California Firm Low Bidder On Brine Lake

Granite Construction Company of Watsonville, Calif. submitted the apparent low bid of \$23,216,525 for construction of the Truscott Brine Lake on Bluff Creek, a tributary to the North Fork of the Wichita River, about three miles northwest of Truscott, Texas, at a bid opening held Thursday by the Tulsa District, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

The government estimate was \$34,101,775 and the high bid was \$34,262,278. There were 10 bidders. The work is to be complete in 1,100 days.

Col. Robert G. Bening, District Engineer, said the purpose of the lake is to store brine collected by the low flow dam at Area VIII in the Rev River Basin Chloride Control Project. He said

the Bateman pump station which will pump the brine some 22 miles to the Truscott Lake is complete.

The brine dam will be 16,080 feet long and rise 105 feet above the streambed. At conservation (normal) pool elevation, the lake will have 2,970 surface acres.

Construction of the earth dam will include about 7 million cubic yards of compacted fill, 110,000 cubic yards of stone protection or 84,000 cubic yards of soil cement slope protection, 11 miles of 5-strand barbed wire fence, 2,500 cubic yards of concrete and 32,500 linear feet of metal beam guard fence.

The job also includes construction of 13/4 miles of access road, turfing and related work.

Moguls Defeat Trojans 18-13

The Munday Moguls journeyed to Windthorst last Friday night to battle the Trojans, and came home shouting sweet victory, as they slipped by the Trojans by a score of 18 to 13.

The game by quarters looked like this; one even; Munday 2, and Windthorst, 1.

The Moguls kicked off, with Scotty Schroeder receiving the ball on the six-yard line and returning it to the 37. Two plays later, Munday recovered the first of two Trojan fumbles for the night. The Moguls then drove to the 16-yard-line before the drive stalled.

Windthorst made a first down, advancing the ball to the 27-yard-line. Keith Sanders dropped Steinburger for an 8-yard loss. After an incomplete pass, Windthorst made a 53-yard punt, setting the Moguls back to their own 22. Paylor fumbled on a halfback pass try, but Munday recovered (Last week, Munday scored on this play with Kevin Smith on the receiving end). As the half ended, Munday had 18 yards rushing to 21 for the Trojans.

In the second period, the Moguls had a pass intercepted, but two plays later recovered a Windthorst fumble on the 43-yard line. Slowed by a 15-yard holding penalty, the Moguls went to the air with Routon hitting McAfee on three passes for a total of 46 yards. McAfee pitched the last pass to Murray, who raced the remaining 24 yards for six points, with 6:12 left on the clock. The PAT kick was wide.

The Trojans came back and scored, with 1:55 left on the clock, capping a 52-yard drive with Terry Anderle taking the oval around left end from three yards out. They also failed on the extra point try, and the score was even, 6-6.

Phil Johnson, David Johnson, Rickie Sosa, Alan Brown and Ralph Hernandez gave Routon the protection he needed as the quarterback went to the air, hitting McAfee and Sanders in a 62-yard drive. McAfee

caught a 6-yard pass to score, with 29 seconds left in the half.

The third quarter was all Moguls! The Trojans had the ball for only eight plays. With ten seconds left on the clock, Routon passed to McAfee from seven yards away, making the score 18 to 6.

Windthorst returned the kick-off from their 15-yard-line to Munday's 10, but were unable to push across the goal stripe.

After an exchange of punts, Windthorst again drove to the Mogul 14-yard-line, as the Mogul defense met the test. Two plays later, the Moguls lost their only fumble of the game, with the Trojans recovering on the 13, then scoring with 42 seconds remaining in the game. This time, their kick was good, making the final score 18 for Munday, 13 for the host team.

Change Effective October 1 Antilley To Be New Jones County Agent

Effective October 1, 1979, Tommy K. Antilley will become County Extension Agent (Agriculture) in Jones County, according to a joint statement from District Extension Agent Ed Garnett and the Jones County Commissioners Court.

Antilley was reared on a farm in Taylor County. He was an outstanding 4-H Club member for nine years and

won many honors. He was also in FFA and was awarded top honors in his FFA work.

A graduate of Texas A&M University, Antilley has a B. S. Degree in Animal Science. He was employed as quality control inspector for the Missouri Beef Packers in Plainview prior to his appointment as Assistant County Extension Agent in Wilbarger County in 1974. Antilley transferred to Knox County September 21, 1976, as County Extension Agent (Agriculture) where he has conducted outstanding programs in the livestock, field crops, and 4-H areas for the past three years.

