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Local Hepatitis Spread Through Personal Contact

According to a story in the Friday edition of the Wichita Falls newspaper, the Texas Department of Health has ruled that the hepatitis outbreak in Munday was spread through person-to person transmission, not food or water.

According to the story, Dr. James Zoretic, TDH regional director for communicable diseases, said that an investigation conducted recently confirmed what TDH officials already suspected...the outbreak began with one individual and spread through contact with other individuals.

It is believed that rumors concerning the immune globulin injections may have escalated the outbreak. According to Dr. Zoretic, immune globulin can help those exposed to the disease avoid infection, but has no serious side effects.

Local school officials are exceeding the requirements set forth by the Health Department in order to control the spread of the disease. Those who have been exposed to the virus should receive the immune globlin injections within 14 days of exposure. If you have any questions concerning the disease or the injection, please consult your family physician.

Social Security benefits are intended to replace part of the earnings workers and their families were receiving before the worker's retirement, disability, or death. To compensate for the reduction in family income, Social Security beneficiaries often turn to additional earnings from a job or self-employment. An earnings limit applies to everyone who works and receives Social Security retirement or survivors benefits, except to people who are 70 or older. Special rules apply to people who receive benefits because they are disabled. Disabled persons should report all work.

What are the earnings limits? People under the age of 70 can work and earn up to certain annual limits and still keep all their benefits. In 1991, the limits are: age 65-69, \$9,720 and under age 65, \$7,080.

If you are 65 through 69, \$1 is deducted from your benefits for every \$3 you earn above the limit. If you are under 65, the deduction is \$1 in benefits for every \$2 in earnings above the limit.

You must contact Social Security promptly if you expect to earn more than the annual limit to give them an estimate of your earnings for the year. If you later find that your earnings wil be higher or lower than you estimated, you should contact Social Security again to change your estimate.

In the year you become age 70, Social Security will count only your earnings for months before you reach 70. Earnings in or after the month you reach 70 won't affect your Social Security benefits.

In the first year you start getting Social Security, you may earn more than the yearly limit before you retire. That's why there's a special rule that applies to the first year you start getting Social Security. The rule states that even if your earnings exceed the yearly limit, you can get your full Social Security check for any month your earnings do not exceed a monthly limit. The monthly limits for 1991 are: age 65-69, \$810, and under age 65, \$590. (Wages are counted in the month you earn the money, not the month you are paid.)

If you are self-employed, you can receive a Social Security benefit for any month you do not do "substantial" work in your business. Work of more than 45 hours per month is generally considered substantial. Less than 15 hours is not. Work between 15 and 45 hours is usually considered substantial if you are involved in management or a highly skilled occupation.

BBB Cautions Public Of Magazine Schemes

The Better Business Bureau cautions people of magazine subscription schemes. Before signing up for a magazine subscription package over the telephone, add up the total costs. The caller may trick you into paying hundreds of dollars for multi-year subscriptions.

When a telephone salesperson offers a package of magazines for a few dollars a week or pennies a day, it may sound like a real bargain. Yet the deal may include inflated prices and subscriptions stretching over several years. Some magazines may have shorter subscriptions than others. One should not assume one will receive all of the magazines for the length of the package.

Always check the company out with the Better Business Bureau and never give your credit card number over the phone unless you are certain you want to buy or are familiar with

While there are legitimate companies that sell magazine subscriptions over the phone, watch out for salespeople who avoid giving you their name or the company's name. Agreeing to or signing a sales contract before reading it is a definite nono. Calculate the total yearly cost of each magazine and the entire package. Compare these costs to regular magazine subscription rates.

If you wish to cancel, you must do so in writing. Generally, you may cancel within three days of the receipt of the agreement. Sign and return the cancellation notice by certified or registered mail to ensure proof of mailing dates.

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

The Fishing Doc

By "Doc" Fitzgerald

MILLERS CREEK RESERVOIR Level & Condition: full and clear.

Temperature: 63 · F.

Black Bass: Good to 7 lbs. Hitting all lures but best on spinners, plastic worms, jigs, sonics and large live minnows. Fish are in shallow water and brush cover. Favorite colors: red, black, gold, lime and purple.]

White Bass & Stripers: Fair. Spawn run hasn't started yet. Few striper being caught in dam areas in deep water on trolling lures.

Catfish: Good on trotline. Best in deeper water and in the mouth of creeks. Still not in creeks yet. Best bait on trotlines: large minnows, perch, liver and blood in cheese cloth. Still not taking shad. Largest reported in the 45 lb. range.

Crappie: Fair. Many small fish are being caught, but few limits of legal fish are being taken home. Best at night under the lights in main lake areas. Taking both jigs and minnows at 6-10 feet.

Rough fish: Good to 10 lbs. on dough bait, Tan Bait and worms. Fishing Tip

Q: Will insect repellent cause you to catch fewer fish?

