Munday Wins District Title

Munday's defending Class A state champion track teams sailed to victory last Friday at the District 2-A track meet in Knox City. The Moguls amassed 171 points for their first place win, while the Mogulettes led the girls division with 167 points.

In the boys' competition, Memphis came in second; Valley, third; and Knox City, fourth. In the girls' contest, Spur came in behind the Mogulettes for second; Chillicothe, third; and Knox City, fourth. Eleven schools participated in the district meet.

The Moguls won nine separate events, including both relays, and totally dominated the discus competition.

County Tax Rebates Show An Increase

Knox City's whopping 59.37% increase in tax rebates for the period boosted the county total 35.03%, compared to the payment for this period last year. Both Munday and Goree showed declines of 2.66% and 5.97% respectively, while Benjamin reported no payment.

This brings the yearly totals to date for Knox County, as compared with last year's total, up 8.94%. Munday is down 4.3% for the year; Benjamin, up, 10.7%; Goree, up 9.18%; and Knox City is up, 15.97%.

April's rebates reflect taxable sales made in February.



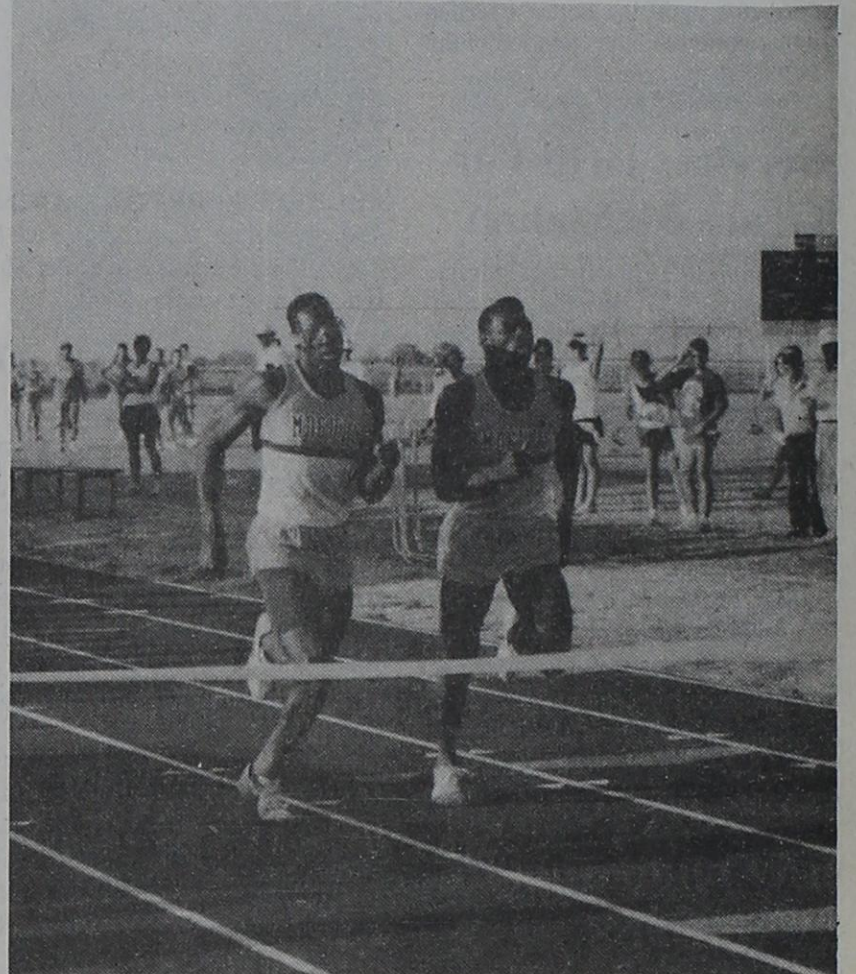

Cotton Producers Set Planting Date

Monday, May 13, has been selected as the uniform cotton planting date by Knox County cotton producers. The date was agreed upon at a meeting and fish dinner sponsored by the Knox County Extension Crops Committee and the Knox County Boll Weevil Association on April 9.

At the meeting, Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist, discussed the 1991 boll weevil pressure and the

importance of the uniform cotton planting date in the Rolling Plains. Al Alexander, Extension Agronomist, spoke about the improvement of cotton quality and the new cotton grading system that is being implemented.

Also speaking at the meeting was Stan Bevers, Extension Economist, who discussed some marketing alternatives to enhance cash prices, and Jim McCright, of the Texas Cotton Board, who spoke on the upcoming cotton referendum.

The total money raised to date is \$1,136.21. All funds will be used to provide local students an alternative to the "traditional" celebrations, with a drug and alcohol free all-night party.

