New Federal Minimum Wage Effective Jan. 1

Secretary of Labor Ray Marshall reminds employers and employees that the federal minimum wage increases to \$2.65 an hour on January 1. The increase will bring a pay raise of \$2.2 billion to 4.5 million workers.

The new minimum wage was passed by Congress as an amendment to the Fair Labor Standards Act and was signed into law by President Carter on Nov. 1, 1977.

The law provides for the minimum wage to increase annually over the next three years until it is \$3.35 an hour beginning on Jan. 1, 1981.

"Overall, more than 5.3 million workers will be affected by the minimum wage increases," Secretary Marshall said. "The new law will help to lift them out of a poverty situation so that they can maintain at least a minimum standard of living. " The Department of Lab-

The new legislation also phases down the tip credit from 50 to 40 percent of the minimum wage beginning Jan. 1. 1979. Under the current tip credit provision, tips can be counted toward the minimum wage for up to a maximum of 50 percent of the minimum wage, or the amount of tips actually received whichever is lower. The amendments reduce the percentage rate to 45 percent effective Jan. 1, 1979, and to 40 percent on Jan. 1, 1980.

Dear Editor, We are not violent people, and we, like millions of other farmers, do not like the word "strike". However, we have given in to the usage of the word, because this seems to be the only word that can capture the attention of the public.

It is time that the American farmer finds out for himself, just exactly how he is being "used" by our government. We produce the ONLY thing that people absolutely CANNOT live without, and yet, we are the only business in America that cannot set a price for their product. We have to take what the buyers will give us. We are allowing the Chicago Board of Trade (people who probably don't even know a kernel of corn from a grain of wheat!) to TELL us what they will give us for the food we produce. No other business would stand for such an outrage! And yet, as I said previously, ---OURS is the only product that people cannot live without. It seems to us, that the farmers should have the Chicago Board of Trade by the noose, instead of vice versa!

Many people have the mistaken idea that 100% parity would cause a spiraling inflation. The truth is quite the opposite! Statistics prove that economy has

Some California Extension crop specialists, apparently with free time on their hands, have put figures to the amount of water needed to produce various foods and sundries.

They based their findings on an acre-foot of water, which is 4,840 square yards, 12 inches deep or 326,000 gallons, about what a family of five uses annually.

They found it takes more than two acre-feet to produce 6,000 pounds of wheat per acre or 136 gallons to produce a one-pound loaf of bread.

One acre-foot equals 14,000 pounds of potatoes (23 gallons per pound), 2,600 pounds of tomatoes (125 gallons of water per pound) and 47 gallons to make a pound' of oranges.

If a man's shirt takes a half pound of cotton lint, that means 447 gallons of water per shirt. It takes 233 gallons of water to produce a quart of milk.

Which goes to show how valuable our water is and how important it is to conserve it.
