HASKELL BARELY PASSES SEYMOUR

Haskell's Indians were barely able to slip by the Seymour Panthers at Seymour on Friday night in a 7-0 victory in their District 7-AA season opener.

Albert Sherman scored the touchdown on a one-yard run in the third quarter. Mark Bailey added the point after. Haskell's defense played well, holding Seymour to 10 first downs and 221 yards total offense.

Seymour ended the game on Haskell's 35-yard line where they had a first and 10 with 35 seconds left. The Panthers threw four passes, all of which were intercepted.

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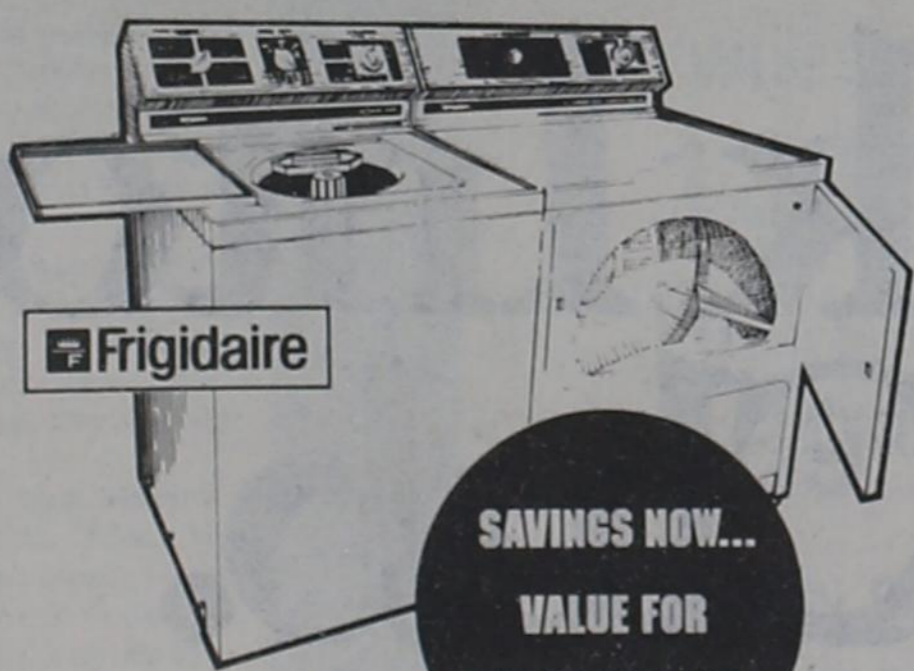

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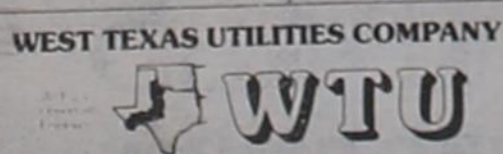
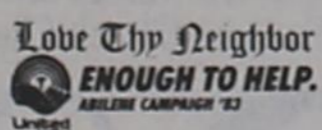

Farabee Addresses Soil And Water Conservation Board

Noting the agricultural advances Texas has made since the Great Depression, State Senator Ray Farabee (Wichita Falls) urged members of the Texas Soil and Conservation Board to continue their efforts to properly manage the state's natural resources.

In an October 5 speech before the Board, Senator Farabee said that although a million fewer people live in rural Texas now than lived there in 1930, Texas continues to be a leader in national agricultural production. "Such achievement could not have occurred without proper management and use of our precious natural resources. For that, Texas can thank the Soil and Water Conservation Board for a job well done."

Senator Farabee emphasized that these efforts must continue, however, and examined some of the problems currently facing the state. Existing situations which directly slow efforts to conserve soil include:

- Improper grazing management - including problems with overgrazing, water distribution and fencing;
- The presence of undesirable brush and weeds - considered a problem in almost 76% of the state's counties;
- Water erosion on cropland - Texas currently loses an average of three and one half tons of soil per acre due to water erosion;
- Wind erosion on cropland - some farms in the Panhandle lose over 14 tons of soil per acre per year due to wind erosion; and
- Lack of proper irrigation

water management - the dwindling supply of irrigation water makes efficient irrigation techniques more important than ever.