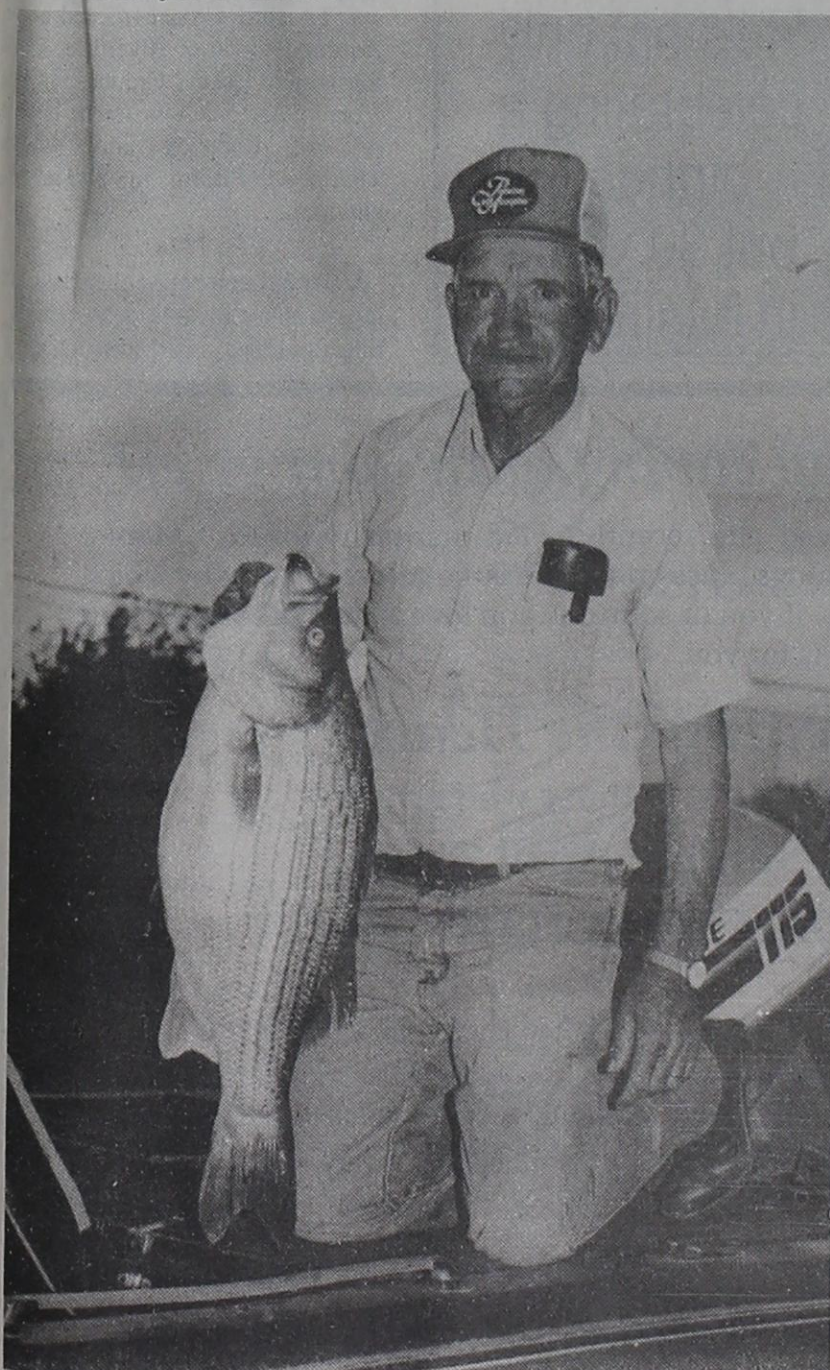

Beef And Produce Are Best April Food Buys

Texas consumers will find some good fresh produce buys in supermarkets during April, and lower beef prices enjoyed through the winter are expected to continue well into the month.

Dr. Dick Edwards, a food marketing expert with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said the expected rise in beef prices won't occur until the oversupply of cattle in feedlots clears the market during the next several weeks.

Consumers can expect ample supplies and lower prices on broccoli, cabbage, cucumbers, radishes, carrots, onions, green peas, egg plant and tomatoes in particular. However, prices may be up and supplies tighter on strawberries, asparagus and artichokes coming from drought-stricken California. Other produce making an April debut will be sweet corn, watermelons, cantaloupes and honeydews.

The cattle marketing delay will cause beef prices to remain flat for a longer time before starting the upward trend. Look for specials on round, sirloin and hamburger steaks.

