Second Win Of Season

Michalik intercepted two yards, partially block, by Rule netted 0 yards and a Rick Kittley passes to help spark the Mogul offense to a 25-14 victory over the Rule Bobcats Friday night at Rule. Michalik returned one interception 82 yards for a TD, only to have it nullified by a 15 yard penalty for a personal foul. Late in the fourth quarter his second interception occurred on the

Adding to the Mogul team pride was Isom Murray with a 54 yard TD. He intercepted a Bobcat pass on his own 46 after it had been tipped in the air by Mogul linebacker Wayne Mints. Murray carried 32 times for 229 yards to lead the Mogul offensive attack.

Linebacker Ronnie Phillips played a hard hitting game on defense and Keith Sanders partially blocked a Lisle punt to add to the Moguls defense.

Cong. Omar Burleson announces that the Small Business Administration has declared Coleman, Garza, and Knox Counties as eligible for Federal disaster assistance because of physical damage caused by natural disaster.

These counties suffered losses from drought during the following periods: Coleman, January 1, 1978 to July 26, 1978; Garza, January 1, 1978 to August 1, 1978; and Knox, July 1, 1977 to August 2, 1978. Knox County is also eligible for assistance due to flood for August 3, 1978 to August 4, 1978.

Filing dates for loan application are authorized until close of business on March 6, 1979 for physical damage, and close of business on June 6, 1979 for economic injury.


Former Vera Resident Dies In Lubbock
