Plans are being completed! The welcome mat is out, and happiness is expected to prevail in big fashion in Munday this weekend.

It's the date - Saturday, October 21 - of the homecoming of ex-students, ex-teachers and friends of the Munday schools, who will be returning, many of them, to Munday after an absence of at least three years.

For many it will be family reunions too, for they will be coming for homecoming both with their classmates and with their parents and other loved ones. This will be experienced in a number of homes.

Getting ready for homecoming has been a big job for officers of the ex-students association and those committee members who have been making plans for months. In fact, the first meeting of the officers was held in April, and they have been meeting regularly the last two months to try and give you the best homecoming yet.

In past years, there was a homecoming speaker, but no more. They have come to realize that the crowd had rather be engaged in "remember whens" than listen to a speech. So, here are some of the things exes can expect come Saturday, October 21.

Registration will begin at 9 a.m. at the high school; however, the building will be open all day for visitation.

A display of old pictures and other memorabilia of the past will be on display in the library.

A snack bar will be open in the cafeteria for those who want to visit over a snack. Proceeds will go to the Senior class.

Old football movies will be shown in a classroom in high school. Directions to the room will be up Saturday. They will be shown from 10 - 11 a.m. and 1 - 2 p.m.

The general assembly program will be at 2 p.m. in the auditorium, with each class sitting in sections as marked on the center row of seats.

A pep rally will follow the assembly at 3:30 in the gym. The pep squad will have homecoming mums for sale. You may order one from any member of the pep squad.

A chili supper will be served in the cafeteria from 4:30 to 7 p.m. by the senior class. The price is \$2.50 for adults and \$1.75 for children.

The homecoming ballgame will be at 7:30 p.m. featuring the Munday Moguls and the Knox City Greyhounds. These two teams always provide lots of action, but this year, these two teams are tied for first in the district as both are undefeated in district play.

A homecoming queen from high school and a coming home queen selected during the day will be crowned at half-time. The coming home queen is selected in the following way. As each ex-student lady registers, she signs her name on a slip of paper and drops it in the box marked with the proper year as follows: 1919-1929; 1930's, 1940's; 1950's; 1960's; 1970's. One name will be drawn from each box, and the six candidates will be announced at the 2 p.m. assembly.

The committee will draw one name from those six, and the queen will be crowned at half-time. Completing the homecoming activities will be a dance held at the Rhineland Gym for those interested. Music will be provided by Edward Melton and the Kuntry Kings.

There are some class parties planned for classes. Those known about are: 1944 will meet in the Cottage Inn following the pep rally; 1948-49 will meet in the Benny Melton home at 4:30; 1966-67-68 will meet in the Community Center following the football game.

### Disaster Assistance Deadline Extended

Congressman Omar Burleson advises that the Small Business Administration has extended its previously announced deadline for applying for disaster assistance due to drought and hail. The previously announced deadline of October 11, 1978, has been extended until November 13, 1978 for physical damage

and January 11, 1979 for economic injury. The counties affected, due to disaster by drought, were Baylor, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Jack, Knox, Montague, Palo Pinto, Parker, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Wise Counties, while Crosby and Floyd Counties were affected due to hail.

### Moguls Tied For District Play Hounds Saturday

The Mighty Moguls won their second district contest of the season by defeating the Paducah Dragons 24-0 in action Friday night at Paducah. The Moguls, now 2-0 in district will take on the Knox City Greyhounds this week during homecoming activities in Munday. Knox City is the only undefeated team in the district for the season.

Defensively, Mogul team members Johnny Melton, Montie McAfee, Wayne Mints and Bobby Therwanger put pressure on the Dragons on turnovers. Melton recovered two fumbles, one that lead to a TD and another to a field goal. McAfee interception was also turned into 6 points by the Mogul offense. Therwanger and Mints halted drives with their interceptions.

The Mogul offensive moved the ball on the ground and in the air. Blocking has improved some and backs are following their blockers.

It will take hard work this week to prepare for the Greyhounds.

Munday took the opening kickoff and Murray returned the ball 21 yards to the 35. Moving the ball to the Dragons 47, Welch punted to the 12 with Dragon Kenneth Jones returning it 6 yards to the 18.

