Three Winners From Munday To PP&K Zone Competition

Munday competitors in the Annual Punt, Pass and Kick contest, sponsored by Bill Wilson Motor Co. of Haskell, brought home three first places out of a possible six and seven trophies Saturday from Indian Stadium.

Qualifying for the zone competition to be held at Rose Park in Abilene Saturday, October 14 at 10:00 a.m. were: Quinn Smith, Dent Offutt and David Hertel of Munday; Kelly Strickland and Keith Reid of Haskell and Chris Rogers of Knox City.

The top three places in each age division included:

8 year olds - Chris Rogers of Knox City, 51 ft. punt, 38 ft. pass, 29 ft. kick for a total of 118 ft.; second, Mark McAdams of Haskell, 29-52-27 total 108; third, Marty Decker, 36-26-36 total 103. This division had a three way tie of 103 ft. and the run-off was held to determine the winners above. Entered from Munday in this age division were: Trey Thompson, Glen Reid and Lowell Hutchens.

9 year olds - David Hertel of Munday, 33-64-26 total 123; second, Kevin White of Knox City, 45-52-17 total 114; and third, Stephen Rodriguez of Haskell, 35-46-23 total 104. Kevin won the run-off for second place by defeating Rodriguez.

10 year olds - Kelly Strickland of Haskell, 62-53-62 total 177; second,

Tim Johnson of Haskell, 44-65-60 total 169 and third, Todd Thompson of Munday, 61-58-47 total 166. James Gass and Jeffrey Bruce were entered from Munday.

11 year olds - Dent Offutt of Munday, 64-74-47 total 185; second, Greg Urbanczyk of Munday, 58-81-39 total 178 and third, Terry Lynn Lowrey of Knox City, 61-59-49 total 169. Russell Smith of Munday competed in this age division.

12 year old - Quinn Smith of Munday, 68-82-69 total 219; second, Robert Ivey of Haskell, 66-66-41 total 173; and third, Brad Angerer of Munday, 42-62-60 total 164.

13 year old - Keith Reid of Haskell, 85-101-54 total 240; second, Robert Lehrer of Haskell, 55-96-78 total 229; and third, Pat Angerer of Munday, 71-69-75 total 215.

Sixty-eight boys were entered in the competition and Munday competitors numbered twelve. Out of the 12 from Munday seven finished in the top three of the six divisions.

Congratulations to the winners and to those who competed in a very sportsmanlike manner.

Birth certificates will be required at the zone competition. Rules and regulations should be checked for the proper athletic shoes. If they do not meet the PP&K official equipment specifications the participant will be disqualified.

Aquifer Study To Be Released

A copy of the comprehensive study of the Seymour Aquifer has been received by the Chamber of Commerce recently. The copy shall be reviewed by the engineer, Mr. Rollin Harden, Rollen Hardin & Associates, and Mr. David Barker, Texas Department of Water Resources at the Chamber of Commerce on October 17th at 1:00 p.m.

This study culminates a 40-month study of the aquifer by Mr. Harden, geologist and ground-water hydrologist. The study was funded by a \$250,000 grant by the Department of Water Resources, through the efforts of the Munday

Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. The final print-out will be made available in approximately 60 days. All interested persons are invited to attend the review to be held next week.

Working with the engineering firm and the Department of Water Resources as an area Advisory Committee are: M. L. Wiggins, Clint Norman, Callie Ann Combs of Munday, Calvin Christensen, Seymour, A. A. Cox, Knox City and Joe B. Cloud of Rule. Representing the local water resources committee is Dr. Bill Kingston, president of the Munday Chamber.

Moguls Down Indians 20-6 Share Lead In District

The Munday Moguls overcame their defeat by Hamlin two weeks ago to down the Quannah Indians 20-6 Friday night in their District 7-A opener.

Isom Murray scored two touchdowns in the contest. The first one on a screen pass from quarterback Randy Routon for 45 yards. Murray then took a Quannah punt and returned it 92 yards for his second 6 points. Routon hit end Larry Welch in the fourth quarter for 14 yards and the TD. Welch added two 1 point PATs.

Quannah took the opening kickoff and moved to their own 26 before punting to the Moguls 35. On the next play Indian Keith Melton recovered a Mogul fumble on the Moguls 36. Moving the ball to the 21 and 4th and 7 Mogul Douglas Michalik intercepted a Wood's pass.

Munday was penalized 10 yards for illegal use of hands and started their drive on the 9. Dockins carried twice for 8 and Routon hit Michalik for 14 to give them first and ten on the 31. A gain of 5 and a loss of 2 forced Welch into punt formation.

After a 33 yard punt Quannah took over on the 45 on a 12 yard return. On 4th and 6 David Wood punted to the Mogul 31.