Supplies of pork and chicken also are greater than they were last year, which may stabilize pork and poultry prices. Look for specials on pork steaks, chops, ribs and smoked sausage.

Other springtime specials featured at many supermarkets are charcoal, gardening and cleaning supplies and automotive care products.

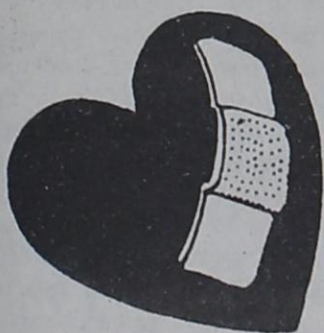

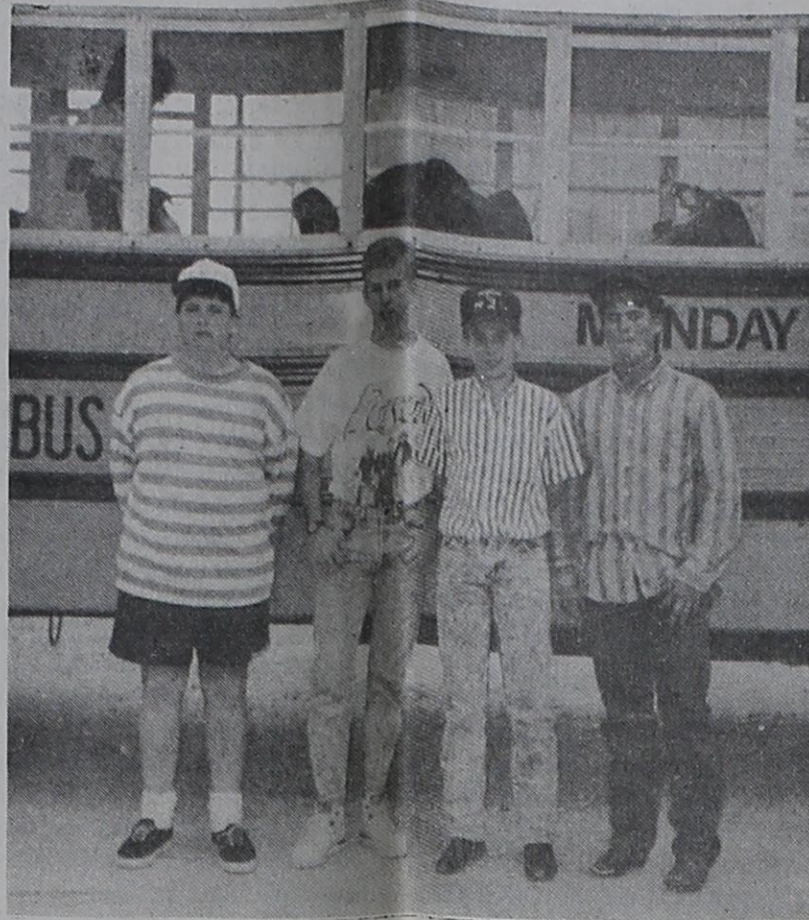

New Social Security Rules For Women

Recent changes in Social Security law respond to the growing concern over how the program treats women. The changes, effective January 1, 1991, affect disabled widows, divorcees, and spouses of invalid ceremonial marriages. The changes also apply to men, of course, but are more important to women as a group, as they are more likely to qualify for such benefits.

One change makes it easier for disabled widows to qualify for disability benefits by expanding the definition of disability for them. Under the change, widows may now qualify for disability benefits on their spouse's work on the same basis that they qualify based on their own work. This means that disabled widows may qualify if their earnings are less than \$500 a month. The effect of their age,

education and work experience on their ability to work, also will be considered.

Under the old rule, disability was evaluated solely in terms of medical findings and vocational factors were not considered.

Under another change in the law, women who marry--and later find out that their marriage is invalid--may now qualify for a benefit on the worker's Social Security record on the same basis as the legal spouse. Under previous law, these "deemed" wives could receive Social Security only if no legal spouse received benefits. The change also applies to widows and divorcees.

Under this change, a divorced spouse whose good faith ceremonial marriage turns out to be invalid may get benefits as well as the legal spouse, if the marriage lasted at least 10 years. The amount of benefits one spouse gets has no effect on the amount of benefits another spouse can get.

A third change makes it possible for a woman whose husband was receiving spouse's benefits before she and her husband were divorced to receive divorced spouse's benefits without waiting the two years usually required.

These changes represent a continuing effort to make the Social Security program more responsive to the changing needs of women. However, they are not intended to address the broader concerns raised by various groups... issues involving homemakers who lose Social Security coverage and women workers whose earnings, and thus benefits, are generally lower than those of men. These concerns are being studied by a Women's Issues Task Force, appointed several months ago by Social Security Commissioner Gwendolyn S. King. The Task Force is expected to report recommendations shortly.

