Sales Tax Increase Effective July 1

Beginning July 1, the new one-half cent sales tax increase will go into effect for residents of Munday. Voters approved the option in an election January 19 of this year, by an almost two to one margin. One hundred forty-eight of the 700 registered voters voiced their opinions at the polls.

This means an increase for local consumers from 7.25% to 7.75% on all taxable purchases. The additional revenue will entitle the city to a total yearly rebate of approximately \$24,000 to be used for economic and industrial development. The first returns from the tax are expected to be received in September.

To expend these funds, the City Council has appointed a Development Corporation with a board of five directors. Named to the board were Mike Greenwood, president; Barry Ratliff, vice-president; Mark Reed, secretary; Gary Schur, treasurer; and Charles Baker, reporter. Baker will serve a one year term, Schur and Greenwood, two year terms, and Ratliff and Reed, three year terms.

The Corporation will use the funds specifically to purchase, construct, improve or equip manufacturing, industrial, transportation and distribution facilities; make secured and unsecured loans for permanent or

interim financing; issue bonds to finance buildings, machinery, land or equipment for manufacturing or industrial projects; and pay for infrastructure such as streets, water and sewer, if they are directly related to an economic development project.

No more than 10% of the funds may be used for promotion.

With the attraction of new businesses and jobs being very competitive, it is hoped that this economic development tax will do much to further the growth of Munday.

Employee Situation Discussed At Regular Council Meeting

(Following are the unofficial minutes of the Munday City Council meeting.)

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met at 6 p.m. Tuesday, June 11, in regular session at Munday City Hall.

Members present were Mayor Richard Albus, and council persons David Booe, Winters Matthews, Gary Tidwell and George Oustad. Member absent was Jessie Andrade.

Mayor Albus called the meeting to order. Minutes of the May 14 regular and June 5 emergency meetings were read. Motion by Oustad to approve minutes as read, seconded by Matthews. All in favor.

The Development Corporation was the first business on the agenda. No action was taken at this time.

An ordinance from West Texas Utilities concerning the franchise agreement with the City was discussed. Motion made by Tidwell to table this until the City Administrator can further investigate other cities and their franchise agreements. Oustad seconded motion, carried.

A City Drug Policy required by

Worker's Compensation was reviewed. Tidwell made a motion to accept the policy as submitted. Seconded by Matthews, all for.

Employees were discussed. Motion was made by Tidwell to accept the resignation of the Chief of Police with the effective date to be June 11, 6:30 p.m. As of that time, he is relieved of his duties and his final pay to be withheld until such time as all equipment is accounted for. Seconded by Matthews. Motion carried. Motion by Matthews to provide extra compensation for the remaining police officer, who will cover both shifts until another officer can be hired. Seconded by Booe. All in favor.

The Council instructed the City Administrator to begin advertising for a police officer and an ambulance coordinator.

Motion by Booe to pay bills as follows: airport \$56.82, ambulance \$467.77, swimming pool \$1,224.61, and operating \$18,632.08. Seconded by Tidwell. All for.

Motion to adjourn was made by Matthews and seconded Oustad.

Farm and Ranch Report

NOW IS THE TIME TO CONTROL BORERS

As mid-June has come that means time for an important management practice for fruit tree owners to prevent tree damage.

I'm referring to the control of the peach tree borer and time to control is here.

The peach tree borer navigates from the ground around the trunk of fruit trees which include peach, plum and apricot trees.

The borer pupae digs into the tree where it becomes an adult and lives until next spring. It will then come out of the tree, lay eggs and die.

If the borer is imbedded into the fruit tree, there are no control measures that I am aware of to kill the dreaded pest.

Chemicals that are labeled for use to control the borer include Lorsban, Malathion or Lindane. Be sure to follow label instructions when mixing the pesticide.

The insecticide should be applied to the scaffold limbs, trunk and around

the trunk, extending two to three feet away from the base of the tree. Control measures should also be repeated in mid-July and mid-August to insure against the borer.

Another good tip is to keep the fruit trees healthy by watering, fertilizing and keep the tree actively growing. This will deter most borers.

Homeowners should also remove dead wood from the tree to avoid infestations of borers of trees.

Following these techniques will assist in the riddance of the pesky borer from your fruit trees.

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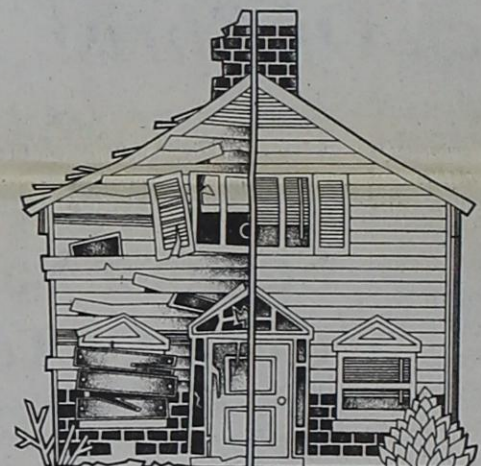

At Your Service

Q: Why do members of the churches of Christ think it is so important to be completely immersed in water instead of sprinkling during baptism?