An incomplete pass and 7 yards rushing in two plays forced another Mogul punt of 37 yards.

Two penalties totaling 20 yards put the Indians on their 19 yard line. A march up field of 65 yards put Quannah on the Moguls 16. A five yard penalty moved the ball to the 21 where the Indians attempted a field goal on fourth down. Defensive end Larry Welch blocked the attempt and recovered the ball on the 36.

Munday made 3 yards in 3 plays and punted to the Indian 23.

On 4 and 2 Quannah punted to the 30 of Munday. Murray returned it to the 35. An incomplete pass from Routon to Welch and another attempt was intercepted by Indian David Wood who raced to the end zone for a 38 yard TD. The PAT failed and Quannah led 6-0.

Murray returned the kickoff to the 40 and a 15 yard penalty for face mask put the ball on the Munday 45. Then the screen to Murray with 1:09 left in the second quarter tied the score 6-6. Welch booted the PAT and Munday led 7-6.

On the Indians next drive

a fumble was recovered by Mogul Wayne Mints on the Quannah 21. A penalty, 2 plays and incomplete pass, Munday attempted a field goal from the 23 which failed.

Quannah gained one yard and the first half ended with Munday ahead 7-6.

Munday received the second half kickoff and Craig Paylor returned it to the Indians 37. Six plays later on 4th and one the Indians held the Moguls and took over on the 16.

Three plays later Quannah punted to the 37. A fumble by Munday was recovered by Quannah's Barney Barnett on the 42. A pass from Wood to end Darrel Kennon provided a first and ten on the 32. On 4th and one the Mogul defense tightened and held the Indians.

On fourth and 16 Welch punted to the Indians 39. Quannah was forced to punt on 4th and 9 and Murray added his second score on a 92 yard return. Welch kicked the PAT. Munday 18-Quannah 6.

Quannah returned the kickoff to the 24. A personal foul moved the ball to the 11 and a roughing the kicker against Munday put the ball back out to the 26. On 4th

Agency Included In The United Fund Campaign

UNITED FUND SUPPORTS AMERICAN RED CROSS

The American Red Cross stands by in case of emergencies. After the recent floods, the American Red Cross spent \$16,000 in Haskell, \$42,000 in Albany and \$90,000 in Graham. They helped 450 families with groceries, medical care, clothing and bedding.

Fifty-percent of the money raised in the Munday United Fund Campaign goes to the National Red Cross headquarters and fifty percent stays in Munday. The money is spent locally for bloodmobiles semi-annually. It pays for the cookies and

juices given to the donors. As a result of the bloodmobiles, any person living within Knox County who has a need for blood either by surgery or accident, can advise the hospital that they are members of the Red River Blood Bank and the blood will not have to be paid for or replaced. They are only charged for the administration of the blood at the hospital. There are a few hospitals who do not participate in the program, however. The local Red Cross has also provided assistance to servicemen and an out-of-town resident who needed assistance traveling to the funeral for a relative. This request was granted and the money was repaid later. Local funds can be used for emergency aid of various needs.

The Knox County Chapter of the American Red Cross requested \$500.00 from the United Campaign this year and the Budget and Admissions Committee approved their request of \$500.00.

Letters To The Editor

Editor's Note: These two articles were submitted to the board members of the Munday United Fund in support of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center of Abilene. Mr. and Mrs. Douglas have given their permission to have them released in the Munday Courier.

September 15, 1978
Dear Board Members:

May I take this opportunity to write a personal letter in support and praise for the services of West Texas Rehabilitation Center. Words can not adequately express my deep feeling for the services I have received.

As you may recall, the last week in January, my left hand was severely burned by hot peanut brittle. The handle on the pan turned with the contents spilling on my hand, the burner, and down the cabinet. My family doctor did a wonderful job and my hand healed. As it healed, the hand drew in and I could not straighten my fingers or make a fist. I could tell that as hot weather came in April I was not gaining use of my fingers. The heat from the sun made my hand swell. Therefore on April 5, I asked my doctor to refer me for therapy.

When the occupational therapist, Linda Veale, examined the movement of my hand; she said you must have a Jobst Glove. The glove will keep your hand from swelling and gradually remove the hypertropic scarring. She said you need a splint to wear two hours in the morning and two hours in the afternoon. You must sleep in it all night to straighten those fingers. She showed me exercises to do at home three times a day. These exercises helped me to be able to move my fingers, make a fist and etc.

For the next two months, I went once weekly for therapy. Now I go once a month for a check-up. The therapist hopes that in a year my hand will be completely healed. The therapist was friendly, just gave you hope, yet most sincere and honest. They tell you exactly how it is - if the therapy will help or not.

