Munday EMT's Are "Good Samaritans"

Tuesday, August 21, was an especially busy day for new ambulance EMT director, Gary Moseley and his crew. They had taken seven calls during the day and pulled the ambulance into the shed at a few minutes before 5 p.m. to begin cleaning and restocking operations.

Reba Redder and Pam Reed were on call and as they drove into the shed, they noticed an older model station wagon, with the door open, parked on the east side of the city hall square. A man sat behind the wheel with his head resting against it.

"I'd have to be really tired to stop and sleep in this heat," Reba commented, but the crew didn't find anything especially unusual since visitors through Munday often stop to rest or have lunch under the trees on the city hall lawn.

By a little after 7, the ambulance had been scrubbed and new supplies put into place and the crew was ready to go home. As Reba walked out to her van, she noticed the car was still there and the man was sitting in the same position. She wondered if he might have been intoxicated but there was something about the position of his head and the fact that the car was facing north as though he had pulled across the street that bothered her. She went back inside to ask Gary to walk over with her and check to see if everything was all right.

The man was not drunk--nor was he "all right". He was in a deep state of unconsciousness. City law enforcement officers were notified as the EMT crew transferred him to the

ambulance. From his driver's license and a checkbook in his pocket, the man was identified as Billy Frank Bunting of Odessa.

He began to regain consciousness later that evening in the emergency room of the Knox County Hospital and as he was being transported to Wichita Falls, he bagan to talk briefly to the EMT crew. When they arrived at Bethania Hospital, Mr. Bunting's brother was waiting for them He reported that his brother had not been feeling well and had made an appointment with a Wichita Falls doctor for August 22. He was enroute to his brother's house in Henrietta to keep his doctor's appointment the next day.

Pam Reed was in Wichita Falls later in the week and stopped by the hospital to see Mr. Bunting.

"I'll bet you don't remember me, do you?" she asked.

"I'll bet I do," he answered. "And I know how lucky I was to have reached Munday before I blacked out."

Just one more example of people caring about people---in a small town.

Enrollment Figures Up For Munday Schools

For the fourth consecutive year, the enrollment of Munday schools has increased.

Four-hundred sixty-nine students were enrolled in school as of Monday, August 27, for the 1990-91 school year. This compares to 435 students during the 1989-90 school year. Enrollment figures change throughout the school year.

The third grade class, with 43 students, is the largest class followed closely by the kindergarten class with 42 students. The junior class, with only 20 students, is the smallest. Prekindergarten throught the sixth grade has 277 students, junior high a total of 62, and high school has 130.

Enrollment figures for each grade follow: pre-kindergarten, 23; kindergarten, 42; first, 38; second, 36; third, 43; fourth, 32; fifth, 34; sixth, 29; seventh, 31; eighth, 31; ninth, 36; tenth, 40; eleventh, 20; and twelfth,

Bill Kingston, high school principal, and Doug Donoho, elementary principal, expect to lose a few migrant students, but not as many as in the past, therefore enrollment should not change too much in the next few weeks.

The average daily attendance is recorded by the state in October to determine how much state aid the school will receive. A high average daily attendance is sought after during that month since state aid is a vital part of the school district's review. This increase in enrollment is good news for our schools.

Principal George Cotton of Goree reported that enrollment in the Goree schools had reached 104, down from last year's total of 112 students.



Dove Season Opens September 1 Regulations Remain Same

Area hunters need to get their shotguns out of the closet and cleaned up -- it's dove season once again!

Saturday September 1, is the first day of the hunting season. Hunters can start shooting thirty minutes before sunrise until sunset.

Bag limit is the same as last year, twelve per day, and 24 in possession after the second day of the season.

Area hunters are reminded to have their hunting license and a drivers license or ID card issued by the Department of Public Safety in their possession while hunting. This is for 17 year olds and up. Also, if you were born from September 2, 1971 to August 31, 1973, it is mandatory to

have a Hunters Safety Class before September 1 and carry a certification card showing you took this course. According to Ronnie Ainsworth,

According to Ronnie Ainsworth, gamewarden for Knox County, there are lots of doves but they are pretty scattered. There are lots of sunflowers due to the abundant rain and they have plenty of food and water everywhere. "Have a good time and enjoy yourself. After all, that's what dove season is for," Ainsworth stated. He also advises everyone to be careful, make sure you are not over your bag limit, you are carrying a valid hunting license, and carry no unplugged shotguns.