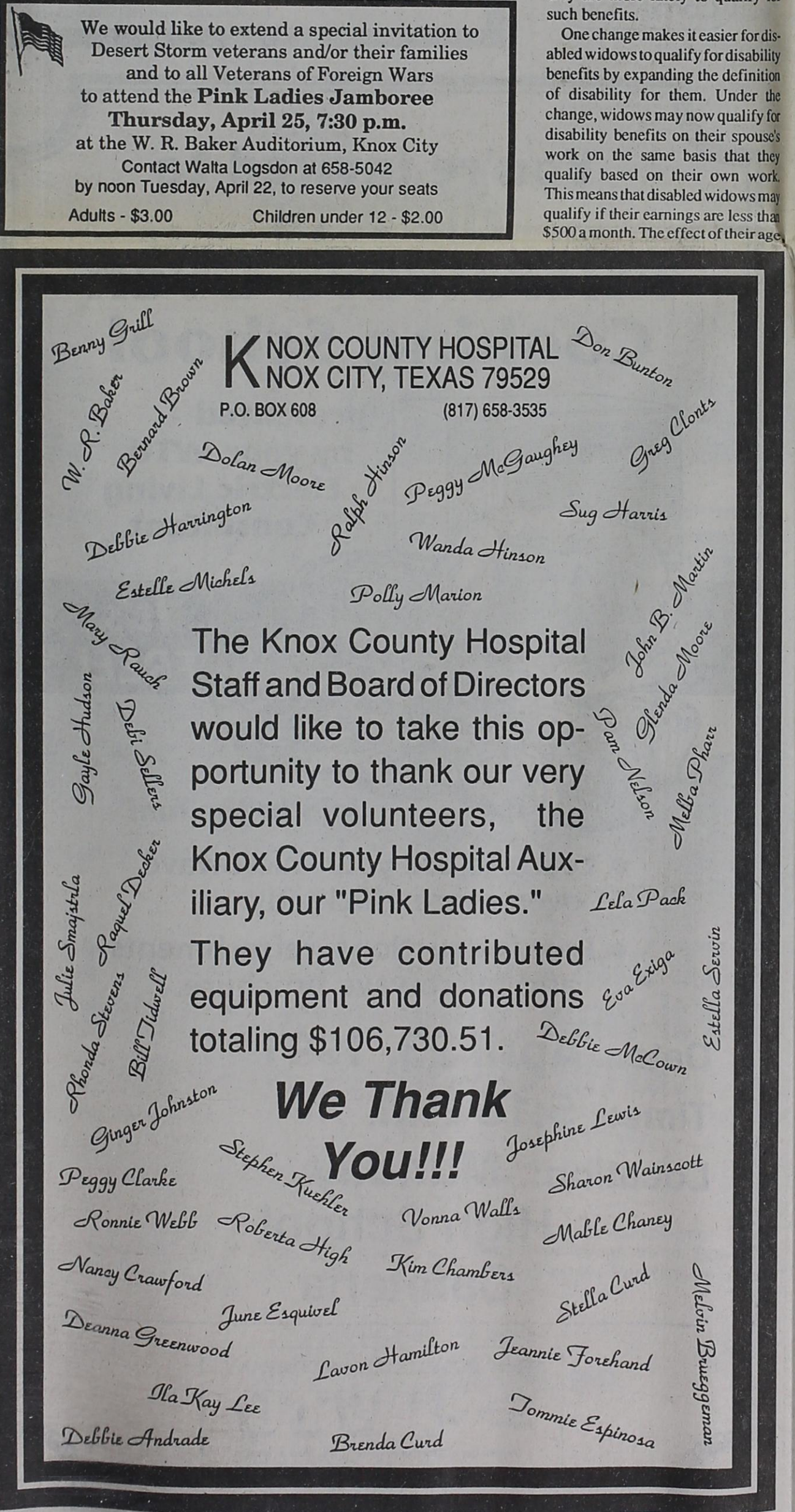

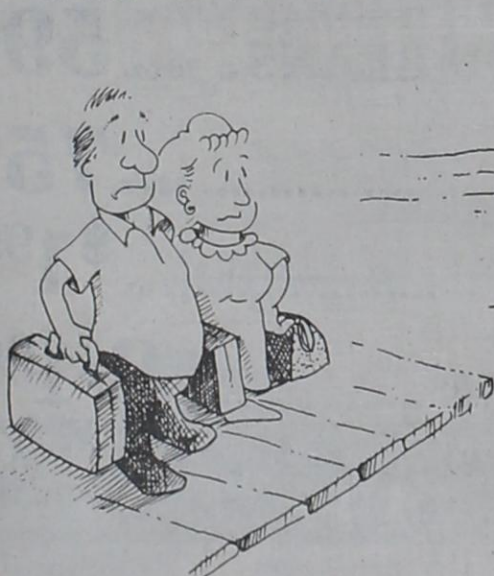

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At Your Service

Q: When a Christian dies, does he go to a waiting place or does he go directly to heaven?