Douglas and I have supported the Rehab in the past and will continue our support because we've seen and felt the love of these people with their service. Surely this is an example of God's work in our world, made possible from the gifts of many people.

Dear Board Members:

This letter is written to you in support of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center. It has so grown that it now operates from the headquarters in Abilene and from centers in San Angelo and Snyder.

With all the advances made over the years, WTRC clings to the basic philosophy on which it was founded. That is, all who are referred

to the center for treatment are accepted - without regard to race, national origin, sex, severity of the ailment, or the ability of the patient or his family to pay. Referrals are made by family doctors.

Today the WTRC is a vast enterprise operating under a single non-profit corporation which offers diagnostic and therapy treatments for people of all ages, the crippled, and along with them the blind, the deaf and those with multiple handicaps brought on by disease or accident.

WTRC has served people in our community over the years in the past and will continue to do so. Children in our local school have had speech screening, speech therapy, audiological and psychological evaluations, and physical therapy. As a result from these screenings, some parents, still take their children weekly for therapy. It is evident that these services to our school has helped our teachers be more understanding and do a better job of teaching our children.

Many adults from our community have also gone to WTRC for Physical or Occupational therapy treatments due to broken bones, severe burns, strokes or other handicapping conditions.

Executive Director Shelly V. Smith said that 72 cents of every Rehab dollar went directly to patient treatment and care service.

Because it accepts all who are referred to it regardless of financial status; the WTRC must look to gifts to support its work. Funds to support this work come from gifts by those who believe in helping their fellowman through helping an institution which serves all who come to it.

The United Fund has supported the WTRC in the past and has seen the results from our own people. These gifts will be helping our fellowman to be able to work or function better. These services can only be provided through our gifts. I would strongly endorse our community's continued support of these services that cannot be purchased with our own dollars.

Retirement Test

Are you receiving a social security check and still working? If so, you may be interested in some recent changes in what you can earn and still draw Social Security.

What you can earn now depends on your age. If you are under 65 years old you may earn as much as \$3,240.00 in a year and draw all of your Social Security. If you earn over that amount, one dollar of Social Security will be withheld for each two dollars you earn.

If you are 65 or older in any part of a year and not yet 72, you may earn up to \$4,000.00 and receive all of your Social Security. For all earnings over \$4,000.00 one dollar of Social Security will be withheld for each two dollars you earn. Of course, you may earn all you want beginning with the month you are 72 years old and still draw all of your Social Security.

Before this year, many school teachers, farmers, students, and others received Social Security checks for some months regardless of what their total earnings were for the year. They did this because in some months their earnings were less than a small monthly amount or they did little or no work in their business.

Beginning in 1978, these people can draw Social Security checks because of low monthly earnings in one and only one year. After that one year, the amount they can draw will depend entirely on the amount of their annual earnings—just like everyone else.

You should consult your local Social Security office to find out how these rules apply to you. Of course, none of these rules apply to people drawing disability checks. If a disabled person goes to work he should report it immediately to Social Security.

Director To Be Elected In Zone 5 of WBSWCD

An election for a director to serve in Zone 5 on the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 12 at the Gilliland Gin announced L. D. Offutt, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 10:00 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 21 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own own land in the zone he represents, be 21 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 5 of the district includes all of Knox County North of South Wichita River.

The purpose of the Wichita Brazos SWCD, with headquarters in Knox City is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

