



### '88 Homecoming Is One Of Best Ever

It would be hard to find anyone who could deny the success of the 1988 Homecoming as it unfolded Saturday, October 15. Excited conversation, hugs, handshakes, open address books and "Remember when . . . ?", could be seen and heard most anywhere in town.

A total of 620 ex-students and guests registered during the morning hours and many more never registered. The auditorium was filled to capacity for the afternoon program and the stands were packed with Mogul fans as the high school cheerleaders, twirlers and band led the pep rally featuring cheerleaders and twirlers from past years at Munday High.

Lyndle Reeves, president of the homecoming association, welcomed guests at the program and introduced Larry Thompson, emcee for the afternoon. Thompson recognized early Munday High School graduates J. L. Stodghill, class of 1918, and Beatrice Campsey, class of 1920, and introduced exes who had traveled the longest distance for the festivities. They included Eddie Littlefield of New York, N.Y., Mike Putnam of Las Vegas, Nevada and Sue Groves of Norco, California.

Doyle Lowrance, superintendent of schools, former coach and teacher, presented a review of the accomplishments of students and teachers at Munday High School, referring to the changes in the school curriculum since House Bill 72 and the TECAT tests for teachers. He praised the many accomplishments of the students, in both academics and sports, and recounted the many honors received by the students in basketball, track, cross-country, football and band.

Larry Thompson introduced the guest speaker for the afternoon, noting that he had been his "senior" during the 60's and assuring the audience of his respect for the 1962 graduate.

Gary Wood, currently residing in Austin, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Wood. He serves as president of the Texas Research League and has a long list of accomplishments to his credit.

Wood expressed his respect for his teachers at Munday High School, with special emphasis on four individuals who had a strong impact on his life. Joe Massey, Chief of Police during the 60's, Joe Canafax, high school principal, Alice Wynn, high school English teacher, and James Bardwell, high school science teacher, were all given credit and praise for their help and support.

He spoke of his concern for the high dropout rate and discipline problems in high schools today and praised the Munday school for having an atmosphere that inhibits these problems. He expressed appreciation to his classmates and other citizens who had remained in Munday by choice in order that those who had left could have a "home" to come back to. A major concern expressed by Wood during the program was the fact that his classmates were all sitting on the front row holding egg cartons!

Thompson recognized former teachers and administrators and singled out the classes of '38 and '48 which celebrated special reunions this year.



### **Extension Program Focuses** On Leaner Meat Production

Consumers can benefit from a new Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) program that will help farmers and ranchers produce leaner, meatier animals.

Called the TAEX Livestock and Carcass Evaluation Service, the program focuses on helping producers nationwide evaluate the muscling, fatness and quality of animals in their herds and flocks.

"This new program will help livestock producers develop the type of meat products that meet the needs of consumers and their changing lifestyles," said Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, Extension Service director. "Consumers today are concerned about diet and health more so than ever before, and that means they are highly selective in their choice of food products. Farmers and ranchers must tailor their products to meet those demands."

He said, "To do this, they must be able to identify animals within their herds and flocks that are superior in carcass merit from both a quality and cutability standpoint. Few producers have the technology, equipment and time to do this, so this is where our new program comes into play."

According to Carpenter, the Livestock and Meat Evaluation Service will provide producers with opportunities to obtain three types of information.

One will be on-the-farm data from ultrasound testing, the measuring of outside fat thickness and ribeye area in live animals. Producers also will be able to obtain quality and yield grade information for carcasses slaughtered in commercial packing plants. The third information type will be on taste and tenderness of cooked lean meat as de-

CONTROL WORMS EARLY

As cooler weather has set in the area and wheat is emerging, some fields have been hit by some seasonal pests. Mrs. G. H. Hudson of Benjaconcerning her wheat fields.

After scouting the field, no presence of armyworms could be found.

Fall armyworms are the immature stages of dull-colored, nocturnal moths. Armyworms range in color from pale green to brown or black and often are striped with white to yellowish lines from head to tail.

In scouting fields, producers should check green, lush growing areas in the field and observe for foliage feeding. During warmer hours of the day, worms will find shade under clods next to wheat here. plants.

Damage from fall armyworms can range from entire plant destruction in young stands to feeding upon Fire Department. lower leaves in taller stands.

Early detection of armyworms is Booster Club. important as the pests are more easily controlled while small.

In fields where four to five larvae per square foot are found and seedling stand loss and foliage loss on older plants occur, control measures are recommended.

Suggested insecticides for controlling armyworms include Carbaryl (Sevin), Ethyl Parathion, Methomyl (Lannate or Nudrin), Methyl Parathion or Trichlofon (Dylox 80% SP).

Insecticides may be applied by aerial or ground methods and control armyworms. Application rates should be sufficient to penetrate the crop canopy in small grains.

Some insecticides have short time grazing restrictions so follow label directions in applying insecticides.

THE PUMPKIN

Bright orange pumpkins are a welcome symbol of harvest, Halloween and fun.

The pumpkin has probably been influenced in more fairy tales and legends than any other vegetable.

The custom of making jack-olanterns began in Scotland. If not for a quirk in history, today's jacko-lanterns might have been made from turnips instead of pumpkins. Scottish children had carved their jack-o-lanterns out of large turnips but when their families moved to America, they didn't bring their turnips with them. Keeping their Halloween customs, they found pumpkins a good substitute.