A: For years Bible students have struggled with this question. The issue has been if a person goes directly to heaven, why is there a judgment at the last day of the earth? (Matthew 25:31ff). Therefore, two explanations have been offered. First, a paradise for the worthy dead is where people go prior to judgment. The term translated "paradise" is used only three times in the Bible (Luke 23:43; 2 Corinthians 12:4; Revelation 2:7). However, a similar Hebrew term is used in the Old Testament for a wonderful orchard-forest (Neh. 2:8; Eccl. 2:5; Song 4:13). The early paraphrase used by Jesus, known as the Septuagint, used the Greek "paradise" to translate several places including Eden (Gen. 2:15; 3:23), and Lot's fertile plains (Gen. 13:10). It also is used for the place where Enoch was translated in one of the non-biblical apocrypha books (Ecclesiasticus 44:16).

Another concept that has been offered is that the soul "sleeps" until the day of judgment. This idea is based upon the use of the term "sleep" to refer to the death of a believer (1 Corinthians 11:30; 1 Thessalonians 4:13).

Both the concepts of a "paradise-waiting place" and "soul sleep" are based on the notion that time works the same way in the spiritual realm as it does in the physical universe. In this century, with the advances in science brought about by Albert Einstein, we've begun to find that even our concept of time in the physical universe was wrong. Time is a measurable dimension along with length, width and depth. As one approaches the speed of light, time slows down. This has been proven in scientific tests with super-accurate atomic clocks. If time is not the constant that scientists used to consider it to be in our physical universe, then it is a mistake to consider the spiritual realm would be bound by our experience of past, present and future.

I propose that the concept of the omnipresence of God is that He exists in all places and all times -- at the same time. The Bible gives us this concept. Jesus said: "...before Abraham was, I am" (John 8:58). He didn't use the past tense for himself, but the present. As God, Jesus existed before Abraham, but in the present, not in the past. There is no time in heaven. God knows what is going to happen in our future because that isn't His future, but His present. Even the divine name given to Moses, "I AM" (Exodus 3:14), is both present and future rolled into one meaning. That's why the RSV footnotes this verse with three meanings: "I am what I am", "I am who I am", and "I will be what I will be".

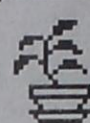
It's hard to conceive of a place without time since our experience has always been moving from the past to the future. But it begins to make sense when we realize that God has no age. Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever (Hebrews 13:8). God is from everlasting (Habakkuk 1:12). In fact, God is from everlasting to everlasting (Psalms 90:2). Such is best explained as "eternal" (Deuteronomy 33:27). John

had to invent some grammar to express this nature of God and Jesus in the Revelation. He is the one "who is and who was and who is to come" (Revelation 1:4, 8). In the Greek, John's phrasing keeps the term "He" in the present tense for each verb. Literally God is "He of the present who is in the present" and "He who is in the present who is in the past" and "He who is in the present who is in the future" (see William Barclay's *Revelation of John*, vol. 1, pp. 36-38, 1960).

Likewise, Heaven is everlasting (2 Peter 1:11; Psalms 145:13). Since Heaven isn't bound to time, then we are transported and judged in the same instant. Jesus did not indicate any type of soul sleep or waiting place in the story of the rich man and Lazarus (Luke 16:19ff).

If it is less important to know if we are immediately translated into heaven or must wait a while (as long as we do not construct some non-biblical doctrines such as praying people into heaven or being baptized to save non-saved dead relatives). What is important is that we make the individual choice to go to heaven through faithful obedience (read Matthew 7:13-14; Luke 13:23-30).