As County Extension Agent in Jones County, Antilley will be responsible for providing leadership for Agriculture in both the youth and adult programs. He succeeds Kirby Clayton, who retired as County Extension Agent August 31. Antilley and his wife, Kei, have two young sons.

Area Towns Receive Rebates On Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said rebates to Texas cities of the local option one-percent sales tax set a record in the tax's 11-year history.

Bullock said more than 900 cities shared in \$124.2 million during July, August and September - passing the state's previous high three-month allocation in the final quarter of 1978 by more than \$6 million.

Bullock also announced that his office was sending September sales tax rebate checks totaling \$73.4 million. "This month's allocations

Bloodmobile Here, Oct. 8 Donating Blood is Made More Pleasant

The American Red Cross Blood Services, Red River Region, is working to make donating blood more pleasant and comfortable. This new equipment is a progressive step forward for this region and it has many advantages over our present equipment. The new equipment was designed as a total coordinated package by the Rhode Island School of Design. The equipment was designed to achieve three goals: first, the highest possible donor safety, second, an efficient total operation, and third, a clean, pleasant atmosphere.

On Monday, October 8, the Bloodmobile will be in Munday, Texas to utilize the

new bloodmobile equipment. The Bloodmobile will be set up in the Community Center from 2:45 to 6:30 p.m., according to Dortha Awalt, Blood Services Chairman. Goal has been set at 62 units of blood.

Ed Thomas, chairman of the Regional Blood Services Committee, has welcomed the new equipment.

"We saw the tentative designs as early as three years ago and were eager to implement them. We are very happy to provide this step forward for the region. This new system is more effective, more time productive, and we feel it will give the Red Cross donor process a more professional look."

The new equipment has many advantages. One is that the donors sit while donating. Research has indicated that most donors like sitting up so that they can talk to other people instead of staring up at the ceiling. Another advantage is the mobility of the new equipment. Chairs stack, lounges and cabinets roll which makes loading and unloading much easier. Also, since the equipment was designed specifically for blood donation as a total package, all of the equipment fits together both in function and form. The registered nurse sits

in a chair with rollers which places her at eye level with the donor. All of the supplies she needs are kept in two "pods" or containers fastened to the sides of the chair.

These changes have been made to make the donation of blood a more pleasant and comfortable experience and to encourage first time donors to become regular givers of the "gift of life."

The American Red Cross Blood Services, Red River Region, covers 28 counties in Southern Oklahoma and North Central Texas. Blood and Blood products are provided for patients in 41 area hospitals.

The Blood center is located at 1809 5th Street, Wichita Falls, Texas and accepts walk-in blood donors. Hours are from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. weekdays except for Wednesday when the Center is open until 6:30 p.m.

Former Local Woman And Husband Die

Word was received here during the weekend of the death of a former Munday woman and her husband, who passed away within two days of each other during the past week.

Death came for Charlie Smith of Lakewood, Colo., on Tuesday, September 11, who was a teacher in the Lakewood Public Schools. He suffered a terminal illness and had been seriously ill since last June.

Two days later, and shortly after memorial services were held for her husband, Natalie Harrell Smith suffered a cerebral hemorrhage on Thursday, September 13, and died within a few minutes.

Both were members of the Green Mountain Methodist Church in Lakewood for many years. Memorial services were held from this church for him on September 13, and for her on September 17.

Following memorial services for Natalie, crematory services for each were held; then, their remains were reunited and were scattered among the grandeur of the Colorado mountains, which they both loved so dearly.

Natalie was born January 17, 1942, in Munday and attended the local schools. She moved to New Mexico with her parents while in elementary school.

The couple are survived by two children, Erick, 17, and Cindy, 13, both of Lakewood, Colo. Mr. Smith is also survived by his mother, Dorothy Smith of Lakewood; his father and several brothers and sisters.

Other survivors of Mrs. Smith are her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gene W. Harrell of Albuquerque, N. M.; two brothers, Gene Jr., and Chris, both of Albuquerque; her paternal grandfather, E. W. Harrell of Munday and paternal step-grandmother, Claudia Harrell, also of Munday.

