Asbestos Samples From Local Schools Sent For Analysis

In compliance with the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act, every school in Texas must be inspected this year for materials that contain asbestos. The AHERA was signed into law by President Reagan in 1986 in an effort to make all schools in the state safe from asbestos.

Under the law, all school buildings must be inspected by a person who has completed a training course approved by the federal Environmental Protection Agency. A plan must then be pre-

sent to the Health Department to prevent the materials from becoming a health hazard. After a plan is approved, it must be implemented by June 29, 1989. The asbestos does not necessarily have to be removed from the buildings, but it must be made safe.

Munday secondary school principal Bill Kingston attended a three-day seminar to receive his certification for inspecting for asbestos in the local schools. Some 73 samples of materials such as floor tile and chalkboards were mailed last week for analysis. The results will be sent to Texas School Services, which will write a management plan outlining methods for making any asbestos found safe.

Doyle Lowrance, superintendent of schools in Munday, said no local action will be necessary until the Texas School Services has submitted the management plan, which should be in October. If needed, the plan will be put into operation sometime next year.

Farm Bureau Sues To Designate Hay As Perishable Crop

The Texas Farm Bureau and five of its members have filed suit against Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng and the USDA, seeking inclusion of hay as a perishable crop under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986.

In a letter to Lyng, TFB president S.M. True of Plainview explained that hay is "perishable, labor intensive, and has critical and unpredictable labor demands." True said hay's inclusion as a perishable crop will alleviate serious labor problems experienced by hay producers.

Knox County Farm Bureau president Royce Miller said, "Making hay a perishable crop will make it eligible for the Special Agricultural Worker (SAW) program. This is a chance to help livestock producers who have been shut out of this important source of labor."

A similar suit was filed in Lubbock last year seeking inclusion of cotton in the act. That suit resulted in cotton being classified as a fruit, making it eligible for the SAW program. The five plaintiffs joining Texas Farm Bureau in the suit are Sulphur Springs dairyman Don Smith, Trinity cattleman Russ Arnold, rancher James Wood of Gilmer, and Warren and Anna Madison, ranchers from McLennan County.

Team Penning Is Planned In Lieu Of Merchants Rodeo

The merchants rodeo which was announced in last week's paper has been changed to a team penning contest which will be held at 8 p.m. Tuesday, June 14, at the Munday roping arena. The penning is being held in conjunction with the Knox County Vegetable Festival, and Charles Durham of the Spike Box Ranch is coordinator.

Each three-man team will pay a \$30 entry fee, and 50 percent of the entrance money will be returned in jackpot form to the winning team. There will also be a \$10 cattle charge, and the Munday Chamber of Commerce will net \$5 per team in relation to this fee.

Clubs and individuals are invited to enter the parade. Each entry will be judged on theme, originality and design, according to chairman Gary Kuehler. Winners will reflect the best over-all theme design. No entry fees will be charged, but cash prizes will be awarded to the first three places in both adult and children's divisions.

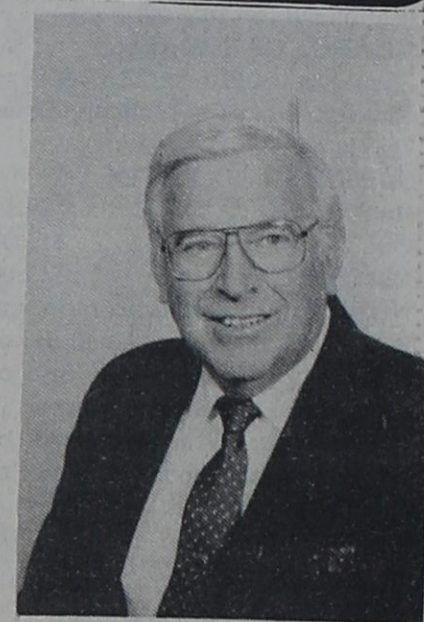

Planned for 8 p.m. after the parade is the Anything Goes contest. This popular event will be held at the football field under the direction of Boyd Lynn Meers. Teams of six persons will compete in unusual races. Entry fee is \$12 per team, and this includes an insulated can cooler for each team member.

Events in this year's Anything Goes include a golf cart obstacle race, in which the driver is blindfolded and his or her passengers give directions on driving; an obstacle course; dry-land water-skiing, putting skiers on 2x4 skis; and the waterside race, in which participants slide down into a tub of water and catch water balloons thrown by their teammates.

Midway through the program, the Munday Gymdandeez will perform some of the stunts and routines they learned during their lessons this year. Admission to Anything Goes will be the purchase of a specialty item from the Munday Chamber of Commerce, with prices of these items ranging from \$1 to \$20. The Chamber will also sponsor a concession stand to provide soft drinks for thirsty onlookers and contestants.

Benjamin Church To Get New Preacher

Two Knox County United Methodist Churches will receive a new pastor following changes made during the Northwest Texas annual conference which is meeting in Abilene this week. The Northwest Texas Conference consists of seven districts - Abilene, Amarillo, Big Spring, Lubbock, Pampa, Plainview and Seymour.