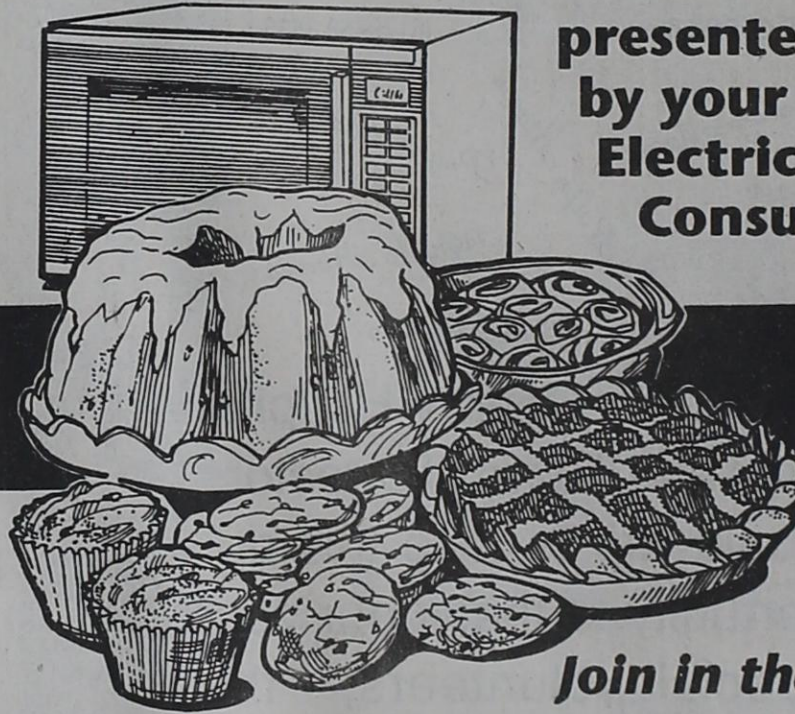

MANAGING MONEY DURING A RECESSION

Economic indicators show the United States economy has officially entered a recession. Some sound financial management steps can help you handle the tight money situations usually brought on by recession.

Don't wait for a job layoff, a health emergency, or an impossible mortgage payment to job you into action. By adopting a few smart money measures, your finances will be easier to manage if your economic situation worsens.

Here are some tips:

*** Begin now to organize your financial papers.** Select a central location and accumulate family financial information. Record all bank accounts, retirement plans, investments, and other assets. Include the institu-

tion where they are held, phone numbers and contact person if you know a name, account numbers, and amounts. List mortgage information, including financial institution address and phone number, account number, balance, monthly payments and contact person. Also, record all charge cards. Include the financial institution through which they are held, phone numbers for customer service and account numbers. Write down insurance companies, agents and phone numbers for health, home, life and auto insurance. Keep a record of social security numbers for all family members. This will all be useful information in time of crisis.

*** Analyze your financial situation.** Calculate the total amount of cash available to you in case of an emergency. Every household needs

an emergency fund, preferable equaling three to six months' worth of income. Most households have nowhere near this amount on hand. List any amounts you owe and total them so that you can get a picture of your overall debt situation. Track how much you spend for one month and compare to your income. Note what items could be trimmed down if necessary.

*** Lower your debts.** Pay off a little at a time, and do not continue to charge. As a general rule, monthly payments other than mortgage should total less than 20% of take-home pay. If you are feeling over your head in regard to debts, consider going to a no-charge credit counseling office for assistance.

*** Increase your cash on hand.** If your family's emergency fund needs beefing up, try to come up with ways you can add to the total. Make a practice of adding any raises, bonuses, overtime pay, or "extra" money directly to the emergency fund.

*** Consider your job situation.** If your company or individual job situation seems at danger during hard economic times, prepare for the worst. Begin to notice what jobs are available for which you would be qualified if you lost your job. Update your resume. Do not change jobs unless you can see major advantages in the change, so that any seniority you have accrued will be safeguarded.

*** Don't worry, be happy.** Find ways to entertain yourself and your family that don't cost much. Concentrate on having fun, not saving money!

KEEP EGGS FRESH

Eggs that are stored uncovered in the refrigerator lose moisture and can absorb odors from other foods. For optimal taste and freshness, store them in the cartons you bought them in and use within five weeks of purchase.

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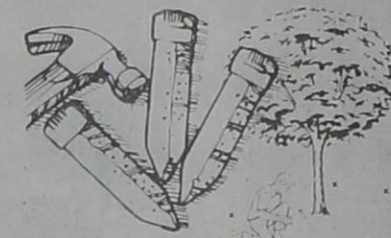

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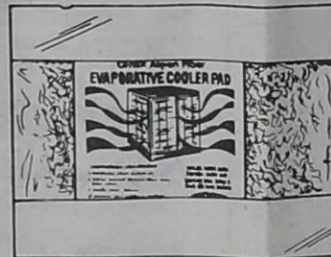

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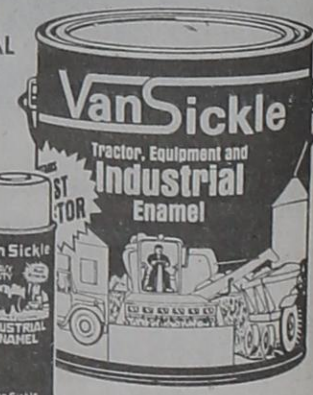

The Fishing Doc

By "Doc" Fitzgerald

Millers Creek Reservoir Level and condition: full and clear. Temperature: 63° F

Black Bass: Good to 8 lbs. on nearly all lures. Hitting all depths but best in main lakes near rocky shorelines.