A: If misapplied, "bug spray" can affect your chances of catching fish. The most sensitive fish to repellent are "smell feeders" such as catfish. Although crappie and bass are "sight feeders", they, too, can be repelled by the spray.

I suggest that you apply the liquid with a cloth, careful not to get it on your hands. This simple procedure can produce more fish. It's also important to keep other offensive smells from your hands, too. Oil or gasoline (from a pre-trip fill-up) has caused some poor fishing days.

By the way, some health food experts claim that taking garlic capsules for two weeks reduces your appeal to biting bugs. The garlic comes in gelatin capsules (like vitamin E) and does not cause bad breath or garlic odor. They're cheap and might be worth a try especially if you are prone to draw insects. Of course, always consult with your physician before taking any food supplement.

Perry Supports Intrastate **Trucking Bill For Cattle**

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry recently voiced his support for House Bill 2553, saying the intrastate trucking measure would help make the Texas cattle industry and other livestock industries more competitive.

Texas is America's top cattle and calf producer, with livestock sales accounting for nearly 50% of the state's entire agricultural income. However, Texas ranks second nationally in the number of cattle slaughtered and fourth in the production of red meat. "We can and should be number one in both instances," Perry

"H.B. 2553 would address this challenge," Perry said, "by making the Texas cattle industry and other livestock industries more competitive through a reduction inintrastate transportation costs for cattle moved to and from feedlots, livestock mar-

keting facilities and slaughter houses. "Legislation such as this would bolster our efforts at the Department of Agriculture to increase in-state

commodity processing." he said Among Perry's chief priorities as commissioner are to enhance Texas' agricultural business climate to allow family farms and ranches to be profitable and to help Texas to attain the number one spot in overall agricultural production.

PROCESSING WHEAT FOR HAY

Many producers have now certified wheat acres at the local ASCS office and may be considering cutting extra acres of wheat for hay. For those producers, the time of cutting hay should also hinge upon what type of cattle the hay will feed.

Ideally, the highest quality and quantity hay should be cut in the boot to early head stage. The protein level at this stage can run 16-21%.

Wheat harvested in the vegatative stage will have increased content of protein, but less pounds of actual

Cattlemen that run cow-calf operations or summer stocker cattle will be more interested in this type of hay so that little or no supplemental feed will be required to provide the cattle essential daily nutrient needs.


However, many producers in the Rolling Plains run stocker cattle on wheat. For these producers, protein content of the hay may not be as critical. Where wheat pastures run up to 30% crude protein, cattle tend to consume much dry hay to reduce the high protein pastures.

Thus producers can cut wheat for hay at head to milk stage for the highest quantity of hay.

Another fact of curing is that the further the maturity of the plant the shorter amount of time will be required for curing and baling.


Q: Why do churches today not practice the "Holy Kiss?"

A: The "Holy Kiss" is referred to five times in the New Testament (Romans 16:16, 1 Corinthians 16:20, 2 Corinthians 13:12, 1 Thessalonians 5:26, and 1 Peter 5:14). Peter calls this the "kiss of love." This was a form of greeting practiced among members of the same sex in the Middle East. It is still practiced in that part of the world as well as in France, Russia, some South American areas, etc. During the first cenury, Jewish synagogues throughout the Roman empire spread this custom. It was sometimes mistaken by Gentiles as a kiss of other motives.

Gentiles who were converted to Christianity practiced a different custom of greeting and were, of course, unused to the Jewish practice of kissing. Therefore it became necessary that the Bible writers regulate this social custom. You will note by the references given above that each of the original recipients had divisive problems in their congregations. Giving each other the holy kiss was a sign of mutual confidence and the healing of old divisions within the congregation. Most notable was the disunity in the Corinthian church (1 Corinthians 1:10-13). Paul concludes his second letter to that congregation with an appeal to unity and peace (2 Cor. 13:11) and follows with verse 12, "greet each other with a holy kiss."

Likewise, in the Romans 16:16 passage, Paul follows his instructions about greeting each other with a holy kiss with an appeal that they note those who cause division (and teach false doctrine) and to avoid those people (verse 17). Paul's use of the phrase in 1 Thessalonians 5:26 follows the same type of admonition to "be at peace among yourselves" (5:13). Peter's exhortation is for the church leaders to lead without domination (1 Peter 5:3) and for the younger members to subject themselves to the humble, Christ-like leadership of their leaders (5:5-6). Peter concludes his thoughts with "Greet one another with a kiss of love" and "Peace to all of you that are in Christ" (5:14).

From both Paul and Peter we see that this special charge was to foster unity. (Philip Hughes makes this same point in his commentary, Paul's

The Roman practice of greeting each other with a hand-clasp (handshake) to show that the hand was free of a weapon became the dominate cultural practice in the U.S. Therefore the same guidance applies to our cultural form of greeting - that it be in holy love.

Jesus strongly rebuked a Pharisee for withholding a customary greeting (Luke 7:45). Judas' kiss of betrayal is considered the height of treachery (Mark 14:44ff).