A tough defense halted the Dragons drive on the 50 and a punt went to the 11 where Douglas Michalik returned it to the 18.

Murray, Dockins and Paylor moved the ball on the ground and Therwanger, Sanders and Welch caught passes of 13, 23 and 7 respectively from quarter-

back Randy Routon. Back Craig Paylor came into the game on first and goal from the 9. He carried for 3 and on third and 6 he crossed the goal line assisted by the blocks of Dockins, Michalik and Welch. Welch added the one pointer with 2:10 left in the first period.

Timmons and Porter moved the ball to the 30 and on 3rd and 6, Keith Sanders, defensive end dropped the quarterback for a 5 yard loss to the 35. With fourth and 11 the interior defensive line of the Moguls stopped Timmons for no gain and the ball went to the Moguls.

Now into the second quarter Murray and Paylor moved the ball to the 43 and Routon was dropped for a 10 yard loss back to the 33. Welch hit a 36 yard punt to



Routon hit Michalik for 9 yards then a holding penalty cost the Moguls 15 yards. A completed pass to Therwhanger for 18 yards gave the Moguls a first down. Three more attempted passes fell incomplete and the Moguls punted to the 26.

On the Dragons series on second and 9, Johnny Melton recovered his first fumble of the night on the Paducah 28.

Murray and Dockins moved the ball to the one yard line and Kevin Herring got within six inches of the goal on his carry. On the next play Randy Routon went in on a quarterback sneak. Welch added the PAT.

On the Dragons next series their march was

halted by a pass interception by defensive back Montie McAfee.

In eight plays the Moguls scored on a pass to end Bobby Therwhanger good for 18 yards. The PAT by Welch made it 21-0 in the first of the fourth quarter.

Johnny Melton then recovered his second fumble of the night on the 34 with a return to the 43. Munday then fumbled the ball to Paducah and on the next play the Moguls forced the Dragons to fumble and Johnny Melton recovered his second for the night.

Munday received to 15 yard penalties and started on their own 13. Murray carried the ball 3 times for 14, Paylor 1 for 21, Dockins 1 for 2 and Omar Chouair 6 for 24 in setting up the final score on a 28 yard field goal by Welch.

## Munday and Knox City Receive October Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that his office has sent checks totaling \$23.3 million to Texas cities as their October share of the local option one percent sales tax.

The October rebates raise the cities' total for the year to \$329.9 million, \$41.5 million over the same period last year.

Houston was sent a check for \$5.2 million, raising the city's total for the year to \$69.3 million. This is a 19 percent increase over last

year. The city of Dallas will get \$2.6 million, bringing its total for the year to \$38.6 million, up 9 percent.

San Antonio will get \$1.2 million, making its year to date total \$19 million, up 9 percent.

Fort Worth's check for the month totaled \$866,501, raising its total to \$13.7 million, and Austin will get \$794,592 for a total of \$11.1 million for the year.

Corpus Christi will receive a check for \$478,845,

raising its total for the year to \$6.6 million. This is a 13 percent increase over last year.

The sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's Office.

Rebates in Knox County went to Munday with \$1,338.92 and Knox City, \$1,701.87.

## City Accepts Bid On Truck

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met October 10, 1978 in regular session at 7 p.m. at the Munday City Hall.

Members present included: A. Dale Selzer, mayor; Ray Lynn Hardin, Donald Hobert, M. M. Booe, Von Marr and Jessie Andrade, aldermen.

Mayor Selzer called the meeting to order. Andrade led in prayer at the mayors request.

City administrator Walter Hertel read the minutes of the September 25 Special Meeting. Booe moved for approval with a second from Andrade. All for.

Mr. Otis Spann met with the Council to request drainage near his home. After discussion, Walter Hertel, City Administrator agreed to open the ditch as soon as possible. Mr. Spann left the meeting.

Police business was discussed with no official action needed.

Bids on the 1955 Chevrolet truck were opened. Three sealed bids were received. They were from Jim Reid, \$351.50; Donald Hobert, \$398.00 and Alvin Adams, \$425.00. Hobert moved the truck be sold to Alvin Adams for \$425.00. Booe seconded and all for.

