"On my honor I will do my best..."
Each one of the thousands of Boy Scouts of America will recognize this as the opening phrase of the Boy Scout Oath. Each one could possibly recite the oath in its entirety, and without a flaw!

You see, it's one of the first things they learn when embarking on the Boy Scout program. Under capable and dedicated leaders, each boy may advance in rank from Cub Scout through many projects and tests to Eagle Scout, which (we think) is the highest rank in Boy Scouting.

In the beginning, each is better learned than we are. We could not off-hand recite the entire oath!

We were never a Boy Scout, you see. Growing up and helping out on the farm did not afford the opportunity the "city boys" had.

We served as assistant scoutmaster for a period—only long enough to learn the Scouts knew more than we did; therefore, we could not teach them!

This preamble is our humble way of saying that many of us here in Munday will be on the "honor system", come next Sunday!

When we, among others, expressed a "beef" about the prospect of being denied the privilege of scanning the pages of our Sunday paper, all because truck drivers wanted a new contract that did not require delivery of Sunday mail, our postmaster, Dolores Lambeth, made a move to do the next best thing to alleviate this inconvenience.

She got in touch with The Times Publishing Co., publishers of the Wichita Falls Record News and Times and arranged to have them deliver the papers to Munday by means of their own conveyance. They had to come to Munday, anyway, to make delivery to their own "dealers", those who do door-to-door delivery of the newspaper each morning.

In Munday, the Leonard Moores, who have this project in hand, will receive all Sunday editions and will place all supposed-to-be by mail copies within the post office lobby. And this is where "we, the people" come in!

These papers, one with the name of each "by mail" subscriber on it, will not be placed in our boxes, since the post office will be without an employee on Sundays and major holidays. They wouldn't have anything to do, since not even a "penny post card" will be delivered into Munday on these days.

Each of our mail subscribers may go to the post office lobby and pick up only the newspaper that has "our brand" on it. If we pick up another, that's either making a mistake, or cheating!

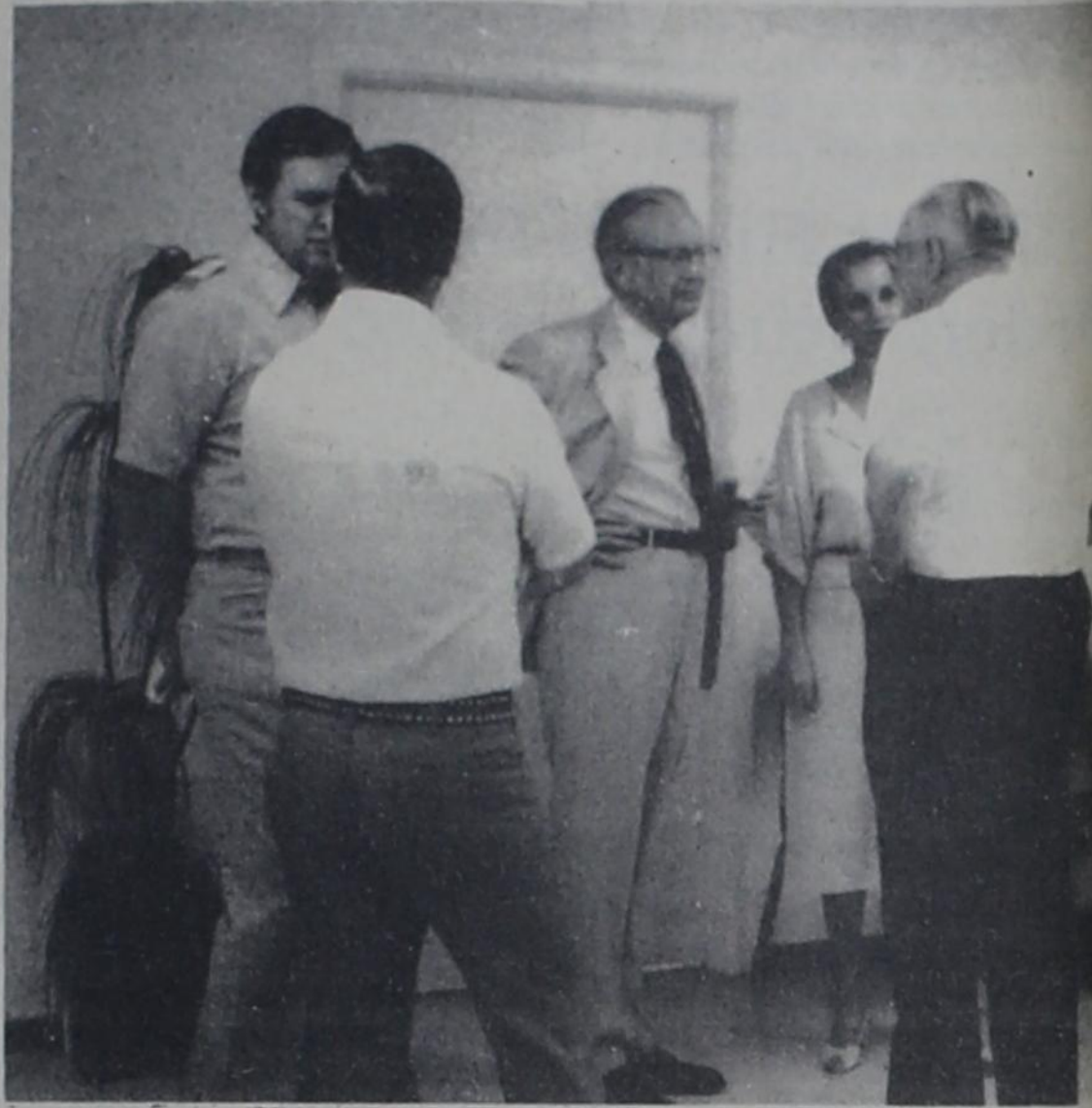
There's where the honor system comes in!