About 1,000 persons, including 219 clergy, 284 lay delegates, alternates and spouses were expected to attend the conference, which was highlighted by pastoral appointments, the service of ordination for elders and deacons and the state of the church address by Bishop Louis W. Schowengerdt.

Byron Putnam will replace William E. Perkins as new pastor at the United Methodist Churches in Knox City and Benjamin. Rev. Putnam has spent the last three years at Highland Heights Methodist Church in Sweetwater. Rev. Perkins, who has pastored the Knox County churches for three years, will be serving churches in Seagraves-Wellman.

No other pastoral changes were made in local churches.

Midwestern Signs Football Recruits

Midwestern State University head football coach Mike Calcote says MSU has received commitments from a number of talented freshmen to play football for the Indians next fall.

The new Indians are the first MSU football recruits since 1956, the last year MSU fielded a football team.

For the better part of a year, Calcote and his assistant coaches, including former Munday Mogul coach Ron Steele, have been busy assembling some of the finest freshman recruits available to play for the Indians. Recruiting has been a 24-hour-a-day job, but Coach Calcote says it's all been worth it.

"Since we're just starting a new team, we're going to present a tremendous opportunity for high school players to come here and play right off," Calcote said. "We have some good freshmen coming in with some good credentials."

Area players who have committed to play with MSU include Cornelius (J.B.) Jones of Munday, a 1987 graduate of Munday High School

who excelled in Mogul football; Jon Hrcirik of Seymour; Michael McKnight, a record-holding running back from Chillicothe; and stellar Knox City Greyhound Anthony Oudems.

The MSU football program will compete in NAIA Division II and the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association (TIAA), a non-scholarship conference consisting of six schools: Austin College, Howard Payne, McMurry College, Midwestern State, Sul Ross and Tarleton State.

MSU will play five games at home and five games on the road. They will play each team within the TIAA twice on a home-and-home basis with the first game at home September 3 against Howard Payne.

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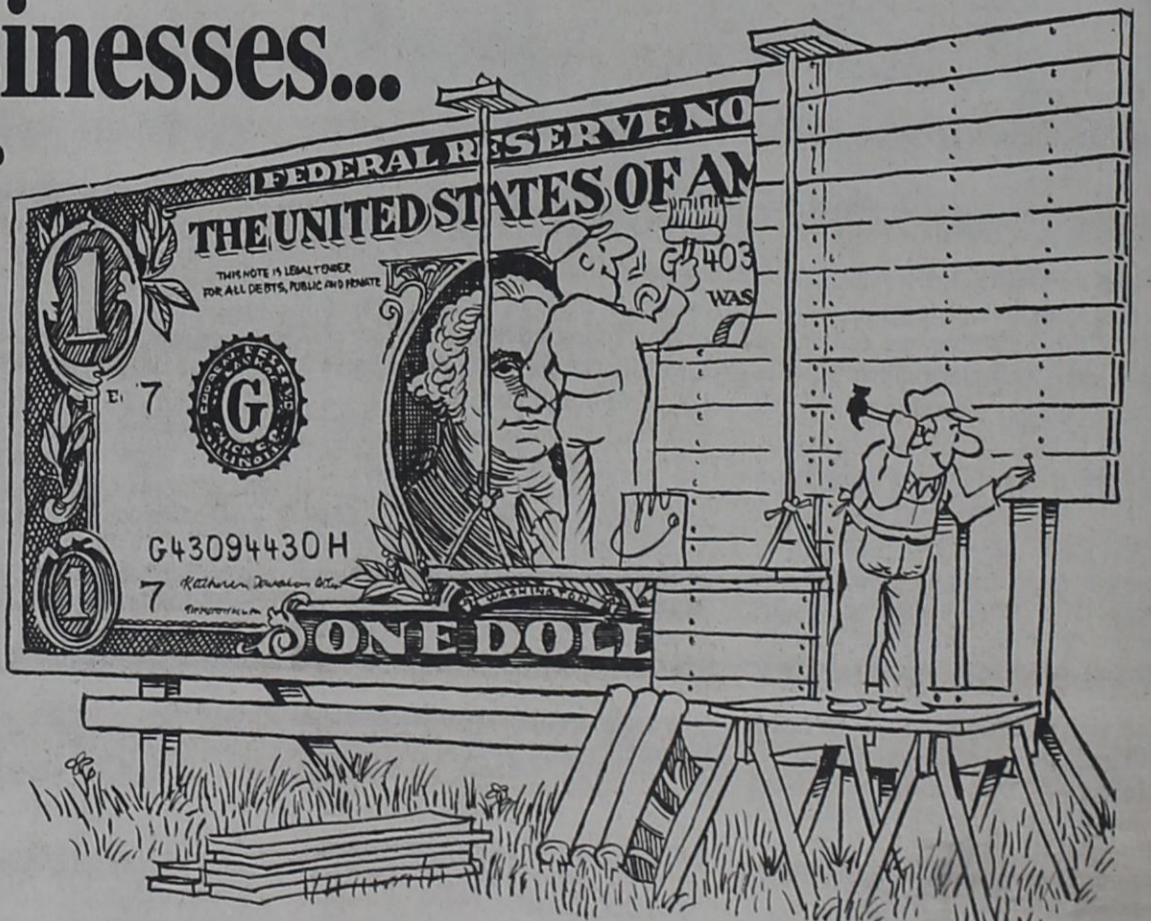

