## Moguls Defeat Bobcats Second Win Of Season

Defensive back Douglas Michalik intercepted two Rick Kitley passes to help spark the Mogul offense to a 25-14 victory over the Rule Bobcats Friday night at Rule. Michalik returned one interception 82 yards for a TD, only to have it nullified by a 15 yard penalty for a personal foul. Late in the fourth quarter his second interception occurred on the Moguls 43.

Adding to the Mogul team pride was Isom Murray with a 54 yard TD. He intercepted a Bobcat pass on his own 46 after it had been tipped in the air by Mogul linebacker Wayne Mints. Murray carried 32 times for 229 yards to lead the Mogul offensive attack.

Linebacker Ronnie Phillips played a hard hitting game on defense and Keith Sanders partially blocked a Lisle punt to add to the Moguls defense.

An offense and defense is made up of 11 members and they all put forth an effort to sustain and beat the Bobcats.

Munday received the kickoff and marched to the Rule 21 before Bobcat David Lisle intercepted a Routon pass and stopped the drive. A fumble by Rodney Threet on the ensuing drive put the Moguls back in business on the Bobcat 49.

Dockins and Murray moved the ball to the Bobcat 1 foot line and quarterback Randy Routon sneaked over the goal line to make the score Munday 6 and Rule 0. Extra point try by Welch was wide left.

Rule returned the kickoff to their 36 and was marching downfield when Michalik picked off his first pass of the evening that was returned for a TD that was nullified. Moving the ball from the penalty spot Murray fumbled on the Rule 24.

Unable to make a first down Rule punted to the Mogul 26. One first down and a fumble by Dockins gave Rule the ball on their 33. Rule with 4th and 13 punted to the Mogul 21. A fumble on the Mogul 17 set up the Bobcats first touchdown. Rick Kitley scored around right end on a keeper making the score 6-6.

Dockins returned the kickoff 18 yards to his own 42. A minus 9 yards on a pass from Routon to Murray forced the Moguls to punt. Welch hit a 37 yarder to the Bobcat 29.

A pass good for 12 yards and an interference call on the Moguls produced 2 first downs for the Bobcats. A punt to the Mogul 29 and one play later the first half ended in a tie 6-6.

Rule received the second half kickoff and wasted no time in marching downfield to take the lead 14-6. The scoring play was a pass from Kitley to Greeson for 3 yards. Kitley then threw to Tony Carter for the 2 point PAT.

Munday returned the favor with Murray going 60 yards off right guard for the 6 pointer. Extra point failed leaving Munday behind by 2.

An exchange of fumbles and Rule was on their 26.

with the ball. A punt of 11 yards, partially block, started the 3rd Mogul drive to the goal line. The second completed pass of the night for the Moguls was good for 10 yards to Bobby Therwhanger. A fumble by Herring and recovery by Murray gave the Moguls 1st and 10 on the Bobcat 6 yard line. With 26 seconds to go in the 3rd quarter Herring scored from the 2 with Welch adding the PAT. Munday leading 19-14.

Bobcat Rodney Threet brought the kickoff back up field to his 43. An incomplete pass, 3 yard gain and 7 yard loss by Kitley on a tackle by Larry Welch forced another punt.

Using players from the Mogul bench, the Munday squad moved the pigskin to their opponents 22 yard line. Reserve Craig Paylor carried three times for 24 yards. A pass from Mogul quarterback Omar Chouair was intercepted in the end zone for a touch back.

Three rushing attempts by Rule netted 0 yards and a punt was in order. A 31 yard punt and Munday had the ball on Rule's 49. On fourth and 2 Welch boomed another punt, into the end zone, for a touch back.

Two rushes for 7 yards and a 15 yard pass put the Bobcats on their 42. An incomplete pass and then Murray's interception on a tipped ball by Mints put the final score on the board.