We're supposed to pick up only our own—and no other.

If we find that ours is not in the bunch, we should not try to compensate ourselves by snatching another paper just because we're entitled to have one in the bunch. If we do this, we're cheating another subscriber out of his newspaper.

We understand the same system will work with the Abilene Reporter-News, too. This newspaper firm has been delivering their papers by means of their own conveyance for some time, Dolores informed us, leaving the bundles in the lobby. It's been the duty of the first post office employee who arrives to get these

Commissioners Court Appoints Replacement On Hospital Board

Knox County commissioners court met at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, June 14, in regular session. Members present were H. T. Melton, county judge; Billy G. Johnston, precinct one; Bobby J. Roberson, precinct two; and Philip F. Homer, precinct three. Lee G. Patterson, commissioner of precinct four, was absent.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The court received the county treasurer's monthly financial report.

Following a study of the proposed budget for the next fiscal year by the court, Monday, July 12, 1982 was set for a public hearing on the budget.

Motion was made by Roberson and seconded by Johnston that Knox County consider changing the county's group insurance to Texas Association of Counties Trust Fund and pay employees premiums on medical plan #1. All voted approval.

The commissioners court met with members of Texas Department of Human Resources to consider appointing a county child welfare board and

the approval of a contract with the Texas Department of Human Resources.

A motion was made by Johnston and seconded by Roberson to accept the bid of Jerry's Plumbing of Knox City for a four ton heating and cooling unit to be installed in the county jail living quarters at the cost of \$3695.00. All voted yes.

Johnston made a motion, with Homer seconding, to appoint Melvin Lowry of Knox City, resident of precinct one, to replace Terry L. Keener, whose resignation as a member of the Knox County Hospital Board was accepted by the court. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Johnston, seconded by Homer, and carried, to set the salary of Knox County Sheriff's Department's county jailer at \$10,920.00 per year, under the terms of an agreement between the commissioners court and Knox County Sheriff Gene Nix, effective July 1, 1982.

Homer made a motion, Roberson seconded, with it carrying, to request the county tax collector to place a notice in the newspapers in Knox County to

State Board of Education concurred with the recommendation of the State Commission on School Accreditation that Munday Independent School District be reclassified from Accredited-Warned, to Accredited.