Pumpkins can be used like other winter squash - in pies, custards, breads and puddings. As a vegetable it can be baked and glazed with brown sugar and butter; or boiled, drained, mashed and served with

orange color \*shouldn't be broken or cracked

\*should be free from soft spots and excessive scarring

\*should be clean

Pie pumpkins, which are smaller but sweeter than field pumpkins, are sound, flattened at both ends and a very bright orange in color with a rich orange flesh. Normally they are 6-7 inches in diameter and weigh between 18-25 pounds.

#### **COSTUMES NEED TO BE TREATED**

Parents should make sure all Halloween costumes are safe and have a mitted by telegram was "What hath flame retardant finish.

For cotton fabrics, stir together seven ounces of borax, three ounces of boric acid and two quarts of hot water. If the solution gels or becomes cloudy from standing, rewarm it.

For rayon or easy-care cottons, such as wash and wear, dissolve 12 ounces of diammonium phosphate in two quarts of water and stir until the mixture is clear.

Dip the fabric in the solution and press with a warm iron when the fabric is almost dry.

These home treatment methods are not permanent. They make the fabric flame retardant - not fire-

### City Council Discusses Landfill Site, Streets

Munday met in regular session on Tuesday, October 11, at City Hall. Members present were Mayor Doris Dickerson and aldermen Garon Tidwell, Jessie Andrade, Richard Albus and Jessie Tucker. Gene Brown was

Mayor Dickerson called the meeting to order. Minutes of the September 6 regular meeting were read. Albus moved minutes be approved. Andrade seconded; all for. Minutes of the September 22 special meeting were read. Albus moved these minutes be approved as written. Jessie Tucker seconded. Motion carried.

Mayor Dickerson next stated that Public Hearing #2 in regard to a Community Development Program application of the City of Munday to the Texas Department of Commerce is open for public comment No one was present, other than the Council. The hearing will remain open for comment until this session ends, Mayor Dickerson said.

Next business was to discuss the landfill application, land, etc., in regard to the Texas Department of Health requirements for a new landfill. Mayor Dickerson, Walter Hertel and Salvador Sosa made a trip to Seymour and Burkburnett since the last regular meeting to observe their landfill operations on these two state approved sites. Mr. Parker and Mary Alice Smith of Seymour and John Brookman of Burkburnett offered help on the application if needed and recommended adequate acres for many years of landfill operations be secured since any future approval will be more strict and land more costly. No official council action taken.

The council next read Housing Authority minutes and examined the annual report. Council action was not needed.

The council reviewed the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority proposal for the Munday water rate for October 1, 1988, to September 30, 1989. Percentage charge to Munday will rise since percentage use of water by Munday is up; also, a proposal for two 5¢ increases over the next year is proposed. The council expressed hope that water sales to Rhineland might offset need for the second 5¢ increase proposed. No official action

Tidwell next moved that Munday Lions Club be allowed to install flag holders on the outside of City Hall grounds for display of flags - same 'to be installed at ground level so as to not interfere with mowing or sprinkling of the lawn and to not interfere with vehicle parking. Jessie Tucker seconded; all for.

The council next discussed City personnel policy with the city's future goals in mind; no official action taken now.

Condition of the City Hall lawn at this time is good and several citizens have expressed appreciation for the way it looked for the weekend Homecoming. The City Park has been freshly mowed.

The City Administrator recommended that a new pipe between pool and filters be installed, with City forces, prior to next year's pool opening; also that a new circulator pump be bought. The Administrator was instructed to proceed with installation of the pipe and to secure prices for the pump as soon as possible. The City Administrator also recommended installation of an app. 18" overflow pipe at the storm

The City Council of the City of sewer pump station. This will enhance flow at flood stage and remove some floating debris. The administrator and water supt. are to check out levels and install this overflow if feasable.

The council tabled 9-1-1 service for further study.

The council discussed the recent rate increase request to the P.U.C. by General Telephone Company. Council position is to continue with Butler and Casstevens, rate consultants, who cite figures showing a rate increase not justified.

Also, West Texas Utilities is again increasing rates by 7% (fuel cost adjustment). Council position is to continue with other cities and our consultants to try to get the last rate increase moderated due to several allowances made by P.U.C. which we believe unjustified.

Jessie Andrade next moved that Coyt Smith, Police Chief, be officially appointed as City Fire Marshall. Albus seconded; all in favor.

Mayor Dickerson again asked if anyone wanted to make comments in regard to Public Hearing #2 in which the City of Munday is making application to the Texas Department of Commerce for a grant of \$246,000 for a street paving project; the City of Munday to furnish \$12,000 in-kind (water and sewer relocations, etc.) and \$25,000 in cash from City funds. No comments.

Albus moved that a resolution be passed as follows: That application be made to the Texas Department of Commerce for a \$246,000 grant for street paving and curbing; the City to furnish \$12,000 in-kind for relocations and \$25,000 in cash to the project, if funded by the Texas Department of Commerce. Tidwell seconded. Voting for were Albus, Tidwell, Andrade and Tucker; motion carried.

Albus moved bills be paid as follows: from airport funds, \$59.96; from ambulance fund \$549.66; swimming pool funds \$69.00; from operating funds \$14,008.16. Tucker seconded, all for.

Tidwell moved meeting adjourn. Tucker seconded. All for.