Mayor Selzer next read a proposed ordinance in regard to retention of the 1% sales tax on electric and gas utilities. After discussion, Marr moved the ordinance be passed and one copy sent to the State Comptroller by registered or certified mail, the ordinance which is to be filed in the Sales Tax File in full text retains the 1% Sales Tax on electric and natural gas bills as presently paid to Munday. Hardin seconded and all members voted in favor.

A check from the Farm Bureau to Ray Lynn Hardin to pay a part of the Fire School expenses was presented to the council. The Council discussed this reimbursement and instructed the City Administrator to deposit the check to the Citys General Funds to re-imburse funds already paid by the City and the City is to re-imburse one-third of

the \$140.25 to the Fire Department to re-imburse the portion paid by the department.

City Administrator next recommended a trip be made by Donald Hobert, alderman over water, and himself to cities of the Greenbelt Water Authority to check on rates they are charging for water, problems encountered, etc. This is to be done prior to setting a new water rate. Andrade moved this be done. Marr seconded and all voted for.

The City Administrator reported on progress in repairing wash-out damage to the drainage ditch as required by the Corps of Engineers. It is estimated, weather permitting and machinery not breaking

Hardin made a motion that bills be paid as follows: Airport Fund, \$43.90; Ambulance Fund, \$156.38; Operating Fund, \$8904.48. Marr seconded, and all members voted for.

Meeting adjourned by unanimous approval.



### History Of Munday In Planning Stage

A Historical Society group has been formed in Munday. The aim and purpose of the newly formed organization is to prepare and print an 86 year old history of Munday.

## Hill Caravan Stops In Munday

Attorney General John Hill will win the race for Governor because Texas voters have never been fooled by big money campaigns such as the \$7 million extravaganza being conducted by the Republicans, according to a group of Hill supporters taking part in a campaign caravan.

The caravan, one of 10 traveling around the state this week, visited in Munday last Wednesday and is headed by Melinda Hill

Perrin. "The Republican candidate for governor was the Texas director of the 1972 campaign group—the Nixon Committee to Re-elect the President—that fostered the Watergate scandal," the caravan leader said.

"So it's no wonder we are starting to see the 'dirty tricks' type of campaign from our Republican opposition. The Watergate scandal taught us that a campaign that is as overfinanced as

the 1972 Nixon campaign breeds mischief and deceit, because they've got too much money to spend it sensibly.

"Our Republican opponent said he plans to spend \$7 million to win the Governor's race—more than twice what John Hill will spend, and it's more than any governor's race in our nation's history except the Nelson Rockefeller race in New York in 1970.

"He's going to spend more on mailouts than we will spend on our entire campaign."

"With all this money to spend, it's no wonder the Republicans can afford to pay staff to spend time planting phony stories, like the recent one in the Dallas Morning News. That story has been discredited—as will all the other dirty tricks cooked up by the Republican opponent—by the press of the news media.

"John Hill is running his race on the issues, but his Republican opponent has offered no reason for his own election except his willingness to spend 'whatever it takes' to win."

## Ditch Repairs Progressing

Work began last week on the drainage ditch south of Munday to repair damage done during the heavy rains in August.

Personnel from the City of Munday plus equipment, city loader and two trucks, have been working to complete the work as prescribed by the Corps of Engineers, also two bulldozers have been hired by the hour as needed. Actual cost of the work, not including City machinery and labor, will be approximately \$1,500.

Value of the work if hired from outside would be approximately five thousand to six thousand dollars, (estimated).

Due to a lack of funds in the Knox County Drainage District #1 funds, the City machinery and labor is being used to meet requirements of repair as deemed necessary by the Corps of Engineers. The Corps will inspect the work after completion.

The work being done consists of repairing washouts and gulleys made by the water pouring into the ditch at various places. Dirt is being hauled to the sites, while the dozers have finished pushing some of the washed in soil back upon the sides of the ditch.

The ditch saved the City of Munday and its citizens from serious flooding during the downpours in August.