Mr. Edward Marrigold, from the Division of Accreditation, reported to Munday I.S.D. officials that the prompt attention to those matters in need of correction was appreciated.

You May Pick Up Sunday Newspapers At Post Office

Through arrangements made with The Times Publishing Co. of Wichita Falls, those who have been receiving their Sunday papers by mail may pick them up in the post office lobby on Sundays.

This is the beginning of "no mail delivery" in Munday on Sundays and major holidays.

Dolores Lambeth, postmaster, made this arrangement so local patrons would not be deprived of their Sunday newspapers, or have to wait until Monday to receive them.

"This is strictly on the honor system," the postmaster said, "and it can be quickly discontinued if proven unsatisfactory."

Young Farmers Host Field Day On Saturday

Members of the Brazos Valley chapter of Young Farmers hosted its first field day on Saturday, June 26. Guests gathered at Munday ag shop at 9:00 a.m. for registration.

John Reneau, president of the local chapter, served as master of ceremonies, introducing special guests, including Kit Home of Abilene, farm and ranch supervisor for West Texas Utilities Co.; Billy Lyons of Austin, executive secretary of the state Young Farmers; Scotty Belew of Winters, state president of Young Farmers; Benny Clark of Stephenville, Area IV supervisor of FFA and Young Farmers; and Miss Carolyn Schur, electric living consultant for West Texas Utilities Co.

Doyle Lowrance, superintendent of Munday Schools, welcomed the guests. Mr. Belew presented an outline of upcoming events at area, state and national levels.

On the morning tour, the group of men went to farmland north of Goree where they were given a demonstration of a center pivot irrigation operation by K & R Irrigation. Dr. Bill Kingston presented facts to the group about potatoes and cabbage as they toured fields of the vegetables grown by Kiser and Sons and Herring and Herring, respectively.

K & R Irrigation hosted a delicious lunch for the group. After enjoying the good food and visitation, Dr. Kingston delved into more information on growing, processing and marketing potatoes, giving the men present an opportunity to ask questions.

Water Overflows At Miller Creek Lake

For the first time since the Miller Creek Reservoir was completed, water was flowing over the emergency spillway during the weekend!

This spillway carries runoff water from the reservoir when the lake level gets too high to be handled by the regular spillway. What's taking place at the water escapements means, of course, the Miller Creek Reservoir is brimming

full and excess water is taking its course to the Brazos River.

Many people had entertained the idea, perhaps, that this would never happen since Miller Creek normally flows very little water.

Rains of the past week have turned the creek into a raging stream, with overflowing conditions prevailing for several miles along the river's route.

Employees at the reservoir reported Monday that the regular spillway takes care of water up to nine feet, and the lake level was 11 feet at that time, with a lot of water going around the dam by means of the emergency spillway.

Rainfall Exceeds 1981 Precipitation

With more than a generous portion of rain coming during the past week—6.40 inches in four days of the week—rainfall in Munday during 1982 has far exceeded the total amount during 1981, a check of last year's record reveals.

Through June of 1982, precipitation had more than doubled that of the same period in 1981, when 11.69 inches were recorded. Total rainfall through December 14 of 1981 was 20.81 inches.

It is the general opinion that it's time to turn the faucets off. Maybe this is taking place, since we went through Monday without any additional moisture.

Flooding Reminiscent Of Earlier Occurrences

The 3.80 inches of rain falling in the Munday area early Friday morning sort of "added insult to injury", as various areas reported some flooding conditions. This was reminiscent of those days of the 1930's and 1940's before the drainage ditch was constructed.

The ditch again proved its worth to Munday, as it diverted water coming in to the Munday area from the southwest. Had it not been for this structure, the water would have coursed through Munday's business district.

But all flooding was not diverted! In the area of Quality Implements, on the highway south of Munday, a

veritable lake of water was formed by the downpour early Friday. The implement building was completely surrounded by water, and flooding conditions occurred inside. Water completely covered the roadway leading to the west for about a mile, and a miniature river was formed on the north-east corner of Quality Implements premises as water flowed toward the drainage ditch. The Bowden land just west of the highway was almost completely covered with water, and Stewart's Animal Hospital west of town was standing in a lake of water!