Michalik then intercepted his second pass on the Mogul 43. On 4th and 7 Welch punted to Rule's 14. An incomplete pass and 3 rushes for 1 yard left the Moguls the victors 25-14 as the clock ran out.

Cong. Omar Burleson announces that the Small Business Administration has declared Coleman, Garza, and Knox Counties as eligible for Federal disaster assistance because of physical damage caused by natural disaster.

These counties suffered losses from drought during the following periods: Coleman, January 1, 1978 to July 26, 1978; Garza, January 1, 1978 to August 1, 1978, and Knox, July 1, 1977 to August 2, 1978. Knox County is also eligible for assistance due to flood for August 3, 1978 to August 4, 1978.

Filing dates for loan application are authorized until close of business on March 6, 1979 for physical damage, and close of business on June 6, 1979 for economic injury.

## Litter On Roadways Between City And Dump Ground A Problem

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met September 12, 1978 at the Munday City Hall at 7:00 p.m. in regular session.

Members present: Mayor A. Dale Selzer and aldermen Ray Lynn Hardin, M. M. Booe, Donald Hobert and Jessie Andrade.

Members absent: Von Marr.

Mayor Selzer called the meeting to order. Hardin led in prayer at the Mayor's request.

Minutes of the August 8th, 1978 meeting were read and Hardin moved they be approved. Booe seconded. All members voted in favor.

Police Dept. business and operation of same was discussed. No official action was required.

The City Administrator gave a report on further F.C.C. requirements prior to granting Munday 2 new frequencies. Also, the ones requested for the ambulance had not yet been approved. The Council advised the City Administrator to hold up further repair work on the hand held mobile units until F.C.C. approval is received.

The Council next discussed the litter problem between Munday and the dump ground on State Highway 222. Citizens are requested to stop dumping on any street or highway and to control loss of trash and brush prior to reaching the dump ground. The City Administrator is also requested to contact the Texas State Dept. of Health to see what enforcement measure can be taken to alleviate the problem.

The Council next discussed retention of the 1% sales tax on electric and gas bills. After discussion the council requested the City Administrator to secure the proper form from the T.M.L. to present at the next regular meeting. In view of close budget operations in Munday, the Council expressed the desire to retain the tax. Most small cities in Texas are so voting.

Water rates for water from the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority was discussed. Rates have not yet been set by the Water Authority Board of Directors and Munday will have to wait until rates are forthcoming to set new water rates for the City.

After examination of the 1978 City tax roll for Munday, Booe moved that the tax roll be approved and a \$1.00 rate per \$100.00 of value be set with 50¢ to go to General Funds and 50¢ to Interest and Sinking Funds (for bond retirement). Hobert seconded the motion for tax roll approval. All members voted in favor.

Next business was separation of meters at Haynie Trailer Courts. This is to be discussed further with E. Y. Johnson, Salvador Sosa and Haynie Bros. prior to commencing the work. To view problems in this regard and to examine costs and alternatives, and report back to the Council.

The final estimate as prepared by L. O. Jackson Sr. for Coltharp Construction Co. 1978 seal coat project in Munday was examined. After examination Hobert moved the final estimate of \$15,915.90 be approved. Hardin seconded. All members voted in favor of payment.

Employee salary scale was discussed. A special meeting will be called in the next 10 to 15 days to discuss this matter. No official action was taken at this time.

Booe moved bills be paid as follows: Operating funds: \$17,432.19; Ambulance Fund: \$381.09; Street Paving Special: \$6,967.90; Airport Fund: \$9.78; Swimming Pool Fund: \$125.05. (Payment for street seal coating is included in bills to be paid). Hardin seconded. All for.

Meeting adjourned with unanimous approval.