Striper: Good to 16 lbs. on trolling lures near dam. Many limits reported.

White Bass: Fair. Some being caught in running water. Some reports of sandies near dam areas. Mostly small though.

Catfish: Good on trotline in deep water. Best baits are perch, live minnows and crayfish. Fair on poles in main lake areas on Tan Bait, cheese and blood. Largest reported at 42 lbs.

Crappie: Fair to fairly good. Many small fish being caught in creeks but few limits of legal fish reported. Best on minnows and tube jigs.

Rough Fish: Carp and drum are running good to 7 lbs. on Tan Bait and minnows.

Fishing Tip

Q: Why do crappie prefer shade so much?

A: Crappie, more than any other fish in our waters, prefer shade. They are seldom caught where there is no cover or underwater structure. The primary reason is the design of the fish's eye. The crappie's pupil remains in a state of complete dilation. It does not contract to compensate for sunlight.

Have you ever been inside a dark room such as a movie theatre and then come directly out into bright sunlight? Your eye is blinded and you have to squint through tears to see? Imagine having your eye permanently that sensitive. During bright daylight it's best to look for crappie in shade. They prefer brushy places with access to deep water and lots of minnows. Docks and bridges which afford shade are also good "crappie holes". Areas in which fishermen keep brushed are prime spots for ole papermouth. That's why it's never a good idea to remove brush from a fishing spot.

'Tis The SeasonTo Sneeze!

People who suffer from seasonal allergies already know that the season started early this year. Their sneezing, itching and congestion told them so.

"The pollen that brings misery to sufferers appeared early due to a mild winter," said Dr. David P. Huston, associate professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

In temperate areas, tree pollens usually are heavy in March, succeeded in the coming months by other pollens. January and February are relatively irritant-free for many areas.

Some people are afflicted with perennial allergies in addition to seasonal allergies. These are the people allergic to things which are present in their environments year-round, such as pet dander, dust and mold.

Over-the-counter relief is available for allergies that cause runny noses, itchy eyes and congestion. Those most commonly used are antihistamines, but they can cause drowsiness. Prescription drugs, including antihistamines that do not cause drowsiness, are available through physicians.

"Allergy shots are not necessarily the first line of therapy," Huston said. "The shots do help some people, but they should be reserved for patients whose allergy symptoms cannot be adequately controlled in other ways."