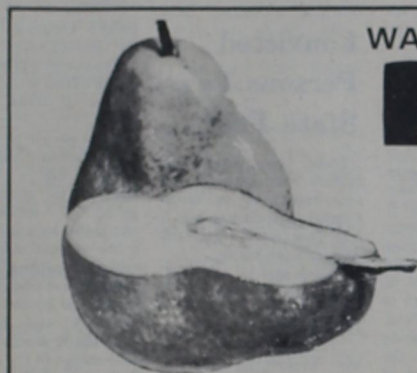

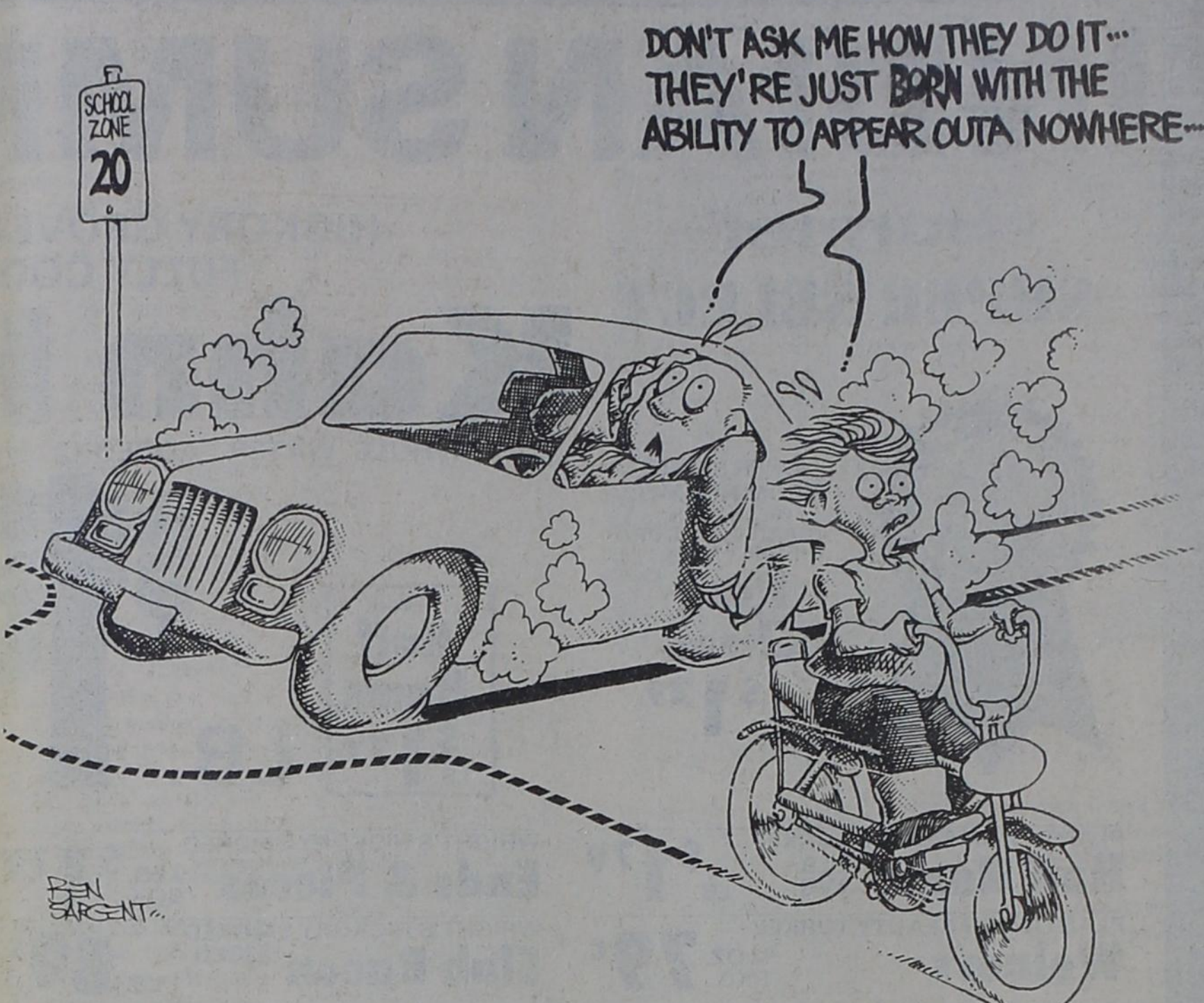
Munday Club Sets Workshop

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said persons ending up in Texas Courts after September 1 may face more than stiff fines and jail terms.

Bullock said his office will begin collecting a \$10 or \$15 fee from persons convicted of criminal charges.

"The cost of crime, just like everything else in

today's economy, is going up," Bullock said.