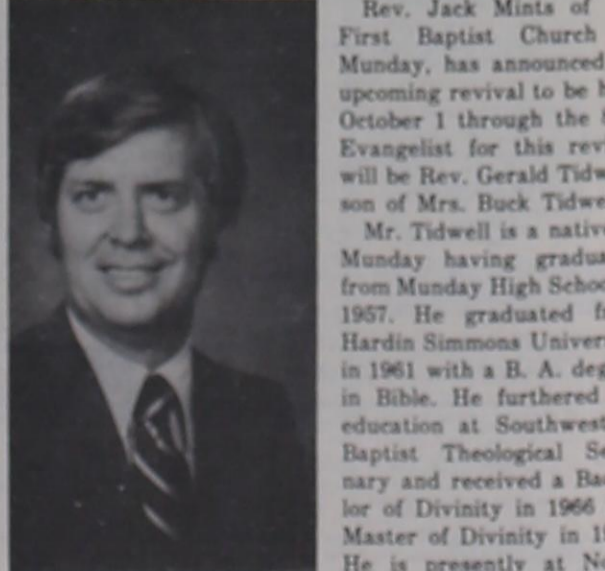

**Father And Son Elected County GSPA Directors**

Members of Grain Sorghum Producers Association recently cast ballots to select their county president and vice president. The farmers elected to these positions serve as "policy making" representatives from their county to the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

Edward Smith and Larry Smith, both of Munday, were elected to serve as Knox County President and Vice President.

The new GSPA directors will take office for a two year term on October 1.

Grain Sorghum Producers Association represents grain sorghum farmers in legislation at the state and national levels. GSPA's goal is to speak in behalf of sorghum producers on all farm policy decisions and to see that they get the best deal possible.

Grain sorghum targets were set at \$4.07 per hundred weight in the 1977 Agricultural Act, while corn targets were set at \$3.57 per hundred weight for the 1977 crop. The increase in grain sorghum targets was the result of Grain Sorghum Producers Association working to establish a Nationwide Cost of Production Study in 1973, and getting Congress to set the targets of sorghum in relation to corn based upon the cost of production rather than the nutritional value.

Deficiency payments were made to grain sorghum farmers on 1977 allotted acres in production. This payment was 68¢ per hundred weight times the normal farm yield on allotted acres. Amounts ranging up to \$20,000 per farmer were paid to grain sorghum producers on their 1977 crop, as a result of this GSPA provision. It could be as much as \$40,000 on the 1978 crop for producers complying with the feed grains program.

Other activities of GSPA include foreign markets sales promotion. It is estimated that each additional million tons of feed grains exported will increase the producer's income by 8¢ per bushel.

The newly elected GSPA Directors will be supervising these activities and they invite every sorghum producer to join this worthwhile program.

**Low Income Persons Eligible For Weatherization Assistance**

Ben F. McDonald, Jr., Executive Director of TDCA indicated that funding for this 12-month contract which began September 1, 1978, is made available through TDCA's Economic Opportunity Division by the U. S. Department of Energy.

Through this contract, homes of the elderly and handicapped low-income persons will be improved through the use of storm windows, caulking, insula-

tion and wall repairs so that energy consumption is reduced and high energy costs to the home dweller are lessened.

Until his retirement, Charles' life as a student at Goree High School and Texas Technological University, his two years in the army, his first job with International Harvester in Sweetwater and Abilene, Texas, and his following 24 years with NAPA outlets in West Texas was more or less what would be expected of a capable, dedicated, and energetic person. He became an independent merchandiser of auto parts; in effect, he became a broker. He soon found extra time to work and proceeded to qualify himself for licenses to sell health, life and casualty insurance.

Always active in civic and political affairs, Charles became a candidate for County Commissioner in 1978. He lost his race by 37 votes, but this doesn't discourage Charles on his future prospects and possibilities. He is active in the Masonic Order where he is a 32nd. degree Mason as well as a Shriner. He has always been an active member of his Church.

