in Munday on August 28 to make the presentation on behalf of the association.

The Resusci Anne is an important training device to all EMS personnel as it allows them to practice and maintain their CPR skills. This CPR unit gives signals telling when the trainee is applying the right pressure in the right spot or breathing correctly into the victim's mouth.

Donations from Munday residents and the surrounding area were used to purchase Munday's first manikin about 18 years ago. Approximately 800 people have been trained in CPR with that manikin. Hopefully, the new Resusci Anne will be used to train at least that many more within the next 18 years. The older manikin will not be able to retire though, she will be used for practice and for CPR courses. Everyone who gave toward the purchase of the first Resusci Anne is greatly appreciated.

According to the American Heart Association, almost one in two

Americans dies of cardiovascular disease. Of the current U.S. population, more than one in every four Americans suffer from cardiovascular disease. Two-thirds of all deaths from a heart attack occur before the victim reaches the hospital. Research, testing and evaluation of CPR indicates that if performed properly and early enough, as many as 120,000 lives can be saved each year by using CPR. This training teaches a person how to keep the heart beating while professional help is on its way.

Q: Should Christians keep feast days and holy days?

A: Under the old covenant (we call the Old Testament), the Jews were commanded to keep several feast days. Also, out of national pride, they kept other holidays as well. These included: Passover and the Feast of the Unleavened Bread; Pentecost (feast of the first fruits); Feast of the Tabernacles; The Trumpets Day; Day of Atonement; Purim and Dedication.

Each of these days had a special significance. However, under the New Testament, many of the worship items take on a spiritual counterpart. For instance our Passover is the Lord's Supper which was instituted under the Old Testament on the night of Passover (Matthew 26) and is now eaten every Sunday (Acts 20:7).

One of the questions that the early Christians had was should they keep the Jewish holy days? The Bible's answer is specific: "Let no man therefore judge you in meat, or in drink, or in respect of a new moon, or of the sabbaths which are a shadow of things to come. The substance belongs to Christ" (Colossians 2:16-17; also see Galatians 4:8-10).

To set aside a holy day is to revert back to the physicalness of the Old Testament. To do this is just as unacceptable as offering a lamb sacrifice

since Jesus nailed the Old Testament Law to the cross (Colossians 2:13-15).

There is, however, a difference between the celebration of a special family day or national holiday. The fellowship of reunions, the national pride of defending people's freedom and traditions such as the giving of gifts, children seeking out candy eggs or dressing up as a clown or hero, all are acceptable as long as we do not make such days into special religious observances. For instance, the apostles had no problem attending the synagogue or temple to preach Christ because that's where the people were. (i.e. Acts 3:1ff; Acts 13:13ff). However, observing Christmas, Easter, Lent, or any other day as a "holy day" is unacceptable. After all, our special "rest day" is heaven (Hebrews 4:9). We meet on Sunday to partake of the memorial of Christ's death and resurrection until he comes again (1 Corinthians 11:23-26). No other "holy day" is allowed under the New Testament. The early Christians didn't celebrate such days. Centuries later, and only after the establishment of the church, did they substitute Christian symbols for pagan acts.

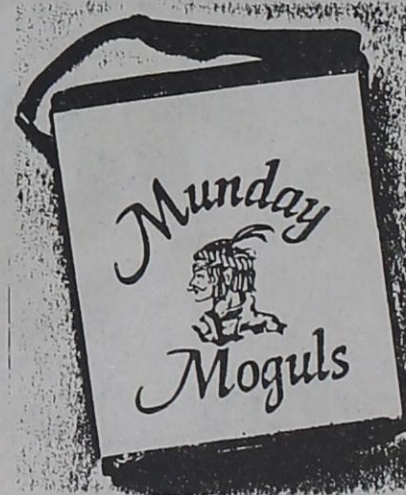