Conditions were probably worse in "the flats" in the eastern part of town, where water reportedly entered a number of homes. In the Northpark edition, water surrounded homes and left a film of silt as it receded. Possibly a few homes suffered water damage inside. Business places reporting water damage inside included Osbornes and Farmers Supply on East Main St. and a building on the other side where Shelton Phillips was opening a shop. Some water entered Bud's Beauty Shop. East of the signal light, water got inside Munday Lumber Co., the Caroused

Beauty Shop, Carden's Plumbing and Electric and the old Bauman building also owned by James Carden. Water lapped at the doorway of Munday Tire and Appliance and other buildings along this street.

Meanwhile, insurance adjusters were busy last week in determining hail and other damage to homes and businesses and autos in Munday. This came about a week earlier than last Friday's heavy rain. It was estimated that around 90% of the roofs in Munday were damaged, with the loss running upwards from \$1.5 million.

Truscott History Book Orders Being Accepted

The 300-page family section of the history of Truscott and Gilliland, "Between the Wichitas", is now at the publishers in Wichita Falls. The section includes over 430 family stories.

Committee members are now working to complete the sections that include businesses, schools, churches, etc.

The book will open with a chronological history of the divide with references to Spanish records, U. S. Army reports and government records, as well as quotations from interviews and family documents.

The book ends with a section of family picture pages. These pages are for sale at \$60.00 per page, or \$33.00 per half page. A family page can contain one to about 12 pictures, copies of letters, newspaper articles or other printed material. Pictures as large as 8 x 10 can be reduced

by the publisher. These will be arranged alphabetically by family surnames. There will be no limit on the number of pages a family may purchase.

At this time, it is too late to add a story to the family section, but a family may choose to put their history in these final pages.

The family picture page section has been planned to help pay for the cost of publication. The price of the book is being kept as low as possible, but the book will be almost 500 pages in content.