Noting that, "Part of our soil and water conservation

Mrs. Joe B. Roberts, club president, presided over the business meeting. Roll was called, with each member answering with her favorite shrub.





There are times in our lives when we forget that everything that we do takes place under the watchful gaze of the Lord. We lose sight of the fact that nothing can be hidden from the Almighty. There are those times when

we do not want to think about God seeing us because we are doing something wrong. At times like that it is helpful to remember Psalms 139 and ask ourselves, "How does one get away from God?"

Psalm 139: 7-12: Whither shall I go from thy spirit? Or whither shall I flee from thy presence? If I ascend up into heaven thou art there: if I make my bed in hell, behold, thou art there. If I take the wings of the morning, and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea; Even there shall thy hand lead me, and thy right hand shall hold me. If I say, Surely the darkness shall cover me; even the night shall be light about me. Yea, the darkness hideth not from thee; but the night shineth as the day; the darkness and the light are both alike to thee.

I. (vs. 7-8) There is no place to run from God. You cannot hide from God's gaze by changing addresses or moving to a new town. Death does not remove you from the gaze of God. You cannot hide from Him in the furthest reaches of outer space. Zechariah 4:10 tells us that the eyes of the Lord range to and fro throughout the earth.

II. (vs. 9-10) There is no speed that can outrun God. If you could run with the speed of light you could not get away from God. "Wings of the morning" refers to the first rays of sunlight that suddenly fill the horizon with light. Jonah ran in the other direction and could not escape. Moses tried to run to Midian and could not get away from God's gaze. If

you could run as fast as those beams of light, you still could not escape from God.

III. (vs. 11-12) There is no barrier able to conceal us from God. We tend to think that what we do in the dark is seen by no one. We think what we do in private, or what is done in our homes is seen by no one. But God's gaze penetrates every barrier. He sees everything we do no matter where we are. No barrier can lock God out, or obscure His view.

Remember: God sees all that you do. Even if you ignore that fact, it is no less true. We ought to so live that we will not be ashamed to look Him in the face, knowing He sees all. We must also realize that He who knows us best, loves us most.

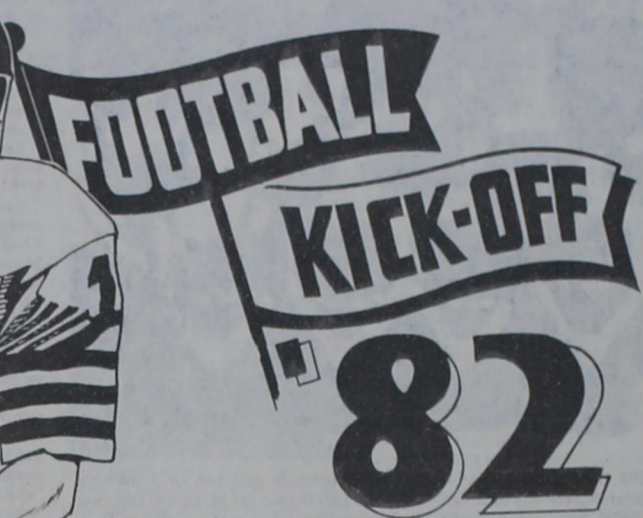

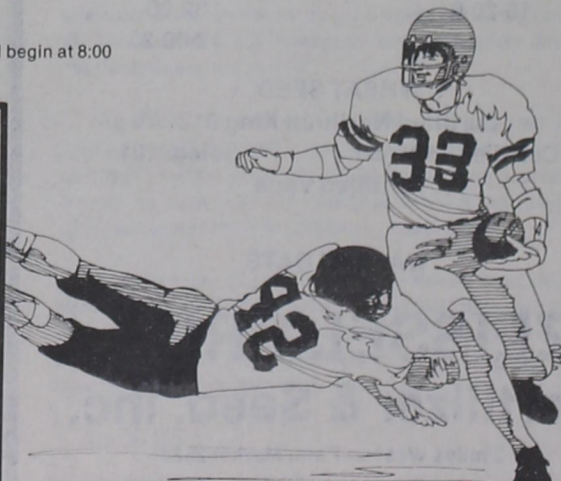

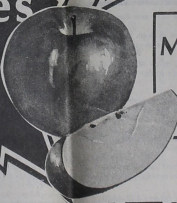