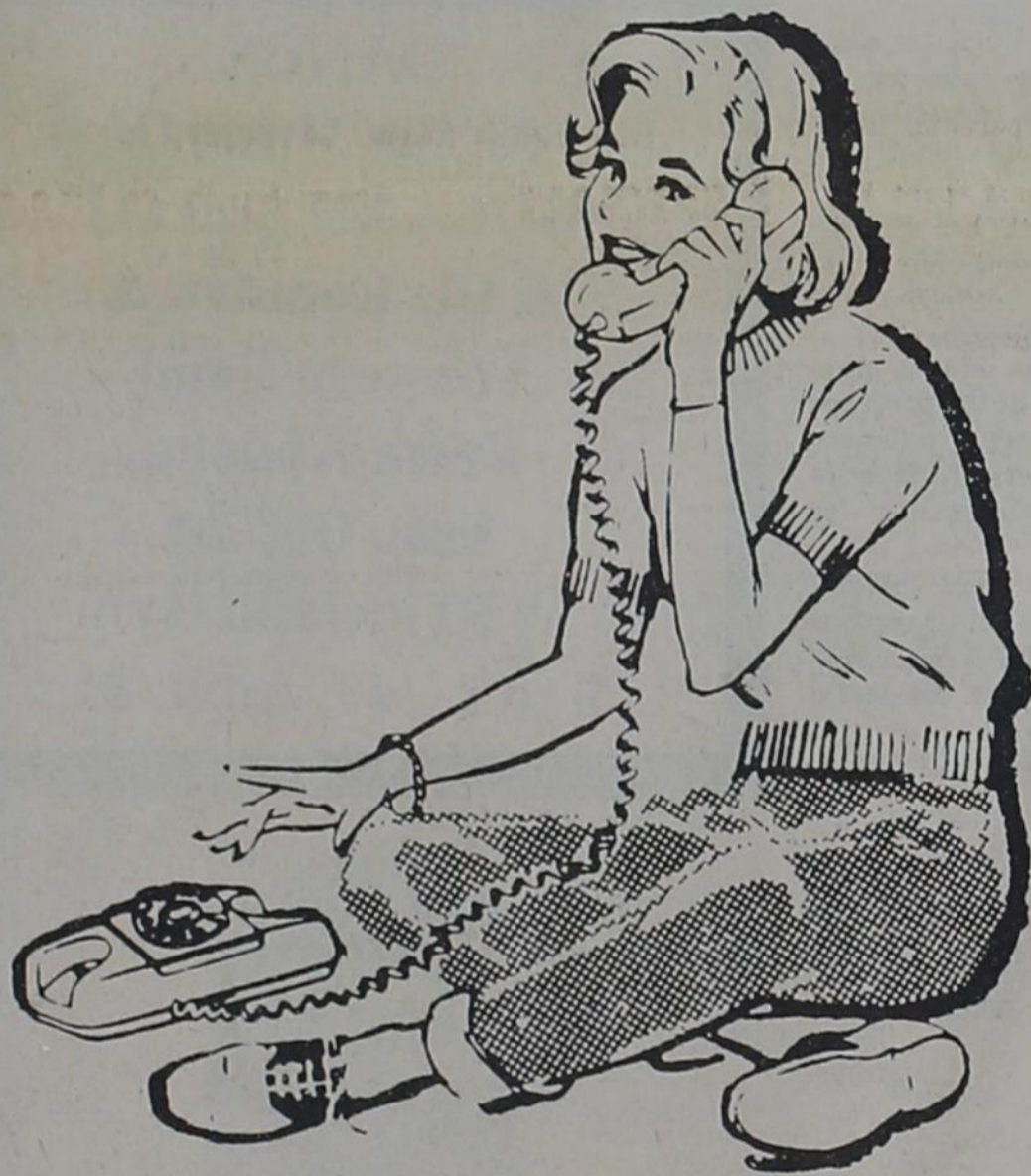

TEXAS TALK



After studying stress in cattle for several years, Dr. Earl Drake, veterinarian and researcher at the University of Nevada believes he has the answers to what causes it and why it is such a negative factor in the beef business. Stress, he said, is the response of the body to any demand and is called the General Adaptation Syndrome. "It is manifested in three stages: the alarm stage, the stage of resistance and the stage of exhaustion. All are for the purpose of protecting the body and returning it to normal." Dr. Drake said that "we have discovered that we can give too many live-bacteria vaccines to an incoming animal. This can cause real stress problems in some because of an inability to handle such a medication variation." Thus, a cattleman needs to try to treat each animal differently. He can cut his losses if he learns to recognize the factors that cause stress and either eliminate them or at least treat them promptly.

ACCIDENT CONTROL-- Tractor accidents are the No. 1 cause of farm machinery deaths. Take time to instruct family members and employees on safe tractor use and enforce the "operator only-no riders" rule, advises the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Tetanus Immunization

For the last several years, reports reflect a drop in the incidence of tetanus nationwide, reports a health education specialist.

However, Texas reports don't echo this drop, says Carla Shearer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

In 1975, 102 cases of tetanus were reported in the United States; 16 of those were in Texas.

The reports for 1976 and 1977 show a nationwide decrease to 75 and 77 cases respectively.

However, for these same years, Texas reported 12 and 16 cases respectively. Tetanus, also known as lockjaw, can be fatal. It is caused by spores of bacteria which can enter the body through a wound, the specialist explains.

Because the tetanus germ cannot grow in the presence of air, deep puncture wounds or cuts are favorite growing environments for the germs.

There is no natural immunity to the tetanus toxin, therefore, immunization against this disease is needed regardless of age, she points out.

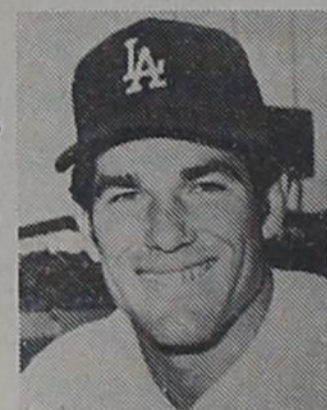