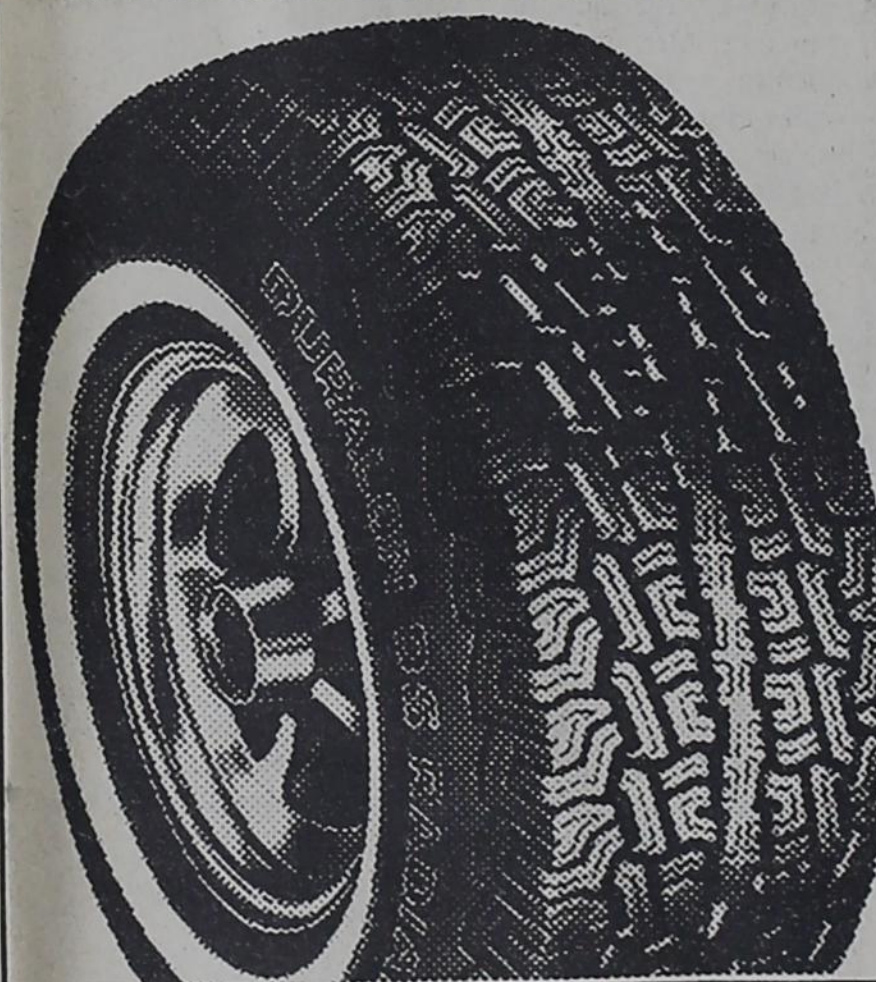

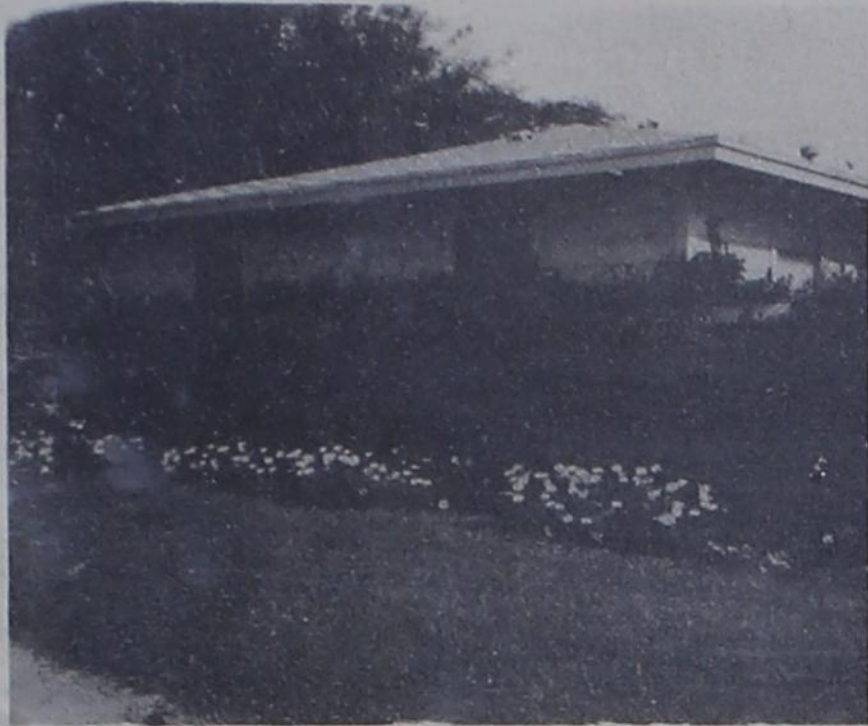

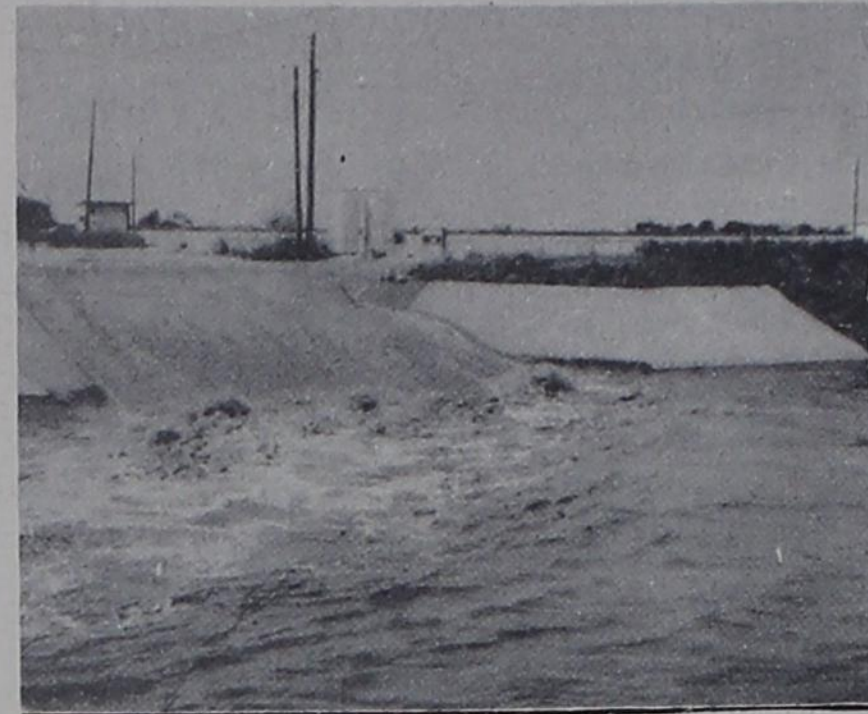
Many New Books For Children At City-County Library

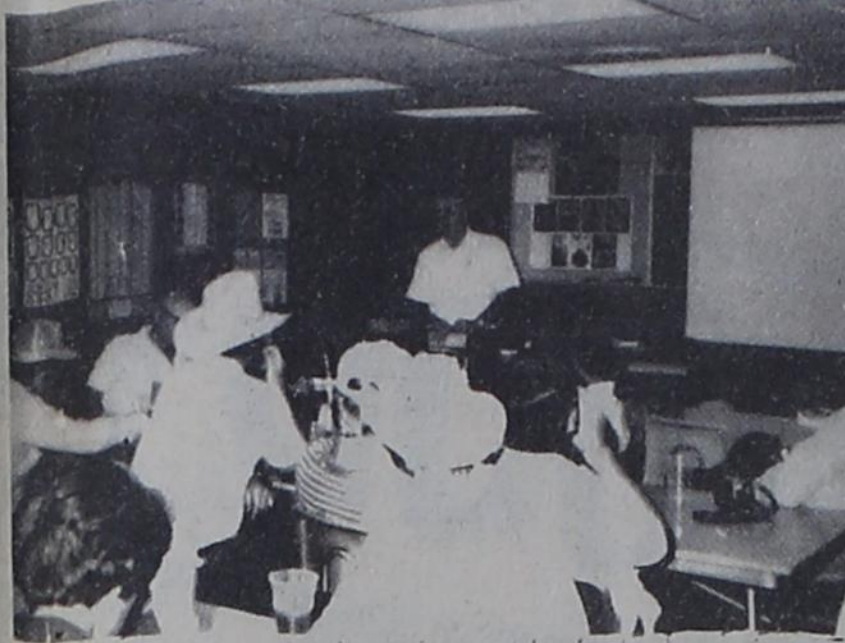
In conversation with Mrs. Moore, she had so many nice things to say about the people of Munday we decided to share some of her comments with our readers.

Rains Reveal Need For Parallel Terraces

Erosion may reduce soil productivity if it occurs faster than the topsoil can be replenished through natural processes. As the recent rains have shown, many cropland soils, including some of the most productive, have been severely eroded in this country.

As a rule of thumb, on deep soils commonly used for cropland, 5 tons of soil per acre can be lost annually without damaging the soil's productive potential. Holding erosion within these rates permits indefinite use of the soils. If you can see erosion taking place on your cropland under normal rainfalls, then more than 5 tons of soil is being lost. In most cases it would take terraces to cut soil erosion down to acceptable levels.

Terracing the land is a practice that gained popularity back in the late 1930's when soil erosion first came to the attention of farmers. Terraces in those days in this area were run on the contour. This meant that you could not farm with the terraces because they were not parallel. This made terrace maintenance a problem and farming more difficult (especially when planting row crops).