ENZYME PILLS USELESS FOR LOSING WEIGHT

POWDERED DRINK MIX POSES SALMONELLA DANGER

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has warned consumers

that Nutrien and Vitalite powdered drink mixes produced by Sunrider International of Torrance, Calif., should not be consumed because of evidence that some of the products tested are contaminated with Salmonella bacteria. Both are nutritional supplements marketed as powdered drink mixes. Sunrider distributes its products nationally through independent distributors -- usually people who market the products for the firm, often door-to-door or among friends. Salmonella bacteria can cause nausea, fever, headache, diarrhea and vomiting in normal health adults.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Seymour on Tuesday, June 28.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

1. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

11. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

111. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple, discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

Social Security Services Needn't Require Payment

People in the North Texas area have been receiving direct mail solicitations asking that they pay \$7 to join an organization that says it will provide many services related to Social Security, according to Frances Braden, Social Security representative in Vernon.

First, Braden said, there is no need to pay any firm money to obtain any of the services provided by Social Security.

In return for the \$7 payment, this firm offers to provide a statement of a person's earnings covered by Social Security, a plastic Social Security card and a guide to Social Security.

Any person can obtain a statement of Social Security covered earnings without paying anybody. All a person has to do is call any Social Security office and ask for a request for statement of earnings form. After completing the form and mailing it, the person will receive the statement in a few weeks. This firm can do no more.

In addition, there is no need for a plastic Social Security card, Braden

said. It is of no use for Social Security purposes. The Social Security number card issued by the Social Security Administration is the only official card and should be used whenever a Social Security card is needed.

People can obtain many publications about Social Security free at any Social Security office. Just call any office and ask, Braden said.

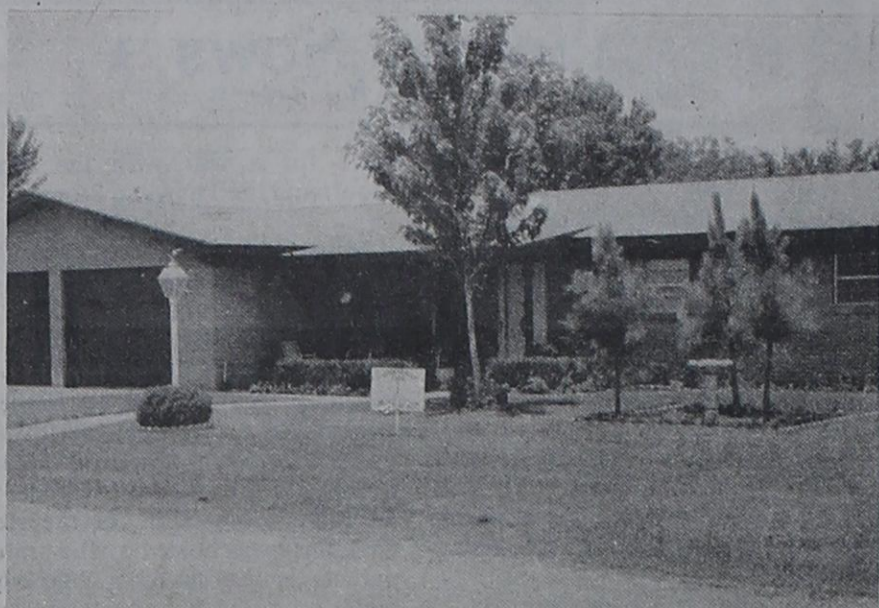

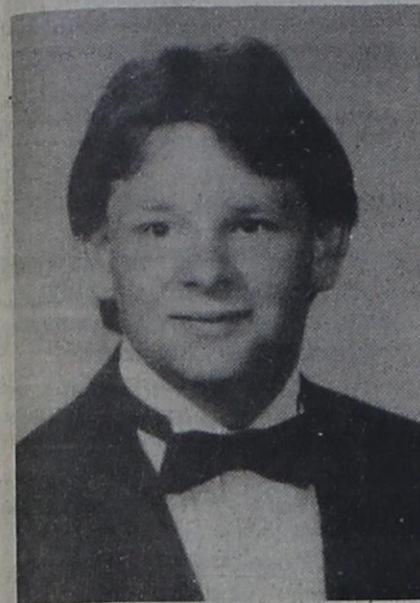

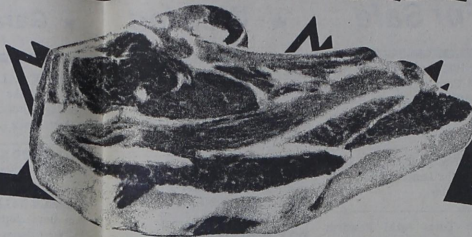