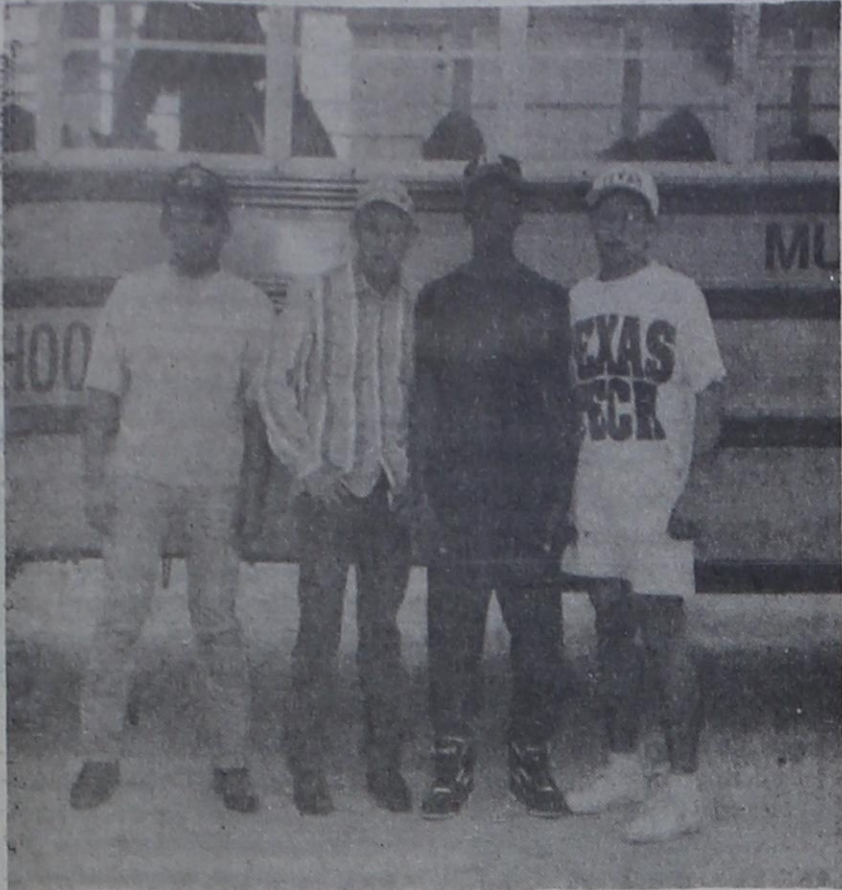

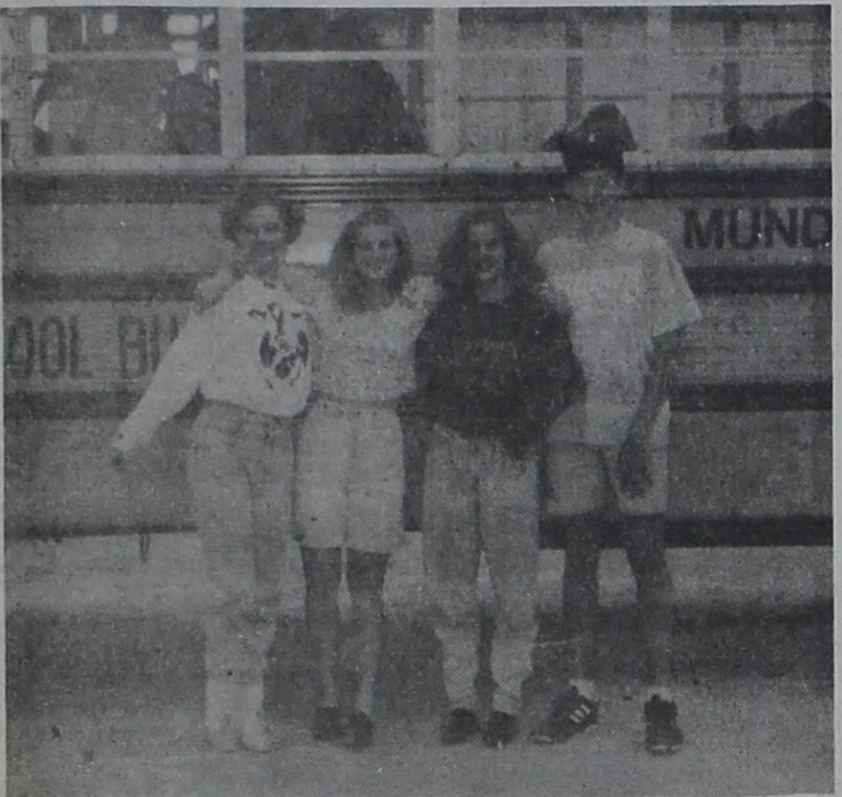

CITY OF MUNDAY ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE BURNING OF TRASH & WASTE

An ordinance regulating the burning of trash and waste materials within the corporate limits of the city of Munday, Texas; prohibiting the burning of trash or waste within the city limits of said city; prescribing conditions under which trash and waste may be burned within said city; and providing penalties for violations.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Munday, Texas:

Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to burn any trash, waste or rubbish within the city of Munday, Texas, or to start or maintain fires within such city of Munday, Texas, as are set out and defined by ordinances now in force or may hereinafter be enlarged or changed by an ordinance which may hereinafter be enacted. It is not intended hereby to prohibit the burning of trash or rubbish or waste in any stove or furnace within any building provided with proper flues or chimneys; but all fires are prohibited within said city, save and except, in stoves or furnaces within buildings, and burning of grass under the supervision of the Munday Fire Department.

Section 2. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to burn any trash, waste or rubbish within the corporate limits of the city of Munday, Texas in any street, alley, or on any premises adjoining any street, alley, vacant lot or parcel of land. It being intended hereby to prohibit the starting or maintaining of any fires in the city of Munday, Texas, other than in stoves or furnaces within buildings.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$200.00.

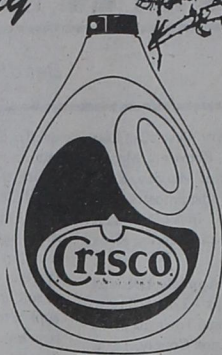

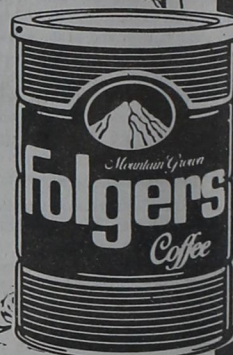
