Flags were flown in Munday on Monday!

And we were among those who were happy to observe them.

Not that it would be so unusual for flags to fly in our town on Monday, but it has been rather unusual for them to be flown on any other day, too.

But the Monday we're referring to was on Monday, July 4th - the 107th anniversary of our independence here in the U. S. of A.

It's been some years, now, since the Munday Lions Club took on the project of seeing that U.S. flags were flown in Munday on all proper occasions. This was a new project, and one which the members entered into with some enthusiasm for a time.

Merchants joined with the club in furthering this project by contributing 50 cents a month to the club.

Flags were procured from some place in Fort Worth and Charles Baker who found the place and purchased the flags was reimbursed for the purchase amount. As we remember, about 25 flags were purchased and placed in strategic places around the city square and along streets adjoining the square.

A number of club members volunteered to putting up the flags on mornings and taking them down on evenings of the days on which this should be done.

We thought it was a right pretty patriotic sight when so many flags were flown in our business district. Some very nice comments came from neighbors, and people passing through our town at these particular times.

But, you know, something happened! Enthusiasm began to wane within time; and, we think, the first time was the only time merchants had been asked to contribute their four-bits to the cause.

Most Lions are business and professional people; so, as time went on, they were inclined to take advantage of the long holiday weekends to get out of town and seek other means of enjoyment.

For a time, it was embarrassing to members of the club to be guilty of such forgetfulness, and holidays or "flag days" passed with our flags remaining in storage. As time passed, the embarrassment was less intense - and rarely did Old Glory fly in our town, except for special establishments - like the city hall, post office, etc., with a few of our residents remembering to fly theirs.

On occasion, some disappointment was expressed; on others, the disappointment was turned into criticism, but the project was started so long ago that some of our people didn't remember how or when it became a project.

Then there were those who "snatched" some of the flags. Those who erected them in the morning found one or more missing at eventide. Just the case of someone wanting something for nothing, or who got a charge out of stealing an item without being detected.

As discussions were held about replacing the missing flags, Charles could not remember where in Fort Worth the purchase was made, and the club secretary had no contact with the supplier whatever.

But the effort of those two, Bob Brown and Norm Anderson, who put the flags out on July 4th, is to be commended. The fact that about one-fourth of the flags were missing was noticeable, too.

We had two important holidays, or flag days, pass unobserved recently, and this brought about some criticism. Those who criticized could not remember just how the project started, but they thought such events as Memorial Day, Armed Forces Day and National Flag Day should not have gone unobserved by patriotic Americans.

Maybe this revival of the Lions project on July 4th will also bring about the revival of patriotism among we, the people, and things will be better in the future.

We do appreciate the two Lions who "remembered the Alamo" on Monday, July 4th!

### Meinzer Art Displayed At First National Bank

A Benjamin native, who has spent many tedious and enjoyable hours in pursuit of wildlife photos, is now reaping his rewards in the sale of his photos, both as originals and for use in various magazines.

He is Wyman Meinzer, son of Earlene Meinzer and the late Pate Meinzer, who has for several weeks had a number of his interesting and beautiful productions on display at the First National Bank in Munday. Shown in display about the bank's lobby are many types of birds and animals, such as fox, deer, quail, ducks, etc., that he has brought out to perfection with his camera.

In addition, Meinzer has on display the mounted head of a wild boar which he shot in the Benjamin area with his .41 Magnum. He has yet a larger one which he killed with a bow and arrow.

Meinzer is a 1974 graduate of Texas Tech in Lubbock with a degree in wildlife management and has been a professional wildlife photographer for about six years. He has traveled state-wide in pursuit of photos for his interesting collection.

In recent years, his work has been published in 19 magazines and on 48 different magazine covers. Some of the magazines include Sports-A-Field, National Geographic and Field and Stream.

Each of the photos displayed at the bank are for sale. Many of these are "open" editions and may be purchased in any amount, while others are "limited" editions with a limited number of prints available.

## Munday Man Involved In Electrical Accident

A local man went through a frightening experience last week but apparently sustained no injuries from the accident.