E. O. (Buddy) Tuggle thought the man who walked into Tulia Care Center on Wednesday, May 23 looked familiar, but he wasn't expecting a guest and certainly not this fellow. It had been 45 years since Tuggle and Dee Taylor had been together on Okinawa during World War II.

The pair, who "stayed together all through the war", lost track of each other. "They never knew where each other lived, but after all those years Dee found where his friend lived," Christin Taylor said after she and her husband made a long trip from their home in Wilburton, Oklahoma, just to see his friend and close buddy. "It was such a great meeting."

The surprise visit by his long-lost

military friend was all unexpected for Buddy. The two World War II boys fought together in battles in the Hawaiian Islands: Attu, Kisda, Kwojalein and Ryukyus (Leyte). They were machine gunners; Buddy was second gunner and Dee was first

Tuggle and Taylor met at Fort Will after entering the military.

Both became misty-eyed as they remembered their war years together. They didn't say so, but it's unlikely another 45 years will pass before the "army buddies" have another opportunity to reminisce.

Fishing Tip

Q: I see others catching lots of fish with jigs but I've never been able to use them. What's the secret to catching crappie on jigs?

A: Practice. When a person has been jiging for 20 years it's difficult to have the same skill if you've only just started. Here are a few tips, though. First, use ultra-light equipment. The lighter the rod and reel, the better. The rod you choose should be rated for 1/32 ounce lures (or even lighter). The line you use shouldn't be heavier than 6 lb. test. (I prefer 4 lb.) Start with one tube jig at 1/32 ounce. Tie it on using a clench knot making sure that on each cast that the jig sticks out sideways. Try a variety of casts and techniques by imitating someone who is catching fish with

Most people get hits but do not recognize the bite because crappie can hit very light. Even the lightest of "taps" can be a large fish. When you feel the "tap" or when the line moves in a way it shouldn't, use a quick snap of the wrist to set the hook. Don't try to set the hook like you see the bass fishermen on T.V. Crappies' paper mouth cause the hook to tear out if you set it too hard.

By the way, I find jiging is generally better in the cooler months.

All books, single coins and jewelry will be available at the Truscott homecoming.

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

Mrs. Bertie K. Welch, age 92, resident of the Gilliland Community for many years, passed away Monday, August 13, at the Munday Nursing Center.





At Your Service

Q: What is the "New Hermeneutic" that is bothering churches of Christ?

A: There is nothing new about the "New Hermeneutic" except that it was foreign to the prophets and writers of the Bible. A German theologian by the name of Rudolf Bultmann proposed early in this century two ideas about interpretation: first, that scripture should be "demythed"; and second, scripture should be viewed through existential eyes.

It was his claim that scripture is filled with myth to teach religious ideas. He claimed that such myths get in the way of religion today. Therefore, he believed that the events of the Bible such as the creation, the Fall from the Garden of Eden, Jonah's remarkable journey, and the resurrection were fables told to get across religious concepts.


Second, existentialists deny that knowledge can only be acquired through rational (scientific) means because personal experience is "more important". This is where the idea came from to base one's religion on feelings rather than scripture. This is also where the idea came from that scripture was a matter of one's own personal interpretation and that scripture cannot mean the same thing to everyone. This is in direct contradiction of the Bible but this doesn't seem to bother such theologians (see 2 Peter 1:20-21, RSV).

For years the thinking of Bultmann has bothered people of various denominations and has recently bothered members of churches of Christ. It is directly opposed to what the Bible itself says concerning obtaining meaning from scripture. Jesus, himself, along with his apostles and prophets, accepted the miracles as fact not fiction (e.g. Matthew 12:40; 16:4; Luke 11:30ff; James 5:11; Hebrews 11; Acts 17:26,29, etc.). It was the fact (not myth) of the resurrection that makes the gospel (good news) valid according to 1 Corinthians 15. Also, scripture never takes the existentialist posture. Itself relies on absolute meaning rather than "what it means to me". For instance, Paul uses exact, literal meaning of terms in his argument of Galations 3:16. Here he pointed to the meaning of the term we translate "offspring" in Genesis 13. Paul, along with the rest of the writers of the Bible, were exegetes believing that scripture should be interpreted by God's words alone (or scriptura interpres scriptura -scripture interpretes scripture). This is in direct contradiction of fanciful hermeneutics. I am an exegete because this is the way God's prophets "interpreted" the earlier scriptures.

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
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
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
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