Charles is the son of the late Dr. and Mrs. E. F. Heard. His wife Maldene was a teacher in the Goree schools at the time of their marriage 37 years ago. They have two children Sidney Gay who teaches at Crockett Junior High School in Odessa and Jo Lina who manages a retail clothing store there. The Heard family looks forward to

## Knox County Included In Surface Water Usage Report

Use of surface water in the Brazos I segment of the Brazos River Basin for other than domestic and livestock purposes has been documented in a report by the Texas Department of Water Resources.

The report consists of a 208-page book and a 32-page appendix of aerial photographic mosaics. It was prepared for publication following a field investigation of water usage in the watershed covering all or portions of Archer, Bailey, Baylor, Borden, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Dickens, Fisher, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Haskell, Hockley, Jack, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Palo Pinto, Parmer, Seury, Stephens, Stonewall, Swisher, Terry, Throckmorton, and Young Counties.

At a later date, all known users of surface water in the segment will receive, from

the Texas Water Commission, a notice of adjudication and a claim form to be completed and filed as required by law. Each party will be notified of the date, time and place for a jurisdictional hearing and subsequent individual evi-

dentiary hearings to determine the extent of the validity of each claim to use water in the watershed. Publication of the report from information gathered during field investigations marks the beginning of the adjudication process in the

Brazos I segment of the river basin. Several such operations have been undertaken since passage of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967. Copies of the report are available for examination at TDWR offices in Austin or at the offices of county clerks of Castro, Hale, Lubbock, Dickens, Stonewall and Young Counties.

Copies of the report, or portions thereof, may be purchased for a nominal cost from the Permits Division, Texas Department of Water Resources, P. O. Box 13007, Austin, Texas 78711.

I would like to call to the attention of parents of school children a recent report presented to the subcommittee on education in Congress by Senator Edward Zorinsky (D-Neb.), entitled, "Our Public Schools Classrooms or Clinics?". After an extensive study of Federally Funded Programs being used in the classrooms, he concluded that many of the "Innovative" programs are experimental and are designed to change values. I believe parents want the right to reach their own values and beliefs to their children, and in light of the above facts I would like to suggest that letters to Senator Zorinsky express

ing support for his amendment, with copies to our own two senators, could help at this time.

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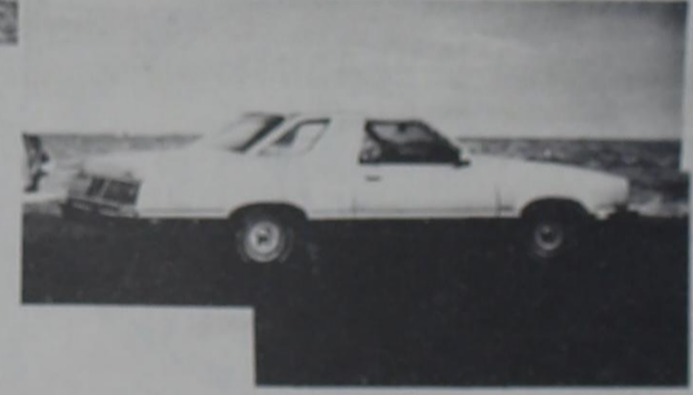
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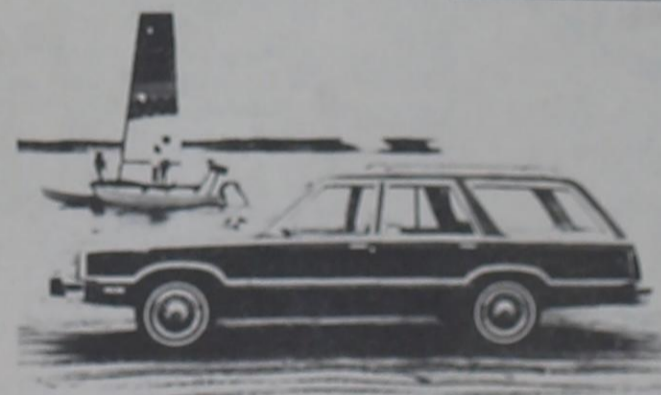