Bill Longan, an employee of B-K Electric, was in the bucket of his truck hooking up electric service to the Ray Herring farm when he attempted to move his hotstick across some 440 volt lines. He was looking into the sun and was unable to see clearly, and accidentally moved his arm into a charge of 220 volt electricity. He tried to get loose but could not manage to before he lost consciousness.

Bill said later that he was yelling for help, but Ray Herring, who was at the scene of the accident, and Bill's wife, Karen, who was in the truck below, said they heard no sound from the bucket. Ray noticed that Bill was slumped down into the bucket and when he didn't answer their calls, realized something was wrong. Ray climbed the boom on the truck to get to the bucket, and by stretching across the bucket, was able to reach under Bill's body to work the controls and lower it.

Karen said that Bill was turning blue when they got him to the ground, so after pulling him out of the bucket, she and Ray began cardio-pulmonary resuscitation. She said they worked on him "a good while" both in the truck and on the ground before he started to regain consciousness. He was disoriented for some time and extremely weak, but had improved a great deal by the time they got to the Seymour hospital, where he

## City Receives Dividend Check From Workmen's Comp

Walter Hertel, Munday City Administrator, announced Tuesday that the City of Munday has received a \$1,215.00 dividend from the Texas Municipal League Workers' Compensation Joint Insurance Fund. The dividend represents the City's share of the fund's annual excess contribution return which this year totaled \$3,433,894.

According to Hertel, the city is one of only 409 Texas cities to receive a dividend check. He attributes this to the city's employee accident prevention efforts as well as the overall financial and operating success of the TML fund.

The fund is a unique legal arrangement wherein 635 participating members collectively provide workers' compensation insurance protection to their com-

bined 88,000 municipal employees. Marvin Townsend, City Manager of Laredo and Chairman of the Board of Trustees, expressed pride in the fact that the TML fund cities enjoy a better loss ratio than all Texas commercial policyholders combined. "The dividend check received by the City of Munday is clear documentation of the success experienced by the City and the other 635 TML fund members."

Cost savings have been a characteristic of the TML Fund since its inception nine years ago. Cities receive an immediate 25 percent front-end discount at year end and reflect overall healthy operating results; dividends have amounted to more than \$11 million in returns to Texas cities since 1974.

## Hospital Board Handles Various Business Items

The June meeting of the board of directors of Knox County Hospital was called to order at 8 p.m. by board president Vernal Zeissel.

Members present were Vernal Zeissel, David Perdue, Ray Lynn Hardin and Buster Lowery. Members absent were Stanton Brown, Bernard Brown and Richie Smith.

Others present were Dr. W. F. Thompson, Randy Abernathy, Dan Powers and Richard Wheeler.

Minutes of the May board meeting were read by Richard Wheeler. The May minutes were corrected by adding David Perdue's name under members absent. Vernal Zeissel moved the minutes be approved as read and corrected. Buster Lowery seconded the motion. The motion passed with no opposition.

Old business was to introduce the new Administrator, Richard Wheeler, and new board member, Ray Lynn Hardin, to members not present at the May meeting.

New business discussed was the acquisition of two revenue producing diagnostic tools, a colonoscope and a sonogram unit. After a lengthy discussion concerning the scheduling and minimum charge per visit required from the existing sonogram service and the need, use and financing of these items, David Perdue made a motion that the hospital acquire them. Ray Lynn Hardin seconded that motion which passed with no opposition.

Richard Wheeler then informed the board that county funds can now be placed in an interest bearing checking account. After a brief discussion it was agreed that this should be done and the

signature card was signed. Reimbursement for expenses incurred by those attending the annual convention of the North West Texas Hospital Association was then discussed and approved.

A financial report of the hospital was then given by Dan Powers, followed by a list of May accounts payable to be approved. David Perdue moved the accounts payable be approved and paid as listed. Ray Lynn Hardin seconded the motion. The motion passed with no opposition.

With no further business to discuss, David Perdue moved the meeting close. Ray Lynn Hardin seconded the motion. The motion passed and the meeting adjourned at 10:25 p.m.