A: Members of churches of Christ think that the Bible is God's word without error and should not be changed by human traditions. This was Jesus' point when he quoted Isaiah in Matthew 7, "This people honors me with their lips, but their heart is far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching as doctrine the precepts of men. You leave the commandment of God, and hold fast the tradition of men. . . . You have a fine way of rejecting the commandment of God, in order to keep your tradition. . . . thus making void the word of God through your tradition which you hand on . . ." (Mark 7:6-9, 13).

The term "baptism" was Anglicized instead of translated from the original language of the New Testament (Greek). Anglicization is the process of giving an English pronunciation to a foreign word that you will not or cannot translate. When the early translators did this in the English Bible it led to many misconceptions. The Greek terms for "baptism" are *baptisma* and *baptismos*. The Greek term for the verb "to baptize" is *baptizo*. All of these terms mean submersion or immersion in the Greek language. The Greeks are specific in their definitions and there is no room for another translation of these terms. If the New Testament writers had wanted to say "to pour," they would have used one of five different words: *hallo*, which means to pour liquid (John 13:5); *katacheo*, to pour down on (Matthew 26:7); *ekcheo*, to pour out (Revelation 16:8, 10, 12, 17); *ekchuno*, poured out (Acts 10:45); *epicheo*, to pour upon (Luke 10:34). If the New Testament writers had wanted to say "to sprinkle," they would have used one of three Greek terms: *rhantizo* (Hebrews 9:13); *rhantismos*, a sprinkling (Hebrews 12:24); or *proschusis*, a sprinkling or pouring (Hebrews 11:28). In such

case we would have been "katachized" (poured upon) or "rhantized" (sprinkled upon); instead we are "baptized for the forgiveness of our sins" (Acts 2:38).

Only in immersion can we see the symbol of the burial and resurrection of Jesus which we imitate (Romans 6:1ff). Only in immersion can we see the symbol of the Exodus which saved the nation of Israel and the archetype now saves us (1 Corinthians 10:1ff). Only in immersion can we see the symbol of the flood of Noah which now saves us (1 Peter 3:20-21).

Every major denomination which practices either sprinkling or pouring as a "baptismal mode," has authoritative scholars who admit that the baptism of the New Testament was only immersion. Some include: Robert Barclay, Quaker; Charles W. Bennett, Methodist; Richard Baxter, Presbyterian; Arthur C. Coxe, Episcopalian; Peter Dens, Roman Catholic; George P. Fisher, Congregationalist; Archbishop James Gibbons, Roman Catholic; Martin Luther, Lutheran; John Calvin; G. L. Haydock, Roman Catholic with endorsement by Pope Pius VI; William B. Pope, Methodist; Thomas O. Summers, Methodist (J.W. Shepherd, *Handbook on Baptism*, Nashville: Gospel Advocate, 1972, 3rd ed., pp 66-82, 156-157).

The proper mode of baptism is important because God, through his Bible, told us to be immersed. The use of sprinkling or pouring is rejecting the commandment of God in order to keep a tradition (Mark 7:13).

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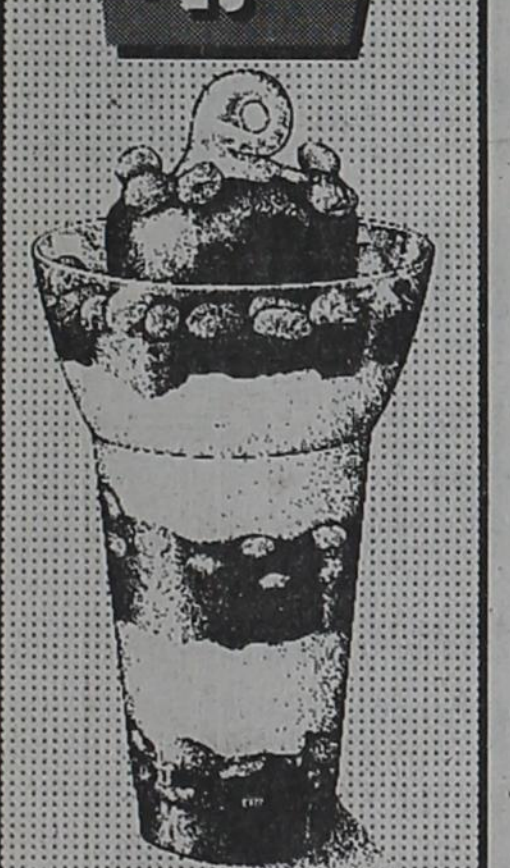

SPECIAL ELECTION
AUGUST 10, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."



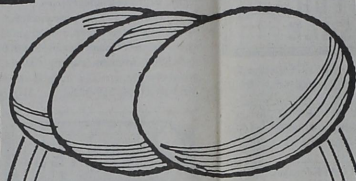

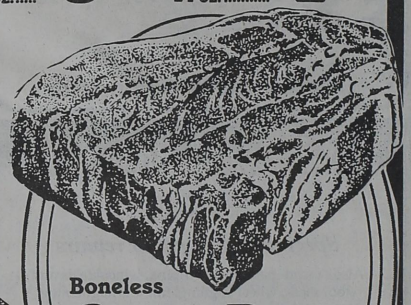