Today, equipment is bigger than ever, labor costs

are much higher, and fuel costs are always going up. This means that you, the farmer, need to get over the land as quickly as you can to keep cost per acre as low a figure as possible. Today the Soil Conservation Service recommends parallel terraces for ease of farming and still protect the soil by keeping soil loss to an acceptable level. This means that terraces will be designed to fit your equipment so that you can farm with the terraces rather than farming over them. There will be some land that will be too rough to parallel and there will be some odd areas on some fields that cannot be paralleled. Nevertheless, having an S.C.S. technician make a contour map of your field will result in a good terrace design that you can live with and still control erosion.

If you feel that your cropland may need terracing, contact the Soil and Water Conservation office at Knox City.

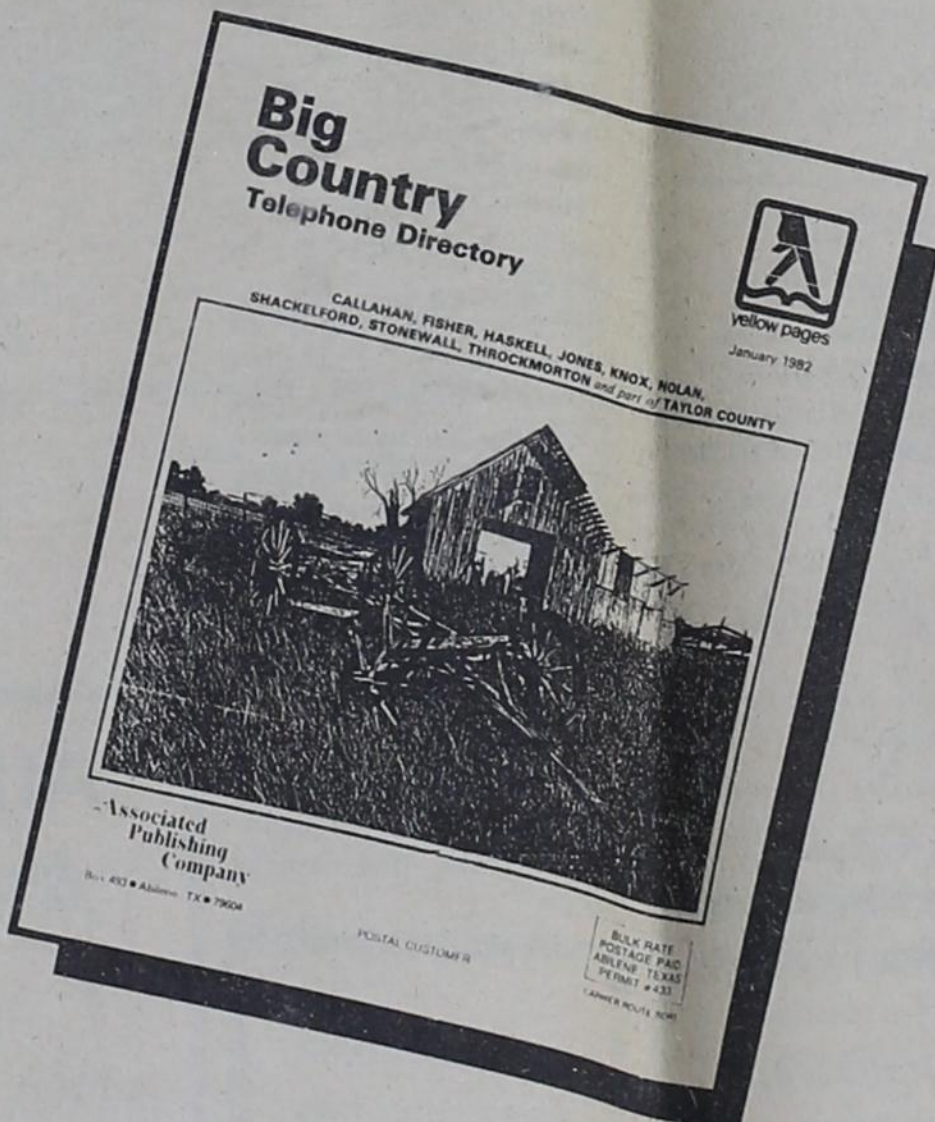