## Cucumber Harvest Now Under Way

Since early last week, workers in the fields and at processing sheds have been busy handling the largest cucumber crop in this area in several years.

Four local growers, Mike and Gaylon Hord, Garon Tidwell and son, Gary, and Floyd Reed, have about 100 acres in cukes. They are harvesting their crop, which is under contract with Robert Ruiz of Muleshoe and the harvest is being taken to the Ruiz shed for processing.

North Texas Growers, Inc., are also busy in their harvest, which started last week on approximately 30 acres. Cukes are picked every two or three days, it was stated, and each picking is better than the other.

Due to staggered planting dates, it's difficult to determine just how many acres are being planted. Harvesting and planting is going on at the same time, and planting will continue for some two weeks, or longer, it was stated. This is so the crops will come off at different stages.

The group has leased the Colville and Wilson potato shed, where the cukes are being processed. They will go into cold storage until sold, one member stated.

### Farm And Ranch Report

#### Cotton Insects Prevalent

With most cotton up and  
growing, producers need to  
begin field scouting as soon  
as possible.

Thrips are common in  
most fields but have not oc-  
curred in large enough num-  
bers to threaten the crop.  
Most fields have outgrown  
the threat of the thrip  
damage.

Some fields have popula-  
tions of beet army worms.  
You are urged to keep a look  
out for these pests and take  
corrective measures when  
populations reach eight per 5  
foot a row.

Boll weevils have been col-  
lected in pheromone traps in  
much higher levels than last  
year. These are the highest  
levels in this area since the  
1976-77 growing season. You

are urged to scout your cot-  
ton fields and keep an eye  
out for the boll weevil. If  
weevils are found, apply in-  
secticide after the pin-head  
square but before the 1/3  
grown stage or 1/4 inch in  
diameter. This stage should  
normally last about 5 days.  
Begin scouting your fields 3  
days after the first applica-  
tion to determine if a second  
application is necessary.







### The Separation Of Church And State

We hear much in these days about the phrase "the separation of church and state." It is used to justify the prohibition of prayer or any meeting of a religious nature whatever in public schools. It is not grounds, however, to keep our Congress from having chaplains, or beginning each session with prayer, or taking the Ten Commandments off the building our Supreme Court meets in to decide that public classrooms can NOT have copies of the Commandments posted on their walls. It takes very little investigation or logic to see that there are some outstanding inconsistencies in our understanding and enforcement of the "separation of church and state."

This phrase is not in our Constitution at all. It was coined by Thomas Jefferson in a personal letter. It was understood for nearly two centuries as the protection

that one church would not run the government of the United States of America and that government would not run the churches. It was not until the last decades that anyone took it to be justification for restricting voluntary prayer and the right to voluntary assembly for religious discussions.

One wonders why just the schools? Why not Congress? Certainly Congress is more easily defined as "government" than the schools! Could it possibly be that there are those who are trying to use the "separation of church and state" doctrine to remove the "theism" (belief in God) and proliferate "humanism" (atheism) among the children of our great land? Could it be that these know as does Communist Russia that the way to change a nation is to change the children (even in Russia the old people can worship; it is the children who cannot be taught about God)? Could it be that some fine, well-meaning, godly people are being

misguided by these humanists into thinking they are supporting a cherished doctrine when, in fact, they are perverting it?

At least, it seems clear to this preacher that it is time for godly people to insist on clarification of our religious freedoms and the "separation of church and state" before we end up with neither. When school children in Lubbock, Texas are denied by our courts the right to meet voluntarily before school hours to discuss their faith but the same children could meet to discuss evolution, communism, humanism, atheism, or any other subject, then it is time we stand up and insist on the religious freedoms our Constitution guarantees. As Christians we need to be what Jesus said we would be in our world. Remember that He said, "You are the light of the world." And He said, "You are the salt of the earth." \*\*\*\*\*



## Public Notice

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective August 1, 1983, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC) at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

As a result of the settlement of a lawsuit brought by the U.S. Department of Justice against AT&T, Southwestern Bell, on January 1, 1984, (or as otherwise ordered by the United States District Court) will no longer be a part of the Bell System, but will be owned by public shareholders. Under the terms of the settlement, Southwestern Bell has identified 15 areas in the state within which it may provide service, and the federal court with jurisdiction of the settlement has tentatively approved these areas, called LATAs (Local Access and Transport Area). On or about January 1, 1984, Southwestern Bell can not provide service between these LATAs, and in addition, must transfer to AT&T customer premises equipment that it leases to customers.