The money will be used to create a fund to compensate victims of crime, Bullock said.

A \$15 fee will be assessed against persons convicted of felonies and a \$10 fee charged to persons convicted of misdemeanors punishable by a jail term or a fine of more than \$200.

The fee will be added to other fines or costs that may be ordered by the court.

Bullock said fees are expected to raise more than \$205 million in the next five years.

The reviewers of these books attend hearings before the State Board of Education in order to inform them of the books they are concerned about.

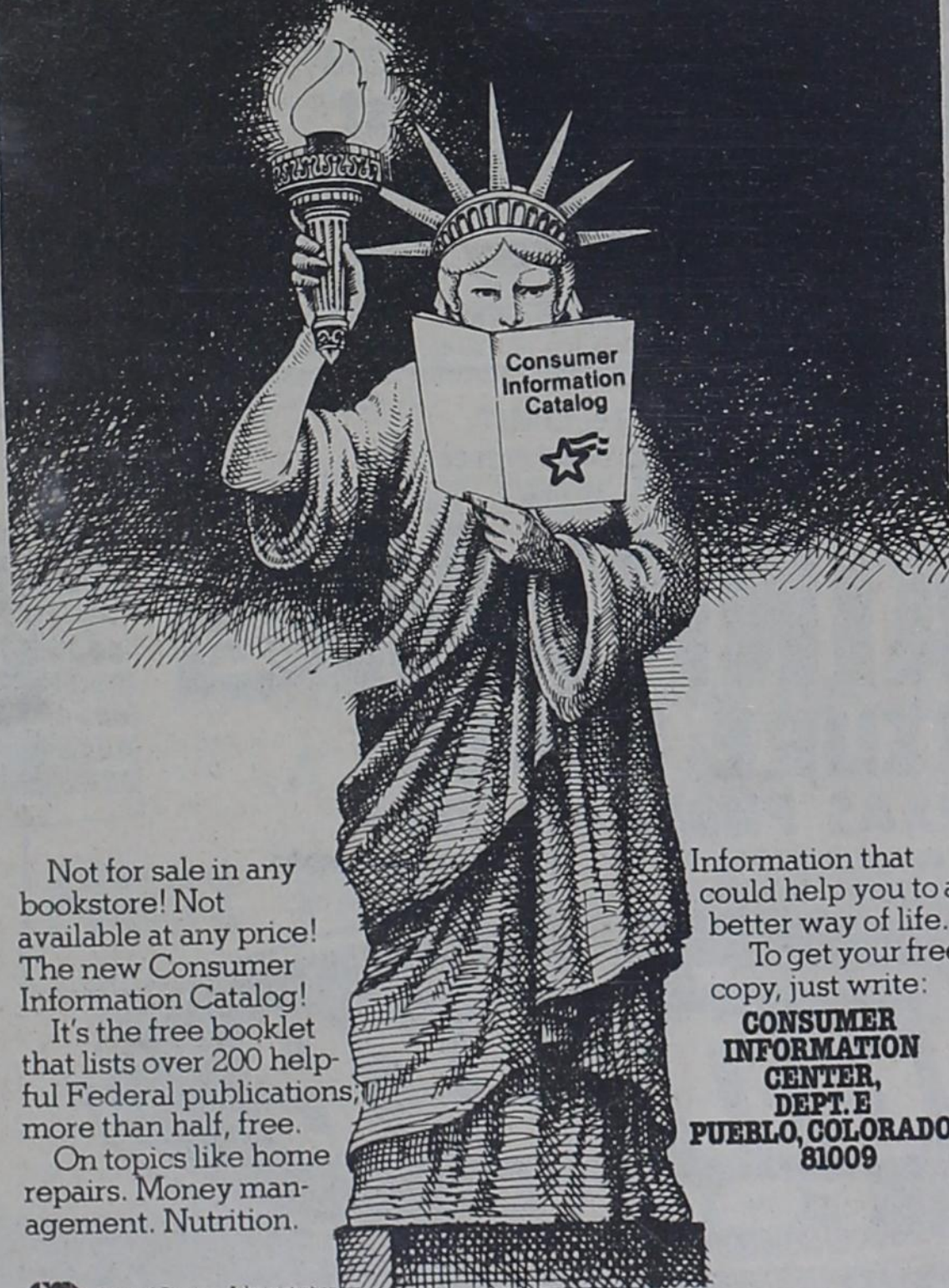