Southwestern Bell has filed a proposed revised rate schedule with the PUC reflecting these changes. These rates would become effective August 1, 1983, if they are not suspended by the PUC; however, it is expected that they will be suspended and that the rates ultimately set by the PUC will become effective on or about January 1, 1984. If the rates were to become effective as filed, they would produce a 48.2% increase in Southwestern Bell's unadjusted test year revenues (or a 76.36% increase in Southwestern Bell's test year revenues adjusted to reflect the effect of Southwestern Bell's divestiture from AT&T). Any change in the rates for any interLATA services offered by AT&T or a subsidiary after January 1, 1984, could affect customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

### Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in rates for intraLATA interexchange toll services, any change in those rates could also affect customers of other telephone companies. 

COACHED THE MUSTANGS TO FAME . . .

**Matty Bell, Legendary SMU Coach, Former Resident Of Munday, Dies**

News of the death of Matty Bell, the legendary Southeast Conference coach who led SMU football teams to national prominence over two decades, awakened memory chords of several Munday people who remembered when he was a growing boy on the Knox County Prairie.

There were a few who remembered vaguely that Matty Bell once roamed the prairie as a boy, but it was Miss Maude Isbell, pioneer teacher of this area, who always proudly announced that he was one of her students.

It was believed that this was while Miss Maud taught in Munday, but the date was not determined.

Some who remembered are:

C. P. Baker: "Yes, I remember him. His father was associated in some early-day business here. The family must have left here around 1910."

Mrs. Lee Isbell: "Yes, I recall there was a Madison Bell here as a boy, but I don't remember much about it."

Mauryse Smith Stone: "I remember him living here, and I know that he was born here because Daddy (the late Dr. A. A. Smith) said so." A check revealed there was no record of his birth at the Knox County courthouse.

The retired coach-athletic director died early Thursday morning, June 30, in his sleep at his residence near the campus where he produced powerhouse teams in the 1930s and '40s. He was 84 years of age.

Bell's 1935 Mustangs won the national championship and became the only team in SWC history to play in the Rose Bowl. Yet, his famous player, Doak Walker, did not arrive at SMU to become the school's only Heisman Trophy winner until the 1940s. Walker, who played on two of Bell's four SWC championships at SMU, said one of the things the coach always told his players during pre-game talks has always stuck with him. "He would tell us, 'it's only 60 minutes on the field, but there'll be a lifetime to remember it.'"

Bell also coached such other Mustang All-Americans as Kyle Rote, Bobby Wilson, J. C. Wetsel and Truman Spain. He

had two coaching tenures at SMU, joining the staff in 1935 and led his team to the national championship. He remained at the school through the 1941 season. Then, after World War II, he returned to SMU in 1945 and coached through Walker's final season in 1949. He retired as the school's athletic director in 1964.

During his career he became head coach at TCU. After six years of directing the Horned Frogs, he moved to Texas A&M and spent five years as coach of the Aggies.

During his heyday, one rarely talked with Miss Maud Isbell that she didn't proudly remark: "He was one of my pupils!" Others of her pupils who became well known were Dr. Lewis Sherrill, outstanding in the Presbyterian Church; Rev. Clark Meadow, "the perfect pastor"; the late Dr. Q. B. Lee of Wichita Falls; the late Dr. Bryan Newsom of Seattle, Washington.

Bell's survivors include his wife, Peggy; a daughter, Patty Kendrick; and grandsons, Matt and Scott Kendrick, all of Dallas.

Funeral services were held at 11:30 a.m. Saturday, July 2, at the Restland Memorial Chapel, with former SMU president, Dr. Willis Tate, officiating.


